Fall Sports Previews

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Men's Cross Country Preview

Just 13 points separated first place from fourth at last year's North Coast Athletic Conference Championships, making it the tightest race in the Conference's six-year history. The same kind of competitiveness can be expected in 1990 as The College of Wooster goes after its second title in a row and its third in the last four years.

Traditionally, Wooster has been joined at the top of the NCAC pack by Allegheny College and Case Western Reserve University. In fact, all six championships have been divided up between the three schools; Case Reserve has three, including back to back titles in 1985 and 1986; Wooster has two and Allegheny one. Those three should be at or near the top again this fall, but expect them to be joined by a strong Denison University squad, which placed a close second last year, as well as up-and-coming teams from Earlham College and Oberlin College. Kenyon College, Wittenberg University and Ohio Wesleyan University finished at the bottom of the pack last fall, but each has a strong corps of returning runners to work with and should improve in 1990.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's nine teams.

ALLEGHENY

The Galors return 10 letterwinners from last year's squad that placed third at the NCAC Championships and fifth at the NCAA Division III Midwest Regional. Winners of the inaugural North Coast title in 1984, Allegheny has placed lower than third in the Conference only once.

Junior **Rick Hughes** (Arnold, MD/Severna Park) and senior captains **Greg Haas** (Emlenton, PA/Clarion Valley) and **John Rittner** (Alliance, OH/Alliance) are expected to be the veteran leaders. Hughes, however, may not be ready to run until late in the season because of a broken foot. An All-Mideast Region honoree last fall and a two-time NCAC 3,000-meter steeplechase champion, his comeback is essential to the Galors' success.

Other returnees in the running for spots at the top of sixth year head coach George Yutasz's lineup include sophomore **Alan Bachman** (Endwell, NY/Maine), junior **Jim Fye** (Weedville, PA/St. Mary's Area) and seniors **Dave Bergh** (Homer, NY/Franklin) and **Jeff Stone** (Webster, NY/McQuaid Jesuit).

CASE RESERVE

Bill Sudeck begins his 37th year as head coach at Case Reserve with as inexperienced a team as he has ever had. Only two of his top five runners, senior **Anish Shah** (Mentor, OH/Mentor) and sophomore **Ricky King** (Massillon, OH/Washington), return from a squad that placed fifth at last year's NCAC Championships. That finish, the Spartans' lowest ever, is somewhat deceiving, however, as they finished only 21 points out of first.

Case Reserve, which has won three NCAC titles in six years, has nine freshmen on its 12-man roster this fall. Top newcomers include **Shawn Brown** (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph), who placed second at the Ohio Class AAA Meet in 1989, **Brett Hutchinson** (Pickerington, OH/Pickerington), **Rich Rapine** (Newtowne, PA/Council Rock) and **Nilesh Shah** (Mentor, OH/Mentor).

DENISON

Denison placed second at last year's NCAC Championships on the strength of a deep and youthful roster. This fall, with five top performers returning, 11th-year head coach Phil Torrrens has his sights set on the Conference crown.

Sophomore **Mike Collyer** (Bethesda, MD/Whitman) and senior **Mike Behrendt** (Stuttgart, Germany/American) will lead the Big Red's quest for the title. Collyer was a first-team All-NCAC pick last season after placing second at the Conference Meet, while Behrendt earned honorable mention honors for his eighth-place finish. Both also showed off their skills at the NCAC Outdoor Track & Field Championships; Collyer won the 10,000 and came in third in the 5,000 and Behrendt placed third in both the steeplechase and the 10,000.

Denison also will look for solid performances from senior **Brian Cloherty** (Garden City, NY/Garden City) and sophomores **Mike Heinz** (Northfield, IL/New Trier) and **Rob Steinhouse** (Orlando, FL/Edgewater). Freshman **Tim Dunham** (Laramie, WY/Laramie) heads a promising group of newcomers.

EARLHAM

After three straight seasons of improvement, fourth-year head coach Pat Thomas hopes to see his Quakers move into the upper division of the North Coast this fall. Earlham's roster remains virtually intact after last year's sixth-place showing at the NCAC Championships. "Our top runners are still very young," Thomas says, "but they seem to be coming of age. If we can stay healthy all year, we could challenge for one of the top spots in the Conference."

Juniors **Tim Doyle** (Kettering, OH/Fairmont), **Brad Pitcher** (Cincinnati, OH/Walnut Hills) and **Scott Pearson** (Cincinnati, OH/Finneytown) figure to be somewhere in the Quakers' lineup along with sophomores **Karim Hammad** (Ramallah, Palestine/Richmond (IN)) and **Randy Murdoch** (Milford, OH/Milford). Hammad, who won the mile at last winter's NCAC Indoor Track & Field Championships, could be a key as he tries to come back from an off-season injury.

KENYON

The Lords, with six returning letterwinners, are looking to improve upon their seventh-place NCAC finish of a year ago. Head coach Duane Gomez must, however, find replacements for three graduated seniors, including honorable mention All-NCAC performers Ken Wempe and Paul Worland.

Junior **John Day** (Georgetown, OH/Georgetown) and seniors **Mike Blake** (Stratham, NH/Brooks) and **Matt Olson** (Oshkosh, WI/North) are expected to lead the way this fall. Kenyon's best North Coast finish was a fourth in 1988.

OBERLIN

Tom Mulligan guided the Yeomen to a fourth-place Conference finish last fall in his first season as head coach. Without four of the top seven runners from that squad, Mulligan will have his hands full trying to match or better that finish in 1990. "It will be a challenge to finish in the top half of the NCAC," he says. "We'll have a tough time replacing the people we lost, but we have good base of returning runners to work with."

Senior **Jesse Malkin (Berkeley, CA/Berkeley)** and junior **Matt Nemeth (Auburntown, TN/Webb)** head the list of Oberlin returnees. Both have finished among the top 25 at the NCAC Championships in each of the last two years and Malkin was a regional qualifier in 1988. Senior **Nate Pawelek (Hamden, CT/Hamden)** also is back and should find a home somewhere at the top of Mulligan's lineup. Another interesting returnee is senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smokey Hill)**, who missed most of the 1988 season with an injury and all of 1989 while studying abroad. Gillespie placed 13th at the Conference Meet as a freshman and, to prove he has stayed in running shape, came back with a fourth-place showing in the 3000-meter steeplechase at last spring's NCAC Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

OHIO WESLEYAN

With all but two runners back, Ohio Wesleyan will seek to improve upon its ninth place Conference showing of a year ago.

Leading the way will be seniors **Mike Colson (Silver Spring, MD/Kennedy)** and **Darby Buroker (Lima, OH/Shawnee)**. Colson was the team's top runner in 1989, leading the Bishops in four of seven meets before an injury sidelined him just prior to the NCAC Championships. Buroker, the North Coast's reigning outdoor track champion in the 1,500, led Ohio Wesleyan twice last year, his first season of collegiate cross country. Sophomore **Aaron Granger (Columbus, OH/Independence)**, who came on late last fall and was the team's top finisher at the Conference Meet, also returns.

Frank Book, who took over the program last year when long time mentor Marv Frye was on sabbatical, remains in charge this fall. He coaches the distance runners for the Bishop indoor and outdoor track teams and his year-round presence will bring more continuity to the program.

WITTENBERG

Second-year head coach George Brose hopes that his squad's improved depth will allow for some upward migration in the 1990 NCAC standings. The Tigers placed eighth at last fall's Conference Championships, but four solid performers are back in the fold, including senior leader **Rick Zettler (Springfield, OH/Catholic Central)**.

Zettler posted Wittenberg's fastest time in every meet last fall and qualified for the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional. He will be joined by junior **Quincy Gage (Charleston, WV/Washington)** and seniors **Peter Browne (Oberlin, OH/Oberlin)** and **John Comeskey (Tiffin, OH/Columbian)**. "Browne, Comeskey and Gage have been running with Zettler in the preseason," Brose says. "I'm very pleased that (Zettler) will have some company this year."

WOOSTER

Wooster head coach Dennis Rice enjoyed great success in his first season, leading the Scots to an NCAC title. Now, as he prepares his team for the 1990 campaign, he hopes that 1989 was not a case of beginner's luck.

Sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)** and junior **Rob Noble (Pepper Pike, OH/Orange)** highlight a long list of returnees. Kelley was the team's top finisher in the final four meets last fall, including the NCAC Championships, where he finished sixth to earn first-team All-Conference honors, and the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional, where he was 10th. Noble also earned first-team All NCAC honors in 1989, placing seventh at the Conference Meet.

Juniors **Mike Rachita (Massillon, OH/Jackson)** and **Jeff Beck (Kent, OH/Roosevelt)** and sophomores **Joel McBurney (Boardman, OH/Boardman)** and **Steve McMillan (Madison, WI/West)** also are back and should find spots in the Wooster lineup.

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Women's Cross Country Preview

With 12 of the top 14 runners back from last fall's North Coast Athletic Conference Championships, much of the 1990 season figures to be spent in the fast lane as Allegheny College tries to win its fifth NCAC title in seven years.

Allegheny, which has run its way into the NCAA top 20 in four of the last five seasons, including an eighth-place finish last fall, has six of its top seven runners back in the fold. The Gators, however, are not reserving space in their trophy case just yet, as challenges are expected from Kenyon College, Ohio Wesleyan University and The College of Wooster. Wooster and Oberlin College are the only teams other than Allegheny to win a Conference championship in 1987 and 1984, respectively. Oberlin is another team that could pose a threat this season, while improving squads from Case Western Reserve University, Denison University, Earlham College and Wittenberg University hope to make a move.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's nine teams.

ALLEGHENY

Allegheny enters the 1990 season looking to take North Coast and NCAA Mid-east Region titles for the third consecutive year. The Gators placed six runners in the top 14 at the Conference Championships and seven in the top 25 at Regionals last year, and with six of their top seven runners back, they are definitely the team to beat. "We've been building and building and we think this is our year," says fourth year head coach Ralph White. "We know, however, that it's harder to stay on top than it is to get there."

Junior **Sue Castor (Fairport, NY/Fairport)** leads the impressive list of returnees. Last year, Castor won the NCAC individual title, finished fourth at Regionals and 32nd at the NCAA Championships, where Allegheny placed eighth. She will be joined by senior co-captains **Katie Tiedemann (Skaneateles, NY/Skaneateles)** and **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**. Tiedemann was second at the Conference Meet and fifth at Regionals, while Kohl was fifth and 13th, respectively. Both also won individual titles as Allegheny took its first NCAC Outdoor Track & Field championship last spring.

Junior **Alyse Holden (Shoreham, NY/Wading River)** and sophomores **Dee Buckhoff (Schenectady, NY/Guilderland)**, the highest placing freshman in the NCAC last year (sixth), and **Christine Darling (Kent, OH/Roosevelt)** also return. And if that is not enough, junior **Pam Karle (Cottage Grove, MN/Park)**, who missed all of 1989 with a knee injury after being the Gators' top regional performer in 1988, also is expected back.

CASE RESERVE

The Spartans return four of their top five runners and will look to improve upon last season's eighth-place NCAC finish. First-year head coach Kathy Lanese's squad will be led by sophomores **Hester Peirce (Cleveland, OH/Mayfield)**, who was the team's second-leading finisher at last fall's NCAC Championships.

Senior **Christine Auclair (Paris, France/Lyce Francais de New York)** and sophomore **Lisa Hale (Copley, OH/Copley)** also will be counted on. Case Reserve will miss the contributions of junior Sarah Michaelis, who is studying abroad. Michaelis was the team's top runner for most of the 1989 season.

DENISON

Second-year head coach Stan Hughes looks forward to a strong 1990 season as he boasts the Big Red's largest squad ever. Denison placed seventh at last season's NCAC Championships and figure to improve this fall.

Senior **Kate Fechtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** and sophomore **Amanda Hunt (Charlottesville, VA/Western Albemarle)**, the team's top two runners in 1989, return to lead the way. Fechtel was an honorable mention All-Conference honoree after placing 12th at the NCAC Championships a year ago, and both she and Hunt qualified for the NCAA Great Lakes Regional. Much of Hughes' lineup is up for grabs with freshman **Stacie Molnar (Waldo, OH/Kiski Area (PA))** heading an exciting recruiting class that could produce as many as five of the team's top seven runners.

EARLHAM

Fourth-year head coach Pat Thomas is hoping for improvement as four of his top five runners return from last season's team that placed ninth at the NCAC Championships. "We have a very determined group of upperclass runners and expect an exciting season," says Thomas. "I think that we'll see significant improvement from our returnees, but we'll also be looking for a couple of newcomers to run at the top of our lineup."

Junior **Vanessa Hildebrand (Boulder, CO/Boulder)** and sophomores **Katie Galdabini (Glendale, WI/Nicolet)**, **Sara Emmons (Carlisle, MA/Concord)** and **Stephanie Miller (Defiance, OH/Defiance)** return to the Earlham lineup. Top newcomers include freshman **Tiffany Harris (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)**, who was one of the top high school runners in Maryland last year, and junior **Rebecca Silva (Upper Darby, PA/Springside)**.

KENYON

The Ladies finished strongly in 1989, placing second at the NCAC Championships and fourth -- the best of any Ohio team -- at the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional. It was Kenyon's sixth regional appearance in the last seven years, all under the direction of head coach Duane Gomez.

Returning this fall are the Ladies' top three runners from last season, junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)**, senior **Tracey Fatzinger (Bethlehem, PA/Saucon Valley)** and sophomore **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)**. Berghold was a first-team All-Conference selection last year after placing fourth at the NCAC Championships, while Fatzinger and Wilder finished eighth and 14th, respectively, to earn honorable mention honors.

OBERLIN

Second-year Oberlin head coach Tom Mulligan figured to have all seven of his top performers back in the fold this fall as he tries to lead the Yeowomen to the winner's circle for the first time since they won the inaugural NCAC title in 1984. That, however, has not worked out as junior Laura Haldeman has decided to study in Japan for a year and another top runner transferred.

Still, with five talented veterans, Mulligan has the core of what could turn out to be a fine team. Senior captain **Liz Maulice (East Massapequa, NY/Amityville)**, who finished ninth at last year's NCAC Championships, is expected to run in the top spot again this fall after leading Oberlin in all 10 of its meets last season. She has finished in the top 15 at the Conference Meet in each of her three starts. Senior **Naomi Arenson (Loving, NM/Carlsbad)** is slated for the second spot in the lineup, which also will include senior **Swala Abrams (Yellow Springs, OH/Yellow Springs)** and sophomores **Becky Woodward (St. Louis, MO)** and **Martha Brennan (Cleveland Heights, OH/Cleveland Heights)**.

OHIO WESLEYAN

The Bishops had just one bad meet last year. That one meet, however, was the NCAC Championships, where they finished a disappointing fifth. Ohio Wesleyan won two meets last fall and recorded a number of second- and third-place finishes before the Conference Meet. The Bishops also placed a respectable eighth at the NCAA Great Lakes Regional.

With last year's squad returning virtually intact and a promising incoming class, second-year head coach Tracey Hollenbaugh is planning a return to the upper echelon of the NCAC. Sophomore **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/Westlake)**, who earned first team All Conference honors last season with a seventh place finish at the NCAC Championships, and junior **Diana Del Balso (Kirtland, OH/Kirtland)**, who led the way with a 19th place finish at Regionals, are the top returning veterans.

Senior **Cathy Sell (Galena, OH/Olentangy)** and sophomore **Laura Seiffert (Stafford, VA/North Stafford)** also are back after solid seasons, while sophomore **Bonnie Roth (East Brunswick, NJ/East Brunswick)** returns after missing 1989 with an injury. Help also is expected from a number of freshmen, including **Cindy Bailey (Westlake, OH/Westlake)** and **Becky Tobias (North Canton, OH/Hoover)**.

WITTENBERG

An influx of 14 new runners and a successful off-season conditioning program have buoyed the confidence of second-year head coach George Brose as his Tigers set out to improve upon last season's sixth place North Coast finish. After beginning the 1989 season with just three runners, Brose's squad is up to 20 this fall.

Sophomore **Beth Haberstroh (Chatham, NJ/Chatham)** is the leading returnee after placing 16th at last year's NCAC Championships. Haberstroh also qualified for the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional, where she placed 22nd. She will be joined at the top of Wittenberg's lineup by juniors **Melynda Adams (Randolph, NY/Central)** and **Kyong Cha (Wheeling, WV/Park)**, and senior **Suzie Volkert (Northfield, IL/New Trier)**.

WOOSTER

Wooster has always been a solid competitor in the North Coast, finishing below third only once and taking home the crown in 1987. It should be business as usual for the Lady Scots again this fall, with junior **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)** leading second-year head coach Dennis Rice's deep and talented squad.

Aeberli was the team's top finisher in all seven meets last fall, including the NCAC Championships, where she was fourth to earn first team All Conference honors. Seniors **Eva Dodds (Grosse Pointe, MI/University Liggett)** and **Shade Whitesel (Annapolis, MD/Annapolis)**, juniors **Beth Blakemore (Golden, CO/Wheat Ridge)** and **Susan Louis (Kent, OH/Roosevelt)**, and sophomore **Carolyn Kiss (Broadview Heights, OH/Brooksville)** fill in the Wooster lineup behind Aeberli.

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Field Hockey Preview

Ohio Wesleyan University will seek a fourth consecutive North Coast Athletic Conference championship this fall against potent challenges from Kenyon College, The College of Wooster and Denison University. Ohio Wesleyan has been awe inspiring during its three year reign atop the talent laden North Coast, winning titles in the grandest of fashions -- going undefeated in Conference play and earning a bid to three straight NCAA Division III Tournaments.

The Battling Bishops, however, are not the only NCAC team with impressive credentials; field hockey prominence and the North Coast have become almost synonymous terms. Kenyon, Wooster and Denison, who finished the 1989 NCAC season in second, third and fourth places, respectively, combined for a formidable 39-13-1 overall record. Wittenberg University also has a tradition of success and is intent on shedding its freshman-NCAC jitters, while Earlham College and Oberlin College each had good recruiting years and are excited about the impact that should make on their win totals.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's seven teams.

DENISON

The Big Red, who set the pace for field hockey excellence the initial three seasons of North Coast play with one outright title and two co-championships, hope to rebound from a frustrating 1989 season, which saw them improve both their NCAC and overall records (7-4-1; 13-4-1), yet fall to fourth place in the Conference race. Denison may be hampered in 1990 by inexperience, since its squad of 23 includes just two seniors and one junior.

The key for the Big Red may be second-year head coach Sue Stimmel's success in finding replacements for junior goalie Anne Moellr, who opted for overseas study, and the seven attackers lost to graduation, particularly Jen Sherbrooke, last year's NCAC scoring leader. Stimmel will depend heavily on senior attack Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's) and sophomore attack Chrissy Talarico (Spring Lake, NJ/Suffield), both of whom are coming off All-Conference seasons, as well as senior back Kim Schaefer (Birmingham, MI/Cranbrook-Kingswood). Historically, whenever a hole has opened in the Denison lineup, there has always been a gifted recruit to fill it. This year should be no different and the Big Red should challenge.

EARLHAM

Jill Butcher faces a coach's favorite dilemma in her third season at the Quaker helm -- finding enough playing time for her bevy of 14 talented newcomers. The added overall depth and greater number of top notch players should sharpen their competitive edge after a disappointing inaugural NCAC season that saw them go winless in the Conference (0-12; 4-16). Although 1989 MVP and All-NCAC right link Patty Wonnell will not be returning for her second year, sophomore transfer Gina Reif (Fairport, NY/Fairport) has collegiate experience at right inner. The four returning starters are led by junior Lisa Wood (Orrtanna, PA/Gettysburg), an All-NCAC honorable mention back who will switch to link this year.

KENYON

Kenyon has been a team on fire the last two seasons and could very well engulf the Conference title this year if just a few freshmen get hot. The Ladies, who posted only three victories overall and went winless in the NCAC in 1987, ignited the following year to post 10 additional victories. Last year, they proved they were not just a flash in the pan by improving their record to 8 3 1 in the league and 13 4 1 overall. Topping the season off was a first ever bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Inexperience is a major obstacle for veteran coach Sandy Moore's 1990 squad since 25 of the 32 players are freshmen or sophomores. In addition, six premier graduates must be replaced, including All Americas Betsy Jennings, the 1989 NCAC Player of the Year, and Callie Herrick, 1988 NCAC Player of the Year. But last year's recruiting class was outstanding and 15 of the returning Ladies are letterwinners. Leading the offense will be sophomore All-Conference forwards Stacey Smiar (Norwalk, CT/Brooks) and Melissa Wood (Devon, PA/Baldwin), who combined last fall for 29 points and close to one third of Kenyon's goals. Adding offensive firepower will be senior Nancy Cooper (Summit, NJ/Madelra), who returns after a year abroad. At the front of the midfield charge will be senior Margot Morrison (Lake Forest, IL/Phillips), who hopes to regain the All-NCAC honors she won in her first two years before an injury-riddled 1989 season. The starting defense, which will be completely new this fall, will rely heavily on senior Kim Ruiz (Hudson, OH/Hudson), who returns from overseas study, and talented but untested sophomores Kelly Lynn (Alpine, NJ/Englewood) and Paige Shalter (Columbus, OH/Columbus School for Girls). The leading candidate to take over goaltending duties is sophomore Rani Woodard (St. Louis, MO/Clayton). "We will field a competitive team with just our returning players," says Moore. "If any of our freshmen can make the kind of contribution that our freshmen made last year, then we will be even tougher."

OBERLIN

The Yeowomen have no intention of languishing in sixth place in the NCAC after recording the second-most victories (2 10; 6 14) in their history last season. Their optimism rests on the return of several stellar players and the successful recruiting efforts of second-year head coach Lynda Ransdell.

Keying the offense will be senior attack Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside), a two-time All-America who scored 51 points in just two seasons before studying overseas last year. The key returnee on defense is senior goalkeeper Melissa Merrill (Baltimore, MD/Friends), who had the Conference's third-best saves percentage last fall. A talented crop of freshman recruits is led by Jennifer Berman (Louisville, KY/Collegiate), acclaimed as perhaps even more talented than her sister Allison, who graduated from Oberlin last spring after garnering All-NCAC honors for four straight seasons.

NCAC Field Hockey Preview-- 2

OHIO WESLEYAN

If Nan Carney-DeBord ever gives up college coaching, she should consider franchising motivational clinics. Whatever words of inspiration the two-time NCAC Coach of the Year gave her Ohio Wesleyan stickers four seasons ago have certainly proven to be pearls of wisdom. The Bishops three-year statistics are staggering. They have amassed a dazzling 27-0-1 unbeaten string enroute to three titles in the talent-rich NCAC and have been ranked in the NCAA Division III top 10 three times, earning a post season playoff bid each year. In 1989, Ohio Wesleyan (12 0; 17 2) outscored Conference opponents 45-6, yielding only 12 goals in 19 total games. But the Bishops may have to settle for simple victories rather than routs this year, since graduation took a heavy toll. Carney-DeBord lost her entire starting defensive unit, which included two All-Americans and the third-leading scorer in Conference history. However, the greatest blow of all is the unexpected loss of All-NCAC senior link **Cathy Ronan (Rye, NY/Rye)**, who is out for the season with a knee injury. Ronan, with 44 goals and 96 points, is the NCAC's all-time leading scorer.

Spearheading the Ohio Wesleyan offense will be senior All-NCAC attack **Louise Herdershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** and senior forward **Kim Buckwalter (Lititz, PA/Warwick)**. The Bishop midfield returns intact, led by senior link **Ciki Cantrell (Walpole, MA/Walpole)**. Defensively, junior **Michaele Cook (Bealey, OH/Columbus School for Girls)**, who took control at goal last year, will have to withstand a challenge from sophomore **Annie Logan (Dayton, OH/Oakwood)**, a Hiram transfer. An impressive list of newcomers is headed by junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)**, a two-time regional All-America pick who transferred from Roanoke, and freshman **Kerry Buckwalter (Lititz, PA/Warwick)**.

WITTENBERG

Improving its scoring punch will be the key if Wittenberg is to better its fifth place NCAC finish of a year ago and reclaim its usual position as a powerful program after a disappointing 1989 season, which saw the Tigers finish at 11-11 overall and 4-8 in North Coast play. Ninth-year head coach Linda Arena, whose teams have compiled a 91-49-8 record, believes the experience and skills of her nine returning starters will unlock the door to a winning season, since all but four of last year's games were decided by two goals or less and nine contests were one-goal defeats. On the downside, Wittenberg must leave the frying pan of NCAC competition for the fire of such non-conference foes as Michigan champion Calvin, Indiana champion Del'auw, and nationally ranked Lynchburg, Sweet Briar and Rochester.

The Tigers will be led by a trio of seniors: center halfback **Theresa Brant (Elgin, IL/Elgin Academy)**, Wittenberg's MVP and interception leader last fall; forward **Missy Gahm (Louisville, KY/Sacred Heart)**, who led the 1989 attack with 13 goals and 30 points; and goalie **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)**, who recorded seven shutouts and a .906 saves percentage (second-best in the Conference). Brant and Baier both won regional All-America and All-Conference laurels. All-NCAC defenders **Lori Ogurkis (Dallas, PA/Dallas)**, a senior sweep, and **Lisa McNally (Wayne, PA/Radnor)**, a junior link, also will be counted on heavily.

WOOSTER

Last year at this time, analysts were wondering if new coach Brenda Meese would be able to fill the shoes of successful veteran mentor Sheila Noonan, who had guided the Lady Scots to NCAC co-championships in 1984 and 1986. Well, Meese and Noonan seem to wear the same size shoe. Although the Lady Scots fell from a second-place tie in 1988 to third place last year, they improved both their league and overall records (8-4; 13-5). This fall, Meese has her team's sights set on challenging for both the Conference crown and a bid to NCAA Tournament, thus continuing the tradition of Wooster field hockey excellence that has seen the Lady Scots amass an enviable 201-86-22 slate the past 17 seasons and advance to the NCAA tournament four times in the last seven years.

Leading Wooster toward these goals will be junior All-NCAC forward **Aimee Zedlitz (Oklahoma City, OK/Casady)**, who, after just two seasons, is already the Lady Scots' third-leading career scorer. Zedlitz tallied 15 goals and nine assists last year. Also returning to the attack will be junior All-NCAC midfielder **Clara Mitchell (Chadds Ford, PA/Kennett)**. Defensively, senior **Pam Metz (Dayton, OH/Oakwood)** returns for her final season in goal with quality credentials from 1989—a .890 saves percentage and two shutouts. Two former Lady Scot standouts will be returning after a year's absence. Senior midfielder **Anne Daugherty (Tulsa, OK/Holland Hall)**, an All-NCAC selection as a freshman, and senior sweep **Maria Theophilis (Jamaica Plains, MA/Winsor)**, a starter her sophomore year.

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Men's Soccer Preview

Last fall, The College of Wooster proved to the collegiate sports world just how easy it is to best Ohio Wesleyan University, the winningest NCAA soccer team, any division, of the 1980s! All you have to do to wrest the North Coast Athletic Conference title from the Bishops is go undefeated in league play; to finish ahead of them in the NCAA Division III rankings, merely shut out your opponents in two thirds of your victories; and to do both, throw in the talents of three-time All-America and three-time NCAC Offensive Player of the Year Ian Banda. Wooster hopes to use the same recipe this year to defend its 1989 North Coast championship, but, with several key graduation losses, the Scots may have trouble stopping Ohio Wesleyan from taking its fifth Conference crown in seven years. The Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America ranks Ohio Wesleyan second and Wooster eighth in its preseason poll.

Virtually any team, however, could win it all in the highly competitive North Coast. Seven of the nine squads posted winning marks last fall and the NCAC's non-conference record was an awesome 62-26-12 (.680). Wittenberg University, which finished in fifth place in its inaugural NCAC season, could be a contender now that it has had a year to get used to the competition day in and day out. The Tigers compiled a strong overall record of 12-4-2 last year, suffering all their losses to Conference opponents. Kenyon College and Oberlin College, who tied for third in 1989, should be in the thick of the race again this fall. Earlham College, which has recorded 10 or more victories for six consecutive seasons, looks strong again in 1990 and Allegheny College is riding the crest of a late 1989 surge.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's nine teams.

ALLEGHENY

The Gators hope the momentum from a late season upswing which saw them win eight of their last 10 games will carry them into the upper division of the NCAC. "We've been knocking on the door a long time," laments eighth-year head coach Marty Goldberg. "But in this Conference, you need to play at the absolute highest level for 90 minutes."

Allegheny, which won 10 or more for the third consecutive year, finished 1989 at 11-9 overall but posted only a 3-5 mark in North Coast play. Goldberg's Gators return 18 letterwinners, including nine of their top 11 scorers. Leading the assault will be three All-NCAC performers: sophomore midfielder **Rick Ofsanko (Jupiter, FL/Moon(PA))**, the team's second-leading scorer last fall; junior forward **Scott Falso (Cazenovia, NY/Berkshire)**; and senior midfielder **Mario Parreaguirre (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)**. Two freshmen expected to make an immediate impact are midfielder **Ziv Arie (Kiriath-Ono, Israel/Kiriath-Ono)**, who has experience in rugged European and Israeli leagues, and All-Maine forward **Lance Feeley (Yarmouth, ME/North Yarmouth)**.

CASE RESERVE

Case Reserve knows its soccer fortunes have no place to go but up. The Spartans of long-time head coach Jerry Harbak would like to forget about last year, when they were winless in the NCAC, won only two matches overall, suffered nine shutouts and tallied just 13 goals in 17 games. Prospects do look brighter this season, with five of last year's top eight scorers returning, including junior midfielder **Erik Nasarenko (Woodland Hills, CA/Lincoln)** and junior forward **Marc Tattar (Avon Lake, OH/Avon Lake)**. Case Reserve also will be boosted by the influx of more than 20 freshmen, many of whom will step in and contribute immediately.

DENISON

"Reserved optimism" describes the attitude of new head coach Mike Caravana, who replaces 25-year veteran Ted Barclay, toward Denison's 1990 prospects. The Big Red, buoyed by tradition (being the only team other than Wooster or Ohio Wesleyan to wear an NCAC crown) and by a solid group of returnees, are determined to improve upon last season's disappointing 5-13-3 overall record and 1-6-1 (eighth place) Conference mark. All-NCAC senior forward **Jaun Douma (Kalamazoo, MI/Central)** will again lead the offense. Goaltending should be an area of strength this fall as senior **Chris Dealy (Chevy Chase, MD/Bethesda-Chevy Chase)** returns for his third year in the cage.

EARLHAM

Graduation losses and off-season injuries have dealt 10th-year Earlham head coach Roy Messer the task of rebuilding for 1990. The Quakers, who have enjoyed six straight ten win seasons, have lost much of the scoring punch from last year's team that went 10-6-2 overall and 3-4-1 for a sixth-place debut in the competitive North Coast. First-team All-NCAC forward John Cell, holder of Earlham's career scoring record, has graduated, while senior midfielders Harold Harbert and Mark Wolda have been sidelined for the season with injuries. Junior goalie **Jay Yoo (Hudson, OH/Western Reserve)** and All-Conference junior sweeper **Adam Lingo (Chicago, IL/Morgan Park)** will anchor the defense. The most challenging obstacle for the Quakers may well be their schedule, rated second-toughest in the Great Lakes Region.

KENYON

Kenyon returns all five of its top scorers from the 1989 squad that set a school record for most wins in a season while compiling an impressive 12-4-2 mark. The Lords were equally tough in the North Coast, finishing in a third place tie with Oberlin at 5-3. Top returnee for head coach Mike Pilger's kickers is senior back **Joe Youngblood (Cincinnati, OH/St. Xavier)**, the 1989 NCAC Defensive Player of the Year. The Kenyon attack will be led by sophomore forward **Michael Donovan (Sylvania, OH/St. John's)** and junior midfielder **Kevin Mills (Langley, England/Smethwick Hall)**, each of whom scored 15 points last fall to merit All-NCAC and All-Mideast honors.

OBERLIN

Oberlin has become a permanent fixture among the top teams in the North Coast, having compiled an impressive 35-12-4 record the past three years under veteran head coach Fred Shults. The Yeomen, who were 11-5-2 overall and 5-3 (third-place tie) in the NCAC last year, have some holes to fill if they are going to challenge again this fall.

NCAC Men's Soccer Preview -- 2

Five of Oberlin's seven All-Conference performers have been lost to graduation, leaving leadership roles to senior striker **Matt Filner (Kensington, MD/Bethesda-Chevy Chase)**, who has led the team in scoring in each of the last three years and was the third-ranked NCAC scorer in 1989, and senior fullbacks **John Caspersen (Minneapolis, MN/South)** and **Andrei Straumanis (Winter Park, FL/Western Reserve (OH))**.

OHIO WESLEYAN

The Bishops slipped into second place in the NCAC with a 6-2 slate last fall, but they continued their national prominence by racking up a 19-2-1 overall record and receiving an unprecedented 12th consecutive bid to the NCAA Division III Playoffs, where they won the Great Lakes Regional title and advanced to the quarterfinals only to fall to eventual national champion Elizabethtown on penalty kicks. Ohio Wesleyan was the winningest NCAA soccer team, any division, in the 1980s with an astounding 171-33-15 (.815) record. In his 13 years as head coach, Jay Martin has led the Bishops to a spectacular 205-45-22 (.794) mark.

Martin's 1990 squad returns 18 of 20 lettermen and features a recruiting class which the coach terms "potentially my best ever", making them favorites to reclaim the NCAC crown from Wooster. Ohio Wesleyan will unveil a new look up front this season, playing two forwards and four midfielders. The front line will be led by junior forward **Andy Kessinger (Westerville, OH/DeSales)**, who garnered All-NCAC, All-Ohio and All-Mideast honors in 1989. Freshman **Mike Pepe (Canfield, OH/Canfield)**, a two time high school All America and Ohio Player of the Year, will also bolster the attack. The midfield should again be a strength, especially with the addition of senior All NCAC and All-America former-forward **Scott Gillanders (Peachtree City, GA/McIntosh)**, who led the team in scoring for the second straight season and ranked as the second leading scorer in the Conference last year. The midfield also returns All-NCAC and All-Mideast senior **Matt Schrader (Huntington, NY/Cold Spring Harbor)**.

The Bishop defense, which allowed just 11 goals in 22 games last fall (and never more than one goal in a game), returns intact, led by senior All Conference back **Jeff Weeman (Peachtree City, GA/McIntosh)**. All NCAC junior **Reed Welch (Greeley, CO/Central)** is back in goal after leading the circuit in goals-against average (0.45) and posting 10 shutouts in 1989.

WITTENBERG

Wittenberg soccer fans may find it easier to think of 1990 not as the start of a new decade, but rather as the beginning of the post-Goodrich era. Gone from the Tiger playing fields is two-time All-America midfielder Paul Goodrich, who became the first athlete in school history to be named first team all league in each of his four seasons.

Unfortunately for head coach Steve Dawson, Goodrich is not the only player lost from last year's record-setting 12-4-2 team that closed its first NCAC season in fifth place with a 4-4 ledger. Gone are seven starters, including standout goalie Brian Selfert. Easing the Tigers' transition into this new era will be senior forward **Kris Hazard (Simsbury, CT/Avon Old Farms)**, junior back **Jeff Jameson (Sherborn, MA/Dover-Sherborn)**, junior midfielder **Randy Balconi (Plymouth, MI/Salem)**, junior forward **Brian Gowney (Upper Nyack, NY/Nyack)** and junior second team All NCAC fullback **Sean Burke (Rochester, NY/Brighton)**.

WOOSTER

Wooster is intent on duplicating its impressive 1989 achievements -- dethroning national powerhouse Ohio Wesleyan for its first NCAC championship, an undefeated Conference season, a dominating 15-3-2 overall record, an NCAA postseason tournament invitation, and a #4 final NCAA Division III ranking. Whew! Veteran head coach Bob Nye, the NCAC's Coach of the Year in 1989, may have to devise some new strategies, however, since several key players have been lost to graduation, including All-NCAC goalie Pete Mack and All-NCAC fullback Kirk Neuteiter, who helped produce a team-record 10 shutouts while surrendering an average of less than one goal per game last fall.

The Scot attack should be explosive again this year with the return of its top three scorers, led by "All-World" senior forward **Ian Banda (Blantyre, Malawi/Phwezi)**. Banda is a three-time All-America and has been named NCAC Offensive Player of the Year in each of his three seasons. He led the Conference in scoring last year with 19 goals after scoring a team record 22 in 1988. Banda is joined on the front line by fellow countryman **Mphatso Namwali (Blantyre, Malawi/Bwaila)**, who garnered All-NCAC honors in his freshman season after scoring 10 goals and passing for six assists. Also potent on the line is last year's third-leading scorer, second-team All-Conference sophomore **Rio Morgan (New York, NY/Hyde)**. The Wooster defense will be anchored by senior **Mark Hoffman (Ashland, OR/Ashland)**, junior **Pete Falcone (Utica, NY/Berkshire)** and junior **Erik Hicks (Newark, NY/Senior)**.

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Women's Soccer Preview

All good things must come to an end and this may well be the year that Allegheny College's five-year stranglehold on the North Coast Athletic Conference crown is broken. At the very least, Allegheny will have to withstand a serious threat from 1989 NCAC co-champion Ohio Wesleyan University, which is poised to seize sole possession of the championship this fall. Ohio Wesleyan is ranked 10th and Allegheny 19th nationally in the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America's NCAA Division III preseason poll.

Six of the nine North Coast teams had winning seasons in 1989, and this year should be even more competitive, with only 13 of the 44 All Conference players lost to graduation. Denison University and Wittenberg University, who tied for third place last fall, have the look of frontrunners again, and a watchful eye should be kept on Oberlin College, which could surge upward from its fifth place finish of a year ago. The College of Wooster and Kenyon College also appear solid and greater depth, experience and stability should translate into more victories for both Case Western Reserve University and Earlham College.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's nine teams.

ALLEGHENY

The Gators have won five consecutive NCAC championships, with all but last season's being outright, compiling an awesome 38 2 4 (.909) Conference record in that span. Allegheny was tripped up by Denison on the final day of the 1989 season for its first North Coast setback since a mid-season 1985 loss to the pesky Big Red -- a string of 35 games, the longest unbeaten streak in any NCAC sport. Head coach John Wilcher has led the Gators to a record of 70-10 6 (.768) in his five years at the reins, including a 14-5-1 mark last fall. Wilcher's teams have been ranked 12th, 11th and 18th in Division III over the past three seasons, respectively.

This fall, Allegheny will be hurt by the graduation loss of four first team All NCAC performers. The Gators do have 14 returning letterwinners, however, including first team All-Conference honorees **Deb Klinefelter** (Pittsburgh, PA/Shaler Area), a senior goalie, and **Jen Vescio** (Sewickley, PA/Quaker Valley), a junior forward who is third on the school's all-time scoring list. Another top returnee is sophomore forward **Julie Kuhar** (Erie, PA/Harborcreek), who tallied 20 points last year and is hailed as a possible successor to All-America Denise Petrossi, the Gators' career scoring with 115 points. Wilcher will look to junior midfielders **Allison Glover** (North Adams, MA/Cushing) and **Jen Russell** (Cherlerol, PA/Cherlerol), as well as **Beth Petrossi** (Fullerton, CA/Troy), a 24 year old freshman from the Coast Guard and sister of former star Denise, to fortify an inexperienced defense.

CASE RESERVE

Second-year head coach Kim Shaw welcomes back nine booters from last year's squad plus two previous letterwinners who sat out last season, but she must replace the graduated 1989 NCAC Defensive Player of the Year, Sheila McElroy. The Spartans are gunning for an improved season after a disappointing showing last fall, which saw them win only one Conference contest and post an overall record of 5-10-1.

Top returnees include second-team All-NCAC midfielder **Michelle Sabick** (Beavercreek, OH/Carroll), a junior, and sophomore midfielder **Sue Waniewski** (Ridgefield, Ct/Ridgefield), as well as junior keeper **Michelle Kantor** (Dayton, OH/Oakwood). In addition, seniors **Carol Boos** (Stow, OH/Our Lady of Mercy), who won 1988 All-NCAC honors, and **Michelle Cayouette** (South Euclid, OH/Wheaton (IL)) return to the roster after a one-year hiatus. Freshman midfielder **Nancy Moon** (Schenectady, NY/Niskayuna) heads a promising group of newcomers.

DENISON

Denison is big on the "onlys" -- being the only team other than Allegheny to cop an outright North Coast championship (in 1984) and the only NCAC booters to ever beat the Gators. But the Big Red would rather be known as a 10-year old soccer power which has never had a losing season. First-year head coach Jon Lipsitz expects to keep that winning tradition alive this fall with a roster loaded with young talent.

Melissa Honohan (Valley Forge, PA/Loy Norrix (MI)), a three-year starter and a second team All Conference selection as a forward last fall, is the lone senior returning to the squad that finished 1989 with an 11-7 overall record and tied with Wittenberg for third place in the NCAC with a 5-3 mark. Junior **Julie Martin** (Cincinnati, OH/Mother McAuley), a fullback who won All-NCAC and All-Ohio honors in 1989, will once again key the Big Red defense. Sophomore forward **Michelle Kaup** (Cincinnati, OH/Mother McAuley), the team's leading scorer last season, and sophomore goaltender **Jane Wildman** (Amarillo, TX/Cape Elizabeth (ME)) also will be counted on heavily.

EARLHAM

The Quakers enter their third season of varsity soccer with a bumper crop of 26 players, including 10 letterwinners intent on breaking into the win column. Second-year head coach Amy Freeman's roster is highlighted by the return of senior backs **Betsy Shaw** (Stone Mountain, GA/Paidera) and **Amy Hunter** (Poughkeepsie, NY/Oakwood Friends), who lead a determined group of survivors from Earlham's fledgling years. Shaw was an All-NCAC selection last fall and Hunter was the team's MVP in 1988 before spending last year studying abroad.

KENYON

The Ladies' fortunes are on the upswing, coming off a season which saw them post their second-best overall record of 8-9-2 and hoist themselves out of the Conference basement into seventh place with a 2-5-1 mark. Whether or not second-year head coach Paul Wardlaw's charges will be able to improve will depend upon how quickly the youngsters develop, for 15 of the 23 Kenyon players are freshmen. One bright spot for Wardlaw is that all of the eight returnees are letterwinners. The biggest loss is that of record setting All NCAC goalie **Mea Fischells**. The Ladies return their second-leading scorer from last season in senior forward **Jennifer Vanderburgh** (Columbia, MD/Centennial), as well as 1989 MVP and All-NCAC senior midfielder **April Robison** (Kalamazoo, MI/Central).

NCAC Women's Soccer Preview -- 2

OBERLIN

Oberlin may be the North Coast's sleeper this fall, ready to dive into the title fracas with a talented corps seasoned under the tutelage of fourth-year head coach Jack Heim, the 1989 NCAC Coach of the Year. The Yeowomen have steadily improved in each of the last three seasons and return their top four scorers and most of the starters from the 1989 team that finished 10-6-2 overall and in fifth place in the NCAC with a 4-3-1 mark. Three-time All-NCAC senior forward **Alice Hauschka (Seattle, WA/Garfield)**, the school's record holder in every offensive category, will spearhead the attack. She will be joined up front by senior forwards **Julie Ness (Honeoye Falls, NY/Honeoye Falls-Lima)** and **Amy Hosig (Old Lyme, CT/Lyme-Old Lyme)**, senior midfielder **Lynn Gardner (Portola Valley, CA/Menlo-Atherton)** and sophomore midfielder **Sheila Hallinan (Portland, OR/St. Mary's)**. Sophomore back **Erin Klett (Saxtons River, VT/Bellows Falls)** will anchor the defense, while goaltending duties will once again be shared by senior **Michaela Sloan (Evergreen, CO/C.M.R.S.)** and sophomore **Margaret Gardinier (Madison, NJ/Madison)**.

OHIO WESLEYAN

Losing just one player from last season's 13-4-1 NCAC co-champions gives fourth-year head coach Magie Shade's Bishops a running start in their drive toward sole Conference bragging rights. Ohio Wesleyan is as deep as the seven seas this season, returning an enviable eight All-NCAC performers, and welcoming back from overseas study senior **Mindy Parrish (Grove City, OH/Grove City)**, who was the school's all-time leading scorer going into last season. The remainder of the lineup is led by 1989 North Coast Offensive Player of the Year **Stacie Rose (Columbus, OH/DeSales)**, a junior midfielder who broke Parrish's career scoring mark last fall.

The list of returnees goes on, including sophomore forward **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Consewogue)**, who rewrote the Bishop record book last fall by scoring 21 goals and leading the NCAC in scoring with 46 points. Also back are seniors **Leigh Sears (Dublin, OH/Dublin)** and **Becky Furth (Concord, MA/Concord Carlisle)**, juniors **Shellee Lamle (Rome, NY/Catholic)**, **Julie Coss (Westerville, OH/North)** and **Shannon Dunn (Wyoming, OH/Wyoming)**, and sophomore **Angie Mouch (Wyoming, OH/Wyoming)** -- all of whom earned some type of All-Conference recognition a year ago.

WITTENBERG

New coach Sheila Lingenfelter inherits a Wittenberg team that returns 11 letterwinners, including the top five scorers, from a squad that went 9 7 1 overall in 1989 and finished its initial season of NCAC competition in a third place tie with Denison at 5-3. Headlining the returnees is All-NCAC and Ohio Player of the Year **Suzanne Sauers (Cincinnati, OH/Turpin)**, who had an electrifying 1989 season. In her initial year as a Tiger after transferring from Brown, Sauers, a senior forward, was second in the Conference in scoring with 14 goals and five assists for an average of 1.9 points per game.

Joining up Sauers on the front line will be high scoring senior **Missy Must (Dayton, OH/ Centerville)**, sophomore **Andi Cance (Mississauga, Ontario/Deerfield (IL))** and junior **Heather Hague (Pittsford, NY/Pittsford)**. Seniors **Jennifer Johnson (Newington, CT/Newington)** and **Sharon Remy (Westerville, OH/Worthington)** return to bolster the midfield and defensive units, respectively. Both received All-NCAC recognition a year ago, as did junior back **Caroline Sands (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)**. Junior **Courtney DeSelm (Cambridge, OH/Glenn)**, a converted midfielder, is expected to take over the goaltending duties.

WOOSTER

After back-to-back winning seasons, head coach Nick Cowell's Lady Scots are gearing up for an assault on the upper reaches of the NCAC. The 1990 squad has lost only one booter from last fall's team that attained a 10-6-2 overall record and went 3-4-1 for sixth place in the Conference. Junior halfback **Dot Verbrugge (Grand Rapids, MI/Grand Rapids Christian)** hopes to pick up where she left off last season when a broken collarbone sidelined her for the season after she had scored five goals in Wooster's first seven games. She will be joined up front by high-scoring senior halfbacks **Mary Romestant (Richfield, OH/Revere)** and **Nancy Christman (Worthington, OH/Worthington)**. In addition, Wooster's all time leading scorer, senior forward **Cathie Docherty (Pittsburgh, PA/Baldwin)** returns after a sub-par year. Strong contributions also are expected from sophomore forward **Karyn Powers (Penfield, NY/Pennfield)**, junior fullback **Lisa Meurer (Westwood, MA/Noble & Greenough)** and freshman forward **Kerri Makar (Rocky River, OH/Rocky River)**, who has sparked in the preseason.

North Coast Athletic Conference 1990 Volleyball Preview

Allegheny College will be looking for an unprecedented third consecutive (and fourth overall) North Coast Athletic Conference volleyball championship this fall. Kenyon College won back-to-back titles in 1986 and 1987, only to have Allegheny snap that streak and start one of its own.

In order to "threepeat", the Gators will have to fend off the challenges of perennial threat Kenyon as well as those of improving squads throughout the balance of the Conference. Denison University, Earlham College, Oberlin College and The College of Wooster, which is the only team other than Allegheny and Kenyon to win an NCAC volleyball championship (1985), would appear to be the top threats.

Following is a capsule outlook on each of the NCAC's nine teams.

ALLEGHENY

After winning NCAC championships in 1988 and 1989, what does Allegheny have in store for the 1990 season? Naturally, fifth year head coach Bridget Sheehan covets a third straight Conference title, which would be the Gators' fourth in the past six years, but the team has other aspirations, too.

"Winning the NCAC, of course, is one of our major goals," says Sheehan, the East Region All America chairperson for the American Volleyball Coaches Association. "Of course, we also would like to do well in the regional rankings, and working to strengthen our technique and fundamentals could help us in that area."

Sheehan will be working with a young roster which has no seniors and five juniors among 14 players. Three seniors are gone from last year's 36-13 squad, including second team All NCAC performer Julie Bradley. Juniors **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)** and **Renea Surrena (Grove City, PA/Grove City)** will be expected to set the pace. Dietz, a dominating 6'1" middle hitter, was the NCAC Player of the Year last season. An All-East Region selection as well, she averaged 3.0 kills per game and ranked fifth nationally in blocking with 198 solos and 36 assists. Surrena, meanwhile, stepped into the lineup for the first time and led the Conference in assists with an average of 9.2 per game. Juniors **Kristen McLaren (Girard, PA/Villa Maria)** and **Stacy Gerko (Johnstown, PA/Richland)** are among the leading contenders to join Dietz up front, while junior **Lisa Eves (Meadville, PA/Meadville)** and sophomore **Cary Gralnik (Kenmore, NY/West)** should step in and contribute along the back row.

CASE RESERVE

Seven letterwinners return for head coach Mina Moore, who is beginning her 17th season in charge of the Case Reserve program. The Spartans struggled with inexperience and a lack of depth in 1989, compiling an overall record of 1-31 and tying for eighth at the NCAC Championships.

One of Moore's main objectives will be to find a replacement for four-year letterwinner Diana Thorsen, who has graduated after leading the team in six categories last season. Top returnees to this year's squad include juniors **Lisa Encarnacion (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)**, **Elise Millie (Oak Harbor, OH/Oak Harbor)** and **Pam Wearsch (Avon, OH/Avon)**, who finished second, third and fourth on the team in hitting percentage last season.

DENISON

With just one senior and five returning letterwinners, second-year head coach Sara Lee has a number of holes to fill if Denison is going to continue improving and challenge Allegheny and Kenyon at the top of the North Coast. Last year, the Big Red finished fourth at the NCAC Championships and posted an overall record of 21-17 -- the first 20-win season in school history.

Senior hitter **Katy Pongonis (Cincinnati, OH/McNicholas)** is the leading returnee, having earned first-team All Conference recognition last year when she was among the NCAC leaders in kills (3.2 per game). Other top performers include junior setter **Anne Carek (Bowling Green, OH/Bowling Green)**, who was third in the Conference last season with an average of 7.5 assists per game, and junior hitter **Mary Cervino (Akron, OH/St. Vincent St. Mary)**, who was the team's defensive MVP.

EARLHAM

Earlham returns the nucleus of last year's team, which compiled an overall record of 27-14 -- the best mark in school history. Fourth-year head coach Krista Antic welcomes back seven regulars, including first-team All-NCAC hitter **Jodie Bauman (Columbus, OH/Bexley)**. Bauman, a junior, led the Conference with an average of 3.4 kills per game last year and her total of 332 kills was a school record.

"The key for us is how much our returning players improve, especially the sophomore class," says Antic, who saw her 1989 squad enter the NCAC Championships as the third seed only to drop two matches in a row and finish in a tie for eighth. "Our young players performed well most of last season, but our intensity dropped at the Tournament."

Other experienced returnees include sophomore hitters **Tracie Dubois (Blanchester, OH/Blanchester)**, **Dawn Landez (Medaryville, IN/West Central)** and **Nikki Welch (Mahomet, IL/Mahomet-Seymour)**, sophomore setter **Amanda Petyko (Cedar Lake, IN/Crown Point)**, junior back row specialist **Patrice Jimerson (West Lafayette, IN/West Lafayette)** and junior setter **Becky Shelton (Rushville, IN/Rushville)**.

KENYON

Head coach Nancy Roberts will greet 10 letterwinners from last year's 28-15 squad as she begins her first season at Kenyon. The Ladies, who have placed second at the NCAC Championships in each of the last two years after winning back-to-back titles in 1986 and 1987, will be led by senior hitter **Judy Hruska (Rocky River, OH/Lakewood)**. Hruska was the team's Most Valuable Player last fall after finishing second in all of Division III with an average of 5.0 digs per game. She also was sixth nationally in blocking (1.9 per game) and among the leaders in the North Coast in kills (3.3 per game).

Other key returnees to the veteran squad include senior hitter **Chelsea Andrus (Harrisburg, IL/Harrisburg)**,

senior setter **Jennifer Hirsh (Studio City, CA/Westlake)** and senior back row specialist **Jane Gerace (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)**.

OBERLIN

In 1989, Oberlin put together its best season in nine years with an overall record of 13-24. Seventh-year head coach Pat Milkovich expected the Yeowomen to shine even brighter in 1990 with a nucleus of experienced players leading the team. Milkovich's expectations for a record-breaking season have been tempered somewhat since learning that three of her top returning players decided to study abroad and will not be available this fall. Gone from last year's squad are Pam Breitbell, a second team All NCAC pick, Joyce Stickney and Naomi Zubin. Another blow is the graduation loss of first-team All-Conference setter Angel Motel.

Still, Milkovich has reason to believe that her squad can improve upon last season's finish in the NCAC Championships -- a tie for fifth. Leading returnees include versatile senior **Lisa Soohoo (Cambridge, MA/Cambridge-Ringe)**, junior hitter **Ansje Miller (Durham, NC/Jordan)** and sophomore hitter **Diana Guan (San Jose, CA/Prospect)**. Soohoo, who is a capable hitter and setter, was Oberlin's most consistent defensive player last season, leading the team in digs with an average of 2.7 per game. Miller and Guan, meanwhile, are the team's most talented and experienced offensive players. Freshman hitter/blocker **Megan Schulte (Upland, CA/Upland)** leads a talented recruiting class that will have to make an impact if the Yeowomen are to improve.

OHIO WESLEYAN

Veteran head coach Mary Parker isn't pulling any punches concerning her 1990 team. After all, height isn't a Bishop strong point this season, with the tallest players checking in at 5'9". Experience isn't a dominating factor, either, with just six letterwinners returning -- three of them sophomores.

So why does Parker think the squad can top last year's 12-23 record, which included a seventh-place finish at the NCAC Championships? "We don't have as much height as in the past, but we have a lot more quickness, and I think a lot more desire," she says. "We'll be very young no matter what, but floor defense and setting should be strengths."

Leading the list of returnees is the team's only senior, back row specialist **Karen Berger (West Chester, OH/Lakota)**. Junior setters **Kim Pfahler (Bloomfield, OH/Bucyrus Wynford)** and **Penny Sorrell (Lancaster, OH/Lancaster)** also return, as do sophomore utility players **Chanda Ewing (Ashland, OH/Ashland)**, **Marci Kessinger (Westerville, OH/Columbus DeSales)** and **Ellen Kick (Loudonville, OH/Loudonville)**.

WITTENBERG

Cynthia Holliday enters her second season as head coach at Wittenberg hoping to improve upon the Tigers' finish at the 1989 NCAC Championships -- a tie for fifth. Holliday, the North Coast Coach of the Year while at Denison in 1988, must replace three starters this fall, including second-team All-Conference performer Diane Schult.

Senior setter **Yvonne Wilson (Columbus, OH/Watterson)** and junior hitters **Holly Everhart (Springfield, OH/Northwestern)** and **Megan Hiller (Evanston, IL/Evanston Township)** will be counted on to lead the way. Holliday also will lean heavily on a number of freshmen as well as reserve players from a year ago.

WOOSTER

As an athlete, Barb Davis had little trouble finding a way to win. Now, as the newly appointed volleyball coach at Wooster, Davis hopes her formula for success will produce similar results.

Davis, an All-NCAC performer in basketball and an All-America in track, played only one year of volleyball as a student athlete at Wooster. Still, she is confident that she can help the Lady Scots improve upon their 16-27 overall record of a year ago. Much of Davis' confidence comes from the fact that Wooster returns all but three players from last year's squad which came together at the end of the season to place third at the NCAC Championships. It was the Lady Scots' best finish since 1984, when they won the title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament on the strength of a remarkable 40-7 overall record.

Wooster's top player will be senior hitter **Carolyn Bare (Chagrin Falls, OH/Chagrin Falls)**, last year's team leader in kills with 331. The other senior is middle hitter **Germaine Temple (Santa Fe, NM/Prep)**, who totaled 108 kills in 1989 despite being plagued by an ankle injury for much of the season. If consistent, Bare and Temple could be one of the top offensive combinations in the Conference. Other key returnees include sophomore setters **Jennifer Kuhns (Columbus, OH/Hartley)** and **Lisa Clark (Millersburg, OH/West Holmes)**, who combined for 677 assists last year, and junior back row specialists **Cathy Schellhammer (Aurora, OH/Aurora)** and **Andrea Sweazy (Stoutsville, OH/Amanda-Clearcreek)**.

**DEFENDING NCAC CO-CHAMPS KENYON, OHIO WESLEYAN
START STRONG; DENISON IS 2-0; OBERLIN AND WOOSTER
HOST NCAC OPENERS NEXT SATURDAY**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Kenyon College and Ohio Wesleyan University, defending co champions of the North Coast Athletic Conference, have started the NCAC's seventh football season according to expectations -- with dominating performances.

Kenyon, with an early season start, is now 2-0 after high powered wins against non conference foes, including last Saturday's 37-20 win over Otterbein College. Ohio Wesleyan proved why it was an overwhelming pick to win the NCAC by shutting out Hiram, 27-0.

In other early action, Denison University is now 2-0 following victories over impressive non-conference opponents. Despite no returning starters on the offensive line, Coach Keith Piper's young squad has racked up a league-leading 301 yards rushing average over two games. In their opener the Bishops beat a solid Brockport State (NY) squad and last Saturday beat Albion College, the Michigan Intercollegiate Association defending co champion, 28-18.

Oberlin College presented its first-year coach, Larry Story, with his first collegiate win, as the Yeomen won their opener, 24-14, against Thiel College.

NCAC GAMES THIS WEEK: Two NCAC games are on tap for next week, involving four NCAC squads, while the five other conference teams continue with non-league action. Allegheny College, which opened with a 30-30 tie to Juniata, travels to Oberlin. This game will be a match of the NCAC two rookie head coaches, as Ken O'Keefe will be looking for his first win at the Allegheny helm, against the undefeated (1-0) Larry Story at Oberlin. Two NCAC coaches looking for their first win this season will come together as The College of Wooster and coach Bob Tucker host Wittenberg University and coach Doug Nelbuhr. Wooster was stunned by Mt. Union 48-0, while Wittenberg was blanked by old rival Baldwin-Wallace 24-0.

NCAC ROUNDUP, NOTES: Rounding out the first full Saturday of NCAC football action were losses by Case Western Reserve University and Earlham College, that were much closer than they appeared. Despite some unfortunate special team breakdowns, the CWRU Spartans played the University of Rochester (a 1989 NCAA playoff team) very close, despite the 34-19 final score. A real find for the Spartans may be freshman quarterback Brett Ramsey (Wadsworth, OH), who compiled 188 passing yards. However, Earlham College sophomore quarterback John Wortham (Dayton, OH/Meadowdale) was the top story in a loss Saturday. While dropping a one pointer (Taylor 34, Earlham 33), Wortham set an Earlham record by throwing for 383 yards passing on the day with two TD passes. And despite protestations to the contrary, the Denison running game may be ready for prime time again. Sophomore tailback Jason Cooperrider (Granville, OH/Utica) is back for the Big Red and has amassed 374 yards and five TDs rushing in only two games for an impact 187-yard average per game.

**DENISON, KENYON AND WOOSTER OFF TO UNBEATEN STARTS;
NORTH COAST 25-8-1 IN NON-CONFERENCE ACTION**

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference has gotten off to a roaring start in 1990, posting a 25-8-1 (.750) record against non-conference competition. Eight teams are above .500 and three -- Denison University, Kenyon College and The College of Wooster -- are unbeaten and untied.

Wooster, defending NCAC champions and the eighth-ranked team in Division III, is off to a 4-0 start this fall after a fine 15-3-2 season in 1989. The Scots won two games last week, 5-0 over Baldwin-Wallace and 7-1 over Ohio Northern. Denison also is off to a 4-0 start, including a championship in Marietta's Pioneer Classic, Sept. 7-8. The Big Red dropped the hosts 4-0 in the opener and came back to edge NCAC rival Wittenberg University, 1-0, in the title match. It was the seventh consecutive season that they had taken the title in the prestigious season opening tournament.

Runners-up in the photo finish were Kohl's Gator teammates **Dee Buckhoff (Schenectady, NY/Guilderland)**, a sophomore, and **Serena Fraser (Williamsville, NY/Clerence)**, a freshman.

In other women's action, Kenyon defeated Denison in a dual meet, 23-38. The Ladies, who placed seven runners among the top ten, were paced by junior medalist **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** at 19:05. Denison senior **Kate Fechtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** was 30 seconds behind for second. Wooster junior **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)** led the Lady Scots to a 22-34 win over Oberlin. Elsewhere, Case Reserve ran third at its own invitational; Earlham and Wittenberg finished fifth and sixth, respectively, at the Cincinnati Invitational won by Division I Miami; and Ohio Wesleyan finished third of six at the Kent State Invitational, won by the Division I hosts.

On the men's ledger, Oberlin, which finished fourth in the NCAC in 1989, just 19 points off the championship pace, served notice to defending champion Wooster that 1990 will be another extremely competitive year. The Yeomen beat the Scots 23-33. Senior **Jesse Mulkin (Berkeley, CA/Berkeley)** led Oberlin with a time of 22:08. At the Cincinnati Invitational, Earlham came in second behind the host school, while Ohio Wesleyan ran third and Wittenberg tied Dayton for fifth. Case Reserve was second to Grove City at its own five-team invitational. The five fastest Spartans, all freshmen, were led by **Rich Rapine (Newtowne, PA/Council Rock)**, who came in seventh overall at 29:01. Perennially tough Allegheny won the California (Pa.) 8K Invitational and, in dual meet action, Denison bested Kenyon 16-45. The Big Red were led by freshman **Tim Dunham (Laramie, WY/Laramie)**, who took first on the hilly Denison course in 26:35.

OHIO WESLEYAN WINS 28TH STRAIGHT NORTH COAST CONTEST, SEEKS FOURTH CONSECUTIVE CONFERENCE TITLE

CLEVELAND, OH -- The two biggest questions after week one of North Coast Athletic Conference play are: Is Ohio Wesleyan University truly invincible in the NCAC?; Will The College of Wooster bounce back from the week that was? The Bishops, en route to what they hope will be a fourth consecutive Conference title, extended their NCAC unbeaten streak to 28 games with a season-opening 7-2 victory over perennially strong Denison University (0-1; 0-1), Sept. 8. Ohio Wesleyan, which has made three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, takes its streak to Wittenberg University (1 0; 1 0 2), Sept. 12.

Wooster (0-1; 0-3), last season's third-place squad which combined with second-place Kenyon College and fourth-place Denison to compile an intimidating 39-13-1 overall record, lost its first three games of the season, just two shy of its total number of defeats last year. However, the Lady Scots are now through their most intense week of the 1990 campaign, having lost 2-0 to William Smith, the 1989 NCAA Division III champion, 3 0 to nationally ranked Rochester, and 3 2 in double overtime to Kenyon (1-0; 1-0).

Wittenberg tuned up for Saturday's highly competitive Lynchburg Invitational by beating North Coast foe Earlham College (0-1; 0-1), 2-0. The Tigers also racked up a pair of double overtime 0 0 ties, against Hope and 1989 Michigan champion Calvin. In other action, Oberlin College (0-0; 1-1) two games, beating Goshen, 2-0, and losing to 1989 Indiana champion DePauw by the same score.

Ohio Wesleyan's All NCAC senior **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** and junior teammate **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)** shot to an early lead in the Conference scoring race. Hendershott, the NCAC's fourth most productive scorer last season, whacked three goals and dished out one assist in OWU's victory over Denison. Heil, who was a two time regional All-America pick at Roanoke before transferring to Ohio Wesleyan this fall, is second in the scoring race with four points on two goals. Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** and Ohio Wesleyan junior **Michaela Cook (Bexley, OH/Columbus School for Girls)** have seized the early goaltending lead with perfect saves percentages. Baier, the second ranked goalie in the Conference last year behind Kenyon's All America Cathie Herrick, preserved the Tigers' double-overtime ties by totaling 16 saves against Calvin and six more against Hope.

**ALLEGHENY, WITTENBERG TIED FOR FIRST AFTER NCAC
OPENER WINS; DENISON RUNS UNDEFEATED MARK TO 3-0;
SPOTLIGHT ON DENISON AT ALLEGHENY NEXT SATURDAY**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Following three weekends of non conference competition, North Coast Athletic Conference football teams have compiled an impressive 9-6-1 record against some of the top NCAA Division III teams.

Denison University, with a spotless 3-0 mark, has turned heads with their big wins over powerful Wabash (IN), Albion (MI), and Brockport State (NY). Also undefeated following two weeks of non-league play is defending co champion Ohio Wesleyan University, with a 2-0 mark after wins over DePauw (IN) and Otterbein. OWU was ranked fourth nationally this week in the NCAA Division III poll, published by the *Football Gazette*.

Following the first two NCAC games last Saturday, Allegheny College and Wittenberg University have emerged tied for first place in the Conference. It took some last minute heroics by the Gators to snatch their first NCAC win from a scrappy Oberlin College, 29-18, in a game much closer than that score. First-year Allegheny coach Ken O'Keefe picked up his first collegiate victory and Yeomen coach Larry Story, who had picked up his first win a week earlier, served notice to the NCAC that Oberlin will be competitive. Wittenberg, under second year head coach Doug Niebur, picked up its first win of the season, 31-8 over The College of Wooster.

In other non-conference action, Case Western Reserve University got its first win of the season, with a 24-21 thriller at Washington (MO); defending co-champion Kenyon was stopped by Albion, the MIAA defending co-champ, 38-28, and are now 2-1. Earlham College lost its second non-conference outing in Indiana, 27-7 to Manchester.

NCAC GAMES THIS WEEK: A full-slate of NCAC games is on tap for this Saturday, but the Conference spotlight must fall on the Denison at Allegheny matchup. The Big Red, with a 3-0 record, is the winningest NCAC team and will go against undefeated NCAC co-leader, Allegheny (1-0-1) in Meadville. Case Reserve (1-1) will travel to Earlham (0-2), while Oberlin (1-1) travels to NCAC co-leader Wittenberg. These two teams have not met since 1954, when Oberlin won 28-6; the Yeomen hold a 12-7 edge in the series. Wooster (0-2), which upset Ohio Wesleyan in the last game of the 1989 season, will travel to Delaware for a rematch. OWU senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)** became the Bishops' all-time leading rusher last week as he gained 134 yards to push his career total to 2202 yards.

WOOSTER, OHIO WESLEYAN AND KENYON IN NATIONAL TOP 20; WITTENBERG, EARLHAM POST NCAC WINS

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference continued its impressive play this past week, running its non-conference record to 34-12-2 (.729). Seven of the nine teams are at .500 or above, including The College of Wooster (6-0-0), Ohio Wesleyan University (5-2-0) and Kenyon College (5-0-0), who are ranked third, eighth and 16th in the nation by the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America, respectively.

**BISHOPS EXTEND NCAC WINNING STREAK TO 29 GAMES;
CARNEY-DeBORD RACKS UP 100TH CAREER VICTORY**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University, which extended its North Coast Athletic Conference unbeaten streak to 30 games with a 3-2 victory over Wittenberg University on Sept. 12, will invade Kenyon College Sept. 18 for a battle of Conference unbeaten. The Bishops (2 0; 4 1), three year defending NCAC champions, were 3-1 on the week and presented head coach Nan Carney-DeBord her 100th career win with a 5-1 pounding of Randolph-Macon. Seventy-five of these victories have come during Carney DeBord's six years at the OWU helm.

Kenyon (2-0; 2-1), which is tied with the Bishops for the Conference lead so far this young season after finishing second to them last fall, groomed for this week's clash by defeating Earlham College, 2-1 in overtime, and being squeezed out by 1989 Indiana champion DePauw, 2-1. Oberlin College (0 1; 1 2) will be sticking for its first NCAC win of the season on Sept. 19 against Wittenberg University (1-1; 2-2), currently tied for third-place with Denison University (1-1; 1-2). Wittenberg split in non-Conference action this past week, while the Big Red beat Oberlin, 3-2. The College of Wooster (0-1; 0-4), last year's third-place NCAC team which lost only five games overall, hopes to re-align before its Sept. 22 matchup against streaking Ohio Wesleyan. Earlham (0-2; 1-3), which picked up its first win of the season Sept. 11 with a 4-0 victory against Franklin, is idle this week.

Big stickers abounded in the North Coast last week. Denison's 3-2 win over Oberlin turned out to be a stick-off between DU senior **Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's)** and Yeowoman freshman **Margaret Lewis (Asheville, NC/Asheville)**, both of whom whacked two goals. O'Connell now has a 2.0 ppg average, tying her with OWU senior **Kim Buckwalter (Lititz, PA/Warwick)** for second place among NCAC scorers. The Bishops showcased a new "Buck to Buck" passing game in their 3-2 win over Wittenberg, with freshman **Kerry Buckwalter (Lititz, PA/Warwick)** assisting her sister **Kim**, a senior, on the winning goal. One-half of last year's "hot-shot Hendershots", senior attack **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)**, is blistering the nets again this fall with a league-leading six goals and one assist. OWU junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)** smashed two goals in the win over Randolph Macon, while Earlham sophomore **Gina Reif (Fairport, NY/Fairport)** scored three goals on the week.

Ohio Wesleyan junior goalie **Michael Cook (Bexley, OH/Columbus School for Girls)** leads the NCAC defensively, sporting a perfect saves percentage. Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** has a .953 saves percentage and a Conference-high four shutouts.

Denison senior **Kate Fachtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** was third in 19:25, while meet champion Ohio Wesleyan was led by junior **Diana DeBalso (Kirtland, OH/Kirtland)** in fifth at 19:52 and sophomore **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/Westlake)** a wink behind at 19:53. Oberlin senior **Liz Maurice (East Massapequa, NY/Amityville)** placed eighth at 20:02.

Denison copped third in the men's 11 team field with 68 points, behind Wabash's torrid 23 point pace. The five other competing NCAC squads, Earlham, Kenyon, Oberlin, Wooster and Ohio Wesleyan, ran as a pack in places five through nine, respectively. In the men's 22-team field, Allegheny ran eighth, while Case Reserve was 10th.

**FOUR TEAMS UNBEATEN IN NCAC PLAY; OHIO WESLEYAN
DOMINATING WITH TWO SHUTOUTS IN THREE WINS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- In what may be a portent of things to come, four teams are unbeaten and tied for first place in North Coast Athletic Conference football following a wild weekend of high scoring games and rock-solid defensive performances.

Allegheny College and Wittenberg University are both 2-0 in the NCAC following big wins in their second week of Conference play. Allegheny stunned previously undefeated Denison University, 40-15, while Wittenberg rolled to its second straight league win with an impressive 41-20 victory against Oberlin College.

Joining the Gators and Tigers at the top are Case Western Reserve University and Ohio Wesleyan University, which each notched a win in its first NCAC game of the season this past week. Case Reserve recorded a 32-6 triumph over host Earlham College, while Ohio Wesleyan, defending Conference co-champions, shut out The College of Wooster, 41-0.

One of the biggest games in the NCAC this Saturday will be Kenyon College (0-0; 2-1) at Wittenberg (2-0; 2-1), in what will be Kenyon's first Conference game of the season. The Lords, also defending North Coast co-champs, have displayed a high powered offense in its three non conference matches.

Ohio Wesleyan is 3-0 overall following lopsided shutouts of Hiram and Wooster, plus a big 10-2 win over always-tough DePauw. The Bishop defense is setting an incredible pace, allowing an average of just one point and 133 yards of total offense per game. Ohio Wesleyan set a Conference record by allowing only 90 points last season, a standard that certainly appears to be in jeopardy at this time. The unit is led by 1989 NCAC Defensive Player of the Year **Neil Ringers (Ridgefield, CT/Ridgefield)**, a senior two-time All-America, and by junior All-America candidate **Keith Rucker (University Park, IL/Shaker Heights (OH))**, a dominating, 6-4, 330-pound nose tackle.

NCAC STANDINGS/RACE: Following a week off, the Kenyon Lords will crank up their vaunted air attack featuring 1989 NCAC Offensive Player of the Year **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)**, who is passing the Lords to an average of more than 423 yards of total offense a game -- tops in the Conference and one of the best in all of Division III. Kenyon travels to Springfield to face the Wittenberg Tigers, who, at 2-1 overall and 2-0 in North Coast play, appear to be in gear following an opening loss. Senior tailback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)** has exploded for two straight 200-yard games for the Tigers. Ohio Wesleyan (1-0; 3-0), which is ranked fourth in the nation by the *Football Gazette*, hosts an improving Oberlin squad (0-2; 1-2), while Allegheny (2-0; 2-0-1) travels to Earlham (0-1; 0-3) as the Quakers search for their first win. Wooster (0-1; 0-3) hopes to find the keys to victory in Cleveland next Saturday as the Scots visit a much-improved Case Reserve squad (1-0; 2-1), confident after two straight wins.

NCAC NOTES: Two North Coast single-game records were shattered last Saturday. Wittenberg tailback **Jon Warga** rushed for 279 yards, eclipsing the previous record of 230 set in 1984 by Denison's All-America tailback Chris Spriggs. Ohio Wesleyan's defense set a single game record for fewest yards of total offense allowed, as they held Wooster to 43, erasing the 1985 record of 50 set by Case Reserve.

GATOR WOMEN RANKED FIFTH IN NATION;
KENYON'S BERGHOLD WINS THIRD MEET

CLEVELAND, OH -- Allegheny's women, ranked fifth in the NCAA Division III by the Cross Country Coaches' Association, lived up to their reputation last Saturday as they scored 43 points to win the Malone Invitational in Canton, Ohio. The Gators, who were led at Malone by the fourth-place finisher (20:01) of senior **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**, have now won two of three meets on the season, losing only to 1989 NCAA champion Coltsford State one week ago. But the real headlines belong to Kenyon junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)**, who became the first Division III female ever to win the Malone event, as she covered the muddy 5,000 meter course in 19:42. Berghold, who has won all three of the 1990 meets she has run, and sophomore teammate **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)**, who placed third at 20:26, led the Ladies to third place in the college division and sixth overall out of 16 teams.

Wooster junior **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)** was another NCAC individual medalist as she led the Lady Scots to second place behind Mount Union at the 13-team Wooster Invitational with a winning run of 20:27. Ohio Wesleyan placed third, Oberlin fourth, Denison sixth, Case Reserve 11th and Wittenberg 12th. NCAC top ten finishers included Big Red senior **Kate Fachtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** in third at 20:39, Ohio Wesleyan junior **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/Westlake)** in fifth at 20:59, and Oberlin senior **Swala Abrams (Yellow Springs, OH/Yellow Springs)** in seventh at 21:09.

Sophomore **Mike Collyer (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)** led Denison to third place in the Wooster Invitational's 13-team men's field with a time of 27:18. The host Scots ran fourth, followed by Ohio Wesleyan in sixth, Case Reserve seventh, Oberlin eighth and Wittenberg 11th. Case Reserve freshman **Shawn Brown (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)** legged out a seventh-place individual finish with Yeoman senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smoky Hill)** right behind in eighth. Allegheny's men ran third among nine squads at the Davis & Elkins (W.V.) Invitational, with sophomore **Collin Kulsely (Burlington, IO/Oil City (PA))** leading the way for the third straight week, this time with a fourth place effort of 30:30.

In other North Coast action, Earlham's women placed fifth out of 11 teams and the men ran seventh of 14 at the Manchester (Ind.) Invitational.

Denison University sophomore **Mike Collyer (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)** and Kenyon College junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** have been named North Coast Athletic Conference Men's and Women's Cross Country Athletes of the Week, respectively.

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University (4 0; 6 1) continued to master all North Coast Athletic Conference corners last week as it extended its NCAC unbeaten streak to 32 games by shutting out 1989 Conference runner-up Kenyon College, 4-0, and The College of Wooster, 2-0. This may be a decisive week for the Ladies of Kenyon (2-2; 2-3), whose additional 5-1 loss to Oberlin College (2-1; 3-2) caused them to plummet two notches in the North Coast standings. Kenyon hosts traditional rival Denison University (1 2; 1-3), Sept. 26, and goes head-to-head on Sept. 29 with Wittenberg University (2-2; 3-3-2), with whom they are tied for third. Another interesting NCAC matchup this week finds Earlham College (0-2; 1-3) and Wooster (0-2; 0-5) each eyeing its first Conference victory of the season.

Although Ohio Wesleyan continues to sit securely atop the North Coast ladder, Oberlin is the team that is turning heads. The Yeowomen climbed from fifth to second place in the Conference with wins over Kenyon and Wittenberg last week. Second year coach Lynda Ransdell's troops have now won as many NCAC matches as they did in all of 1989, and half as many overall games. A trio of freshmen wielded the big sticks in their 5-1 win over Kenyon. **Margaret Lewis (Asheville, NC/Asheville)**, the NCAC's fourth leading scorer (1.6 ppg), pocketed a pair of goals, while **Cathy Hopkins (Rochester, NY/Brighton)** had one goal and two assists, and **Jennifer Berman (Louisville, KY/Collegiate)** scored once. Berman also scored Oberlin's only goal in its 1-0 victory against Wittenberg earlier in the week. The Tigers bounced back nicely from that defeat, however, besting Denison 2-1. Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** has been superb in goal with 101 saves and four shutouts. Baier leads all Conference goalies with a .953 saves percentage.

On the offensive side of the field, Ohio Wesleyan junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)** shot from ninth to second in the NCAC scoring race with four goals on the week, including a pair of scores in the big win over Kenyon. CLEVELAND, OH -- Denison University (2-0; 7-3) picked up a pair of North Coast Athletic Conference victories last week to edge in front of a trio of teams that have 1-0 NCAC marks -- Ohio Wesleyan University (1-0; 8-1), Wittenberg University (1-0; 6-2) and The College of Wooster (1-0; 6-2). Those four have a combined non conference record of 22-8 (.733).

Last week, Denison earned its wins against Case Western Reserve University (0-2, 1-4-2) and Earlham College (0-2, 0-5) by 2-1 and 10-0 scores, respectively. WOOSTER, KENYON IN DIVISION III TOP 10**

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference continued its dominance over outside competition, winning eight of nine last week to improve its non-conference record to 42-13-4 (.746). The College of Wooster (1-0; 8-0-1) and Kenyon College (1-0; 7-0) lead the way and are ranked third and ninth, respectively, in the Division III national poll.

In North Coast play last week, surprising Denison University (1-0-1; 6-1-1) picked up a win over Case Western Reserve University (0-1; 1-3), 2-1, and a tie against Earlham College (1-0-1; 4-2-2), 3-3. Kenyon opened its NCAC schedule with a 3-0 triumph over Oberlin College (0-2; 3-5-1), while Wooster was a 2-1 winner against Allegheny College (0-2; 3-4-1).

Leading the way in goal are Wittenberg University (1-0, 8-1) junior **Scott DeBolt (Bloomington, MN/Jefferson)** and Wooster freshman **John Weidenhamer (Pittsburgh, PA/Woodland Hills)**, who have 0.33 and 0.44 goals-against averages, respectively. They each have four shutouts.

**OHIO WESLEYAN RANKED FOURTH NATIONALLY, TIED
FOR FIRST IN NCAC WITH ALLEGHENY AND WITTENBERG**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University, ranked fourth in the NCAA Division III poll published by the Chicago-based *Football Gazette*, is undefeated at 4-0 and tied for first place in the North Coast Athletic Conference with Allegheny College and Wittenberg University. Allegheny and Wittenberg are 3-0 in NCAC play, while Ohio Wesleyan is off to a 2-0 start.

The Battling Bishops, under fourth-year head coach Mike Hollway, lead the NCAC in total offense (442.5 ypg) and all four defensive team categories, including total defense (112.5 ypg) and scoring defense (2.3 ppg). They have not allowed an offensive touchdown all season.

Allegheny College continues undefeated at 3-0-1 overall, with only an opening game 30-30 tie with Juniata marring its record. The Gators lead the Conference in scoring offense with an average of 40.3 points per game.

Wittenberg University, behind the powerful running of the nation's leading rusher, senior tailback **Jon Wurga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, has rebounded to win three straight after an opening loss. The Tigers have found their groove on the ground and they lead all NCAC teams in rushing offense with an average of 366 yards per game. Wurga, who after only four games has amassed nearly 900 yards rushing, has had three straight 200-plus games. He has set and reset the Wittenberg and NCAC single-game rushing records over the last two weeks.

NCAC RACE/STANDINGS: Allegheny (3-0; 3-0-1), Wittenberg (3-0; 3-1) and Ohio Wesleyan (2-0; 4-0) are tied atop the North Coast. Following two straight wins, Case Western Reserve University (1-1; 2-2) dropped a 22-15 decision to The College of Wooster (1-2; 1-3). Coach Bob Tucker's Wooster Scots jumped up a couple of notches in the Conference standings with their upset of the Spartans, which followed three consecutive losses. Denison University (0-1; 3-1), Kenyon College (0-1; 2-2), Oberlin College (0-3; 1-3) and Earlham College (0-2; 0-4) are looking for their first NCAC wins.

THIS WEEK IN THE NCAC: A full slate of four NCAC games is on tap. Undefeated Allegheny will travel to Wooster. The Gators are rolling and the Scots hope to get some type of a winning streak going after surprising Case Reserve. Defending co champ Kenyon travels to Oberlin. The Lords will try to shake off their loss to Wittenberg, while the Yeomen look to get back to their early-season success. Ohio Wesleyan and Denison, arch-rivals dating back to the 1890s, renew their now-annual series in Granville, while Wittenberg travels to Cleveland to face Case Reserve. It will be the Tigers first visit to Fluntingan Field and the two teams will be playing for the coveted Bill Edwards Trophy. Edwards was an outstanding coach at both Western Reserve (1935-40) and Wittenberg (1955-1968) and is a member of the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame.

**THREE TEAMS UNBEATEN AND UNTIED IN NCAC PLAY;
WOOSTER, KENYON AND OWU IN DIVISION III TOP 20**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Three teams remain unbeaten and untied heading into the fourth week of North Coast Athletic Conference play. Wittenberg University (1-0; 8-2) and Ohio Wesleyan University (1-0; 8-3) have yet to lose a Conference game, while Kenyon College (2-0; 10-0) is undefeated in the NCAC as well as in non-conference competition. The challenge to remain unbeaten continues this week when Ohio Wesleyan takes on Denison University (1-0-1; 6-1-1), Oct. 1, and Allegheny College (0-2; 4-4-1), Oct. 6, while Wittenberg goes against Case Western Reserve University (0-3; 1-5) and Kenyon faces Earlham College (1-1-1, 4-3-2) on Oct. 6.

Entering last week's play, The College of Wooster (2-1; 9-1-1) was tied for second in the Division III national rankings, while Kenyon was ninth and Ohio Wesleyan was 14th. CLEVELAND, OH -- In a battle of North Coast Athletic Conference unbeatens, 1989 co-champion Ohio Wesleyan University (2-0; 10-2) hosts The College of Wooster (2 0; 8 2), Oct. 3, to determine the early NCAC leader. The Battling Bishops, who are looking for a fourth consecutive NCAC title, must share the headlines with The College of Wooster (2-2, 2-5), which bounded into the win column with 3 2 victories over Oberlin, in double overtime, and Denison. The fourth-place Lady Scots hope to improve upon that win streak against the two teams which are on either side of them in the Conference standings, third place Kenyon College (3 3, 4 4) and fifth place Wittenberg University (2 3; 3 4 3). Wooster is at Kenyon Oct. 3, and home against Wittenberg Oct. 6.

Junior **Stephanie Hell (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)**, with two goals and two assists on the week, became the NCAC scoring leader with an average of 2.2 points per game. Oberlin's offensive heroines were senior attack **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, whose two goals and one assist led the Yeowomen to a 4-3 overtime win against Earlham, and freshman attack **Jennifer Berman (Louisville, KY/Collegiate)**, who had a goal and an assist in their double-overtime loss to Wooster. Longstreth is tied for second in the Conference scoring race (2.0 ppg) with Denison senior **Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's)**, who added three goals on the week. Other top North Coast stickers for the week included Kenyon sophomore **Kelly Lynn (Alpine, NJ/Dwight Englewood)**, who netted a goal in each of the Ladies' three games, and Earlham sophomore **Gina Reif (Fairport, NY/Fairport)**, who whacked two goals to improve to fifth among NCAC scorers with an average of 1.7 points per game. In addition, Ohio Wesleyan freshman **Kerry Buckwalter (Lititz, PA/Warwick)** broke into the collegiate scoring column with a bang, notching a hat trick in the Bishops' win over Earlham.

In goal, Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** continues to lead the way with a .935 saves percentage, followed by Wooster senior **Pam Metz (Dayton, OH/Oakwood)** at .887 and Earlham freshman **Wendi Weimer (Avon, OH/Lake Ridge)** at .870.

CLEVELAND, OH Impressive victories by North Coast Athletic Conference co leaders Allegheny College and Wittenberg University last week enabled the two teams to remain unbeaten in NCAC play while setting the stage for a showdown this weekend in Meadville, Pa.

Allegheny, which is 4-0 in the North Coast and 4-0-1 overall, disposed of The College of Wooster 38-14, while Wittenberg, which is 4-0 in the Conference and 4-1 overall, scored 27 points in the second half to defeat Case Western Reserve University 34-7.

The Gators' offensive machine leads the NCAC in total yards (425.0 ypg) and scoring (39.8 ppg), but Wittenberg is not far off the pace with an average of 404.4 yards and 30 points per game.

Individually, senior quarterback **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn Trafford)**, who fired three touchdown passes against Wooster to give him 10 for the season, leads Allegheny, while senior tailback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, the nation's top rusher at 198.4 yards per game, keys the Tiger attack.

Trailing Allegheny and Wittenberg by just one half game is Ohio Wesleyan University, which is 3-0 in the NCAC and 5-0 overall after knocking off Denison, 35-2, in Granville. The Bishops, ranked fourth in the nation by the *Football Gazette*, are led by senior tailback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)**, who averages 101.4 yards per game, and a defense that is first in the NCAC in every category, including scoring (2.2 ppg).

NCAC RACE/STANDINGS: While Allegheny and Wittenberg battle it out this week, Ohio Wesleyan will have to wait for its chance at the two teams. The Bishops face Allegheny Oct. 27 in Meadville, Pa., and wrap up the season with Wittenberg on Nov. 10 in Springfield. Kenyon College (1-1; 3-2) is in fourth place after edging Oberlin College, 14-7, over the weekend. Case Reserve (1-2; 2-3) is fifth, followed by Wooster (1-3; 1-4) in sixth. Denison (0-2; 3-2) and Earlham (0-2; 1-4) are tied for seventh, while Oberlin is ninth (0-4; 1-4). Earlham's 14-7 win over Thomas More improved the NCAC's non-conference record to 10-6-1 (.618).

**DENISON MEN, WOOSTER WOMEN LEAD NCAC FIELD AT KENYON;
GATOR HARRIERS TALLY TWO MORE VICTORIES**

CLEVELAND, OH -- The Denison men's cross country squad kept the momentum going from its Sept. 28 championship run at the Ohio Wesleyan Invitational by finishing a strong second to nationally-ranked Cedarville at the eight-team Kenyon Invitational this past Saturday. The Big Red, whose 65 points were just six off Cedarville's winning total, were followed across the finish line by Oberlin (99 points), Wooster (102), Ohio Wesleyan (113), Kenyon (151) and Wittenberg (163). Oberlin senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smoky Hill)** was the top North Coast harrier, finishing second with a time of 27:09, just four seconds off the lead. Other top finishers included Denison sophomore **Mike Collyer (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)**, who was sixth in 27:40, and Wooster sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)**, who was seventh in 28:02.

As has become customary this season, the women's race belonged to Kenyon junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)**, who won it handily in 18:50, one-half minute ahead of Allegheny senior **Katie Hedemann (Skaneateles, NY/Skaneateles)**. Berghold has won all four races in which she has competed this year, garnering NCAC Women's Cross Country Athlete of the Week honors twice. Kenyon sophomore **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)** ran third at 19:31 to help Berghold lead the Ladies to 84 points and a fourth-place finish in the nine-team field. Cedarville was first with 62 points, followed by Wooster (74) and Ohio Wesleyan (82). Wooster was led by juniors **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)**, who finished in sixth place at 19:49, and **Beth Blakemore (Golden, CO/Wheat Ridge)**, who was one step behind in seventh at 19:50. For Ohio Wesleyan, junior **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/West)** turned in a fourth-place time of 19:37, while classmate **Diana Del Balso (Kirtland, OH/Kirtland)** was 10th in 20:06.

In other NCAC weekend action, Allegheny's men won a triangular against Grove City and Clarion, while the Gator women outran Walsh. Junior **Alyse Holden (Shoreham, NY/Wading River)** was the women's medalist with a time of 20:40. Earlham's women bagged second place in the four-team Quaker Invitational, while the men copped third out of six. The Case Reserve men, meanwhile, ran 20th of 21 at the prestigious 35th annual Notre Dame Invitational.

Oberlin College senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smoky Hill)** and Kenyon College junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** have been named North Coast Athletic Conference Men's and Women's Cross Country Athletes of the Week, respectively.

COAST CLIPS: For the third time this fall, three men's soccer teams from the North Coast appear in the Division III national rankings. Kenyon (3-0; 12-0), off to its best ever, is fourth, followed by Ohio Wesleyan (3-0; 11-3) in a tie for ninth and defending NCAC champion Wooster (2-1, 10-2-1) in 14th.... The traveling trophy was established last fall at the behest of Wittenberg President William A. Kinnison to honor the man who coached at both schools. Edwards, who was inducted to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1986, compiled a 48-6-1 record between 1934 and 1940 at Western Reserve and a 98-20-4 mark at Wittenberg between 1955 and 1968. Wittenberg won the 1989 inaugural contest, 31-22.

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference is led by three teams this week, each with three NCAC wins. Kenyon College (3-0, 12-0), which is ranked fourth in Division III and off to its best start ever, is joined by Wittenberg University (3-0; 11-2) and Ohio Wesleyan University (3-0; 11-3). The Battling Bishops are tied for ninth in the national poll, while The College of Wooster (2-1; 10-2-1), which is tied with Oberlin College (2-3; 6-6-1) for fourth in the Conference race, is 14th in the Division III rankings.

Among the winners last week were Ohio Wesleyan over Division I Miami (Ohio), 3-1, Allegheny over John Carroll, 8-1, Kenyon over Albion, 4-1, Wittenberg over Capital, 4-0, and Wooster over Otterbein, 1-0.

Wittenberg, which is just one victory away from the school record for wins in a season, is led by junior **Doug Brown (Pittsford, N.Y./Sutherland)**. IN NORTH COAST PLAY; CASE RESERVE AND DENISON JOIN
LADY SCOTS ATOP NCAC STANDINGS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- The College of Wooster (3-0; 9-3) is the only undefeated team in North Coast Athletic Conference play. Still, the Lady Scots are not alone atop the NCAC standings as Denison University (3-1; 10-4) and Case Western Reserve University (3-2; 4-4-2) also have three Conference wins. Not far behind are Ohio Wesleyan University (2-1; 11-3) and Allegheny College (2-1; 7-5) with two NCAC wins apiece.

Wooster, which received votes but was not ranked in last week's national poll, may have changed that situation with a 3-1 upset win over 17th-ranked Ohio Wesleyan, Oct. 3. The Lady Scots, under the direction of second-year head coach Nick Cowell, are off to their best start ever. The North Coast continued its fine non-conference play by winning seven of ten games last week, improving its record against outside competition to 43-30-3 (.589). Denison shut out Otterbein, 11-0, and defeated Marietta, 6-1, while Kenyon beat Adrian, 2-1, and Tri State (Ind.), 2-1. In other non conference action, Oberlin defeated John Carroll, 5-0, and Ohio Wesleyan blanked Bethany, 3-0.

For the fourth consecutive week, Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** tops the Conference in scoring, averaging 2.6 points per game. In goal, Wooster freshman **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/North Hills)** continues to lead the way with a 0.78 goals-against average.

In NCAC action this week, Kenyon (1-2; 6-6) is at Wooster and Wittenberg (1-2; 6-5) goes to Ohio Wesleyan on Oct. 10, while Kenyon travels to Allegheny, Earlham (0-3; 0-9) goes to Case Reserve, Ohio Wesleyan is at Oberlin (1-4; 5-7-1), and Wooster is at Wittenberg on Oct. 13.

CLEVELAND, OH -- Oberlin College, the surprise of the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference season, lived up to its reputation last week by upsetting Ohio Wesleyan University, 2-1, thereby snapping the Bishops' NCAC unbeaten string at 34 games, one short of the Conference record of 35 set by Allegheny College's women's soccer program from 1985-89. Ohio Wesleyan (6-1; 8-3), ranked 14th nationally, will try to start a new victory string this week against Wittenberg University (3-3-1; 5-4-4) and Kenyon College (3-3-1; 4-4-1) on Oct. 10 and 13, respectively. Wittenberg and Kenyon are two of the three teams tied for third place in the NCAC. Another major Conference matchup features Wittenberg versus Oberlin on Oct. 13.

Oberlin (4-2-0; 5-4-0) is off to its best start ever, having already doubled its 1989 NCAC victory total. A major reason that the Yeowomen are in second place is the spectacular play of senior attack **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, whose two goals gave Oberlin its Oct. 6 victory against first place Ohio Wesleyan. Longstreth, who leads the Conference in scoring with 20 points and a 2.2 points per game average, has had a goal or an assist in eight of the Yeowomen's nine contests. She has been particularly hot of late, slapping six goals and two assists in the last four games.

Wittenberg is another NCAC team on the rise, moving to .500 in Conference play and above the .500 mark overall on the basis of a scoreless double-overtime tie with Earlham College (0-6-1; 1-7-1) and a 2-1 overtime win against the other team caught in the third-place logjam, The College of Wooster (3-3-1; 3-6-1). Wittenberg has had two victories and four ties in six overtime games this year. Wooster had a truly long week, playing Kenyon to a 1-1 double overtime tie before the overtime loss to Wittenberg.

Oberlin's Longstreth has taken over the scoring lead from Ohio Wesleyan junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)**, who stands second at 1.8 ppg. Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** keeps getting better and better in goal, improving her Conference-leading shutout total to six and her saves percentage to .946. Baier is followed by Wooster senior **Pam Metz (Dayton, OH/Oakwood)** at .892 and Oberlin senior **Melissa Merrill (Baltimore, MD/Friends)**, whose 26 saves in the Ohio Wesleyan victory raised her saves percentage to .891.

**ALLEGHENY AND OHIO WESLEYAN REMAIN UNDEFEATED;
DEFENDING CO CHAMP KENYON HOSTS QATORS IN NCAC
SHOWDOWN; OWU LEADS NATION IN RUSH DEFENSE**

CLEVELAND, OH Heading into week seven of the season, Allegheny College and Ohio Wesleyan University remain undefeated and atop the North Coast Athletic Conference standings.

Allegheny, 5-0-1 overall and 5-0 in the NCAC, bounced Wittenberg University out of a first place tie last week, but will need to be ready this Saturday when they encounter Kenyon College, one of the North Coast's defending co champions. Ohio Wesleyan, the other defending co-champ, continues to be perfect with a 6-0 overall record and a 4-0 mark in Conference play. The Bishops lead the nation in rushing defense, allowing an average of only 10.8 yards per game! Head coach Mike Hollway's squad is among the national leaders in total defense (112.7 ypg) and scoring defense (1.8 ppg) as well. Those superlatives make an excellent case for their fourth-place national ranking by the *Football Gazette*.

Kenyon senior quarterback **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)** appears to have bounced back from the shoulder injury which sidelined him for much of the past two weeks, as he threw for three scores in an exciting 27-24 win over Denison University. Creighton, the 1989 NCAC Offensive Player of the Year, has completed 114 of 206 passes for 1,567 yards and 14 touchdowns. Still, he trails Allegheny senior **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn-Trafford)** in the Conference's quarterback ratings. Filkovski, who is as dangerous a runner as he is a thrower, has made good on 60 of 98 passing attempts for 963 yards and 12 scores.

Elsewhere in the North Coast, head coach Bob Tucker's College of Wooster squad seems determined to make the most of the season after a ragged start. The Scots exploded early for their second victory in the last three games, tagging Oberlin College, 40-14. Another NCAC team that refuses to quit is Earlham College, which held nationally-ranked Ohio Wesleyan scoreless until late in the third quarter before falling 21-0. Case Western Reserve University improved the North Coast's non-conference record to 10-6-1 (.618) by blanking Chicago, 21-0.

NCAC RACE/STANDINGS: Allegheny (5-0; 5-0-1) and Ohio Wesleyan (4-0; 6-0) are atop the standings undefeated records, while Wittenberg (4-1; 4-2) drops to third with one loss and is followed closely by Kenyon (2-1; 4-2) in fourth. Wooster (2-3; 2-4) is fifth, followed by Case Reserve (1-2; 3-3) in the sixth spot. Denison (0-3; 3-3), which is 3-0 against non-conference competition, Earlham (0-3; 1-5) and Oberlin (0-5; 1-5) are looking for their first NCAC wins.

THIS WEEK IN THE NCAC: The spotlight falls on the Allegheny at Kenyon game, a key contest for both squads. If the Lords have any hopes of repeating as Conference champions, they must continue to win, as must Allegheny if it is to climb to the top for the third time in the last four years. A talented, but inconsistent Case Reserve team will need to put it all together at Ohio Wesleyan Saturday. A Spartan upset would really throw a wrench into things! Earlham notched its first win two weeks ago and battled OWU tough last Saturday, but their sensational sophomore quarterback **John Wortham (Dayton, OH/Meadowdale)** may be on the sidelines with bruised ribs when they trek to Wittenberg. The Tigers will be snarling after their loss to Allegheny and they feature the nation's top rusher in senior **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, who already has topped the 1,000-yard mark. Oberlin travels to Denison to round out the NCAC portion of the schedule. Wooster, fresh off a big win, travels to Pittsburgh for a non-conference clash with nationally ranked and undefeated Carnegie Mellon University.

NCAC Cross Country Report
GATOR WOMEN RANKED FOURTH NATIONALLY;
KENYON'S BERGHOLD WINS FIFTH CONSECUTIVE MEET

CLEVELAND, OH -- In a weekend more conducive to mud wrestling than cross country, North Coast Athletic Conference runners sloshed their way to substantial finishes at four different meets. Allegheny's women, ranked fourth in Division III by the Cross Country Coaches' Association, enhanced its resume even more by running 76 points ahead of third-ranked Ithaca en route to a second-place finish (45 points) at the 12-team Geneseo State (N.Y.) Invitational. Once again the Gators were led by senior **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**, who nabbed second place overall in 20:04. Freshman **Serena Fraser (Williamsville, NY/Clarence)** ran seventh in 20:44 and junior **Alyse Holden (Shoreham, NY/Wading River)** was eighth in 21:02. The Allegheny men, meanwhile, placed third with 90 points at the five-team Northwest Pennsylvania Invitational.

Earlham's men ran 11th out of a field of 21 teams at the Indiana Intercollegiate, hosted by Indiana State in Terre Haute, while the Quaker women finished seventh of 17 at the same meet. Junior **Scott Pearson (Cincinnati, OH/Finneytown)** and freshman **Tiffany Harris (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)** led the way for the men and women with runs of 26:34 and 20:59, respectively.

The remaining seven NCAC squads ran in the highly competitive Ohio Intercollegiate Championships in Delaware, Ohio, which featured 38 women's and 36 men's teams from all three NCAA divisions. In the women's event, which was dominated by Ohio U., Miami and Bowling Green, the North Coast copped three of the top 15 spots overall, and two of the top five places among the 16 Division III entrants. Wooster was third in the college division and 10th overall, followed by Kenyon in fourth and 11th, Ohio Wesleyan in sixth and 15th, Oberlin in eighth and 22nd, Denison in ninth and 23rd, Wittenberg in 13th and 28th and Case Reserve in 14th and 30th. Kenyon junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** extended her winning streak to five consecutive meets as she copped top individual honors in the college division with a run of 18:16.6, good for eighth place overall. CLEVELAND, OH -- Entering the next to last week of North Coast Athletic Conference play, The College of Wooster (4-0-1; 10-3-1) holds a slim lead over Ohio Wesleyan University (4-1; 13-3), Denison University (3-1; 11-4) and Allegheny College (3-1; 8-7-1). Wooster, which is ranked 15th in Division III, tied its school record for wins in a season (10) last week. This is the first time in the Lady Scots' six-year soccer history that they have been ranked nationally.

Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** continues to lead the NCAC in scoring, averaging 2.5 points per game, while Denison freshman **Heather Allred (Cincinnati, OH/Wyoming)** is second with an average of 2.2 per game. In goal, Wooster freshman **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/North Hills)** tops the charts with a 0.64 goals against average and six shutouts. Denison sophomore **Jane Wildman (Amarillo, TX/Cape Elizabeth)** also has been impressive with six shutouts and a 1.00 goals-against average.

**OWU RECOUPS FROM LAST WEEK'S UPSET; OBERLIN, WOOSTER
IN TIE FOR SECOND; TEAMS READY FOR MIDWEST REGIONALS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- As six of the seven teams (all but Earlham College) prepare for the Midwest Field Hockey Coaches' Association Regionals at Kenyon College, Oct. 19-20, there continues to be two distinct storylines in the North Coast Athletic Conference. One is Ohio Wesleyan University (8-1; 10-3), well on its way toward a fourth consecutive NCAC championship, and the other is the rest of the Conference, which, at this juncture, is battling for runner-up positions. No one team has yet been able to muster enough consecutive victories to pull away from the pack and challenge Ohio Wesleyan's supremacy, although several have demonstrated the potential to do so.

Oberlin College (4-3-1; 5-5-1), which snapped the Battling Bishops' 34-game unbeaten string one week ago, got a taste of its own upset medicine this week, losing 5-2 to Denison University (4-4; 5-5) before becoming entangled in a 0-0 double-overtime deadlock with the masters of the tie, Wittenberg University (3-4-2; 5-6-5). The College of Wooster (4-3-1; 4-6-1) moved into a second-place tie with the Yeowomen on the strength of a 3-1 triumph over Earlham (0-7-1; 2-8-1). Ohio Wesleyan, meanwhile, started on a new winning streak last week, beating Wittenberg, 3-0, and Kenyon, 7-2. Kenyon (3-4-1; 4-5-1), which is struggling this fall after receiving its first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament last season, has a pivotal game Oct. 17 against Oberlin. Another key matchup finds Ohio Wesleyan invading Wooster on Oct. 16.

Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** continued her stellar play in goal with 75 saves on the week, including 27 in the tie against Oberlin. Baier leads the loop with a .947 saves percentage. She is followed by Ohio Wesleyan junior **Michaela Cook (Bexley, OH/Columbus School for Girls)**, who jumped from sixth to second this past week and has a .903 saves percentage. On the offensive side of things, Oberlin senior **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)** sports a 2.0 points per game average to lead for the second consecutive week. Longstreth is followed by two Ohio Wesleyan stickers -- junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)**, who scored two goals in the win over Kenyon, at 1.9 ppg, and senior **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)**, at 1.8 ppg. Bishop freshman **Erin Foley (Worthington, OH/Worthington)** scored four goals and had one assist last week to leap from ninth to a tie for fourth at 1.6 ppg. Foley shares her rung on the scoring ladder with Denison senior **Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's)**.

NCAC Football Report

CLASH OF NCAC TITANS, SATURDAY, OCT. 27; OHIO WESLEYAN AT ALLEGHENY PITS NCAC UNBEATENS

CLEVELAND, OH -- In the biggest game of the North Coast Athletic Conference football season to date, undefeated Allegheny College will play host to undefeated Ohio Wesleyan University this Saturday, Oct. 27. The game could bring the NCAC football championship home to Allegheny for the third time in the last four years.

Because of a staggered schedule, Allegheny, which plays its final North Coast game Saturday, can earn the title with a victory and a 7-0 NCAC record. Ohio Wesleyan, with two Conference games remaining, would have one loss and no other team in the North Coast is undefeated. Should Ohio Wesleyan win, the NCAC championship race remains alive with two other teams -- Allegheny and Wittenberg University -- staying in the chase.

It has proven to be a remarkable year for Allegheny, which was picked to finish second in the Conference by the media and coaches in their preseason poll. Peter Vaas, the man who had led the Gators to NCAC titles in 1987 and 1988, had left Meadville for a position on the Notre Dame coaching staff. Enter rookie head coach Ken O'Keefe, who has promptly steered his team to an impressive 6-0-1 overall mark with only a season opening tie to nationally ranked Juniata (Pa.) marring the record.

Allegheny has featured one of the nation's top offenses, averaging 424 yards and 37 points a game. The Gators are led by senior standouts **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn Trafford)**, the NCAC's leader in pass efficiency, and tailback **Jerry O'Brien (Pittsburgh, PA/North Catholic)**, the Conference's fourth-leading rusher.

Ohio Wesleyan, on the other hand, has won with defense. Going into Saturday's game with Case Reserve, the Bishops were ranked first in the nation against the rush and second in scoring and total defense. Despite yielding its first offensive touchdown in the 21-7 win, Ohio Wesleyan should hold onto its lofty standing. The outstanding defensive unit is led by a pair of All-Americans, senior defensive end **Neil Ringers (Ridgefield, CT/Ridgefield)** and junior nose guard **Keith Rucker (University Park, IL/Shaker Heights (OH))**.

The Bishops, under fourth-year mentor Mike Hollway, have added a new dimension this season to their reliable, but ground-oriented offense. Behind the steady running of 250-pound senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)**, who is averaging over 100 yards a game again this season, the Ohio Wesleyan attack has been enhanced by the running and throwing of freshman quarterback **Jimmy Clark (Sharon, PA/Sharon)**.

The Bishops continue to be ranked third in the nation by the *Football Gazette* and fourth in the NCAA Division III North Region. Allegheny is ranked right behind Ohio Wesleyan in the NCAA poll and is included in the nation's Top 25, at 23rd in *Football Gazette*.

NCAC CHAMPIONSHIP POSSIBILITIES: Allegheny (6-0; 6-0-1) and Ohio Wesleyan (5-0; 7-0) sit atop the NCAC entering week eight. An Allegheny victory Saturday gives it the North Coast title outright. An Ohio Wesleyan win puts the Bishops in first all alone, but with two remaining NCAC games (Kenyon and Wittenberg) remaining. A win by the Bishops keeps alive Wittenberg's title hopes, while Allegheny also would be a possibility. Wittenberg (5-1; 5-2) currently is third, while Kenyon (2-2; 4-3) is fourth and Wooster (2-3; 2-5) fifth. Case Reserve (1-3; 3-4) is tied for sixth with Denison (1-3; 4-3), while Earlham (0-4; 1-6) and Oberlin (0-6; 1-6) round out the standings. The NCAC is 10-7-1 in non-conference play.

NCAC Cross Country Championship Preview
**KENYON HOSTS SEVENTH NORTH COAST CROSS
COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS, OCT. 27**

GAMBIER, OH -- Kenyon College is set to host the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference Cross Country Championships Saturday, Oct. 27. The meet will open with the five-kilometer women's race at 11:00 a.m., followed at 11:45 a.m. by the five mile men's event. Runners from the nine NCAC schools will be competing not only for team and individual bragging rights, but also for berths in the NCAA Great Lakes Regional. The top four teams (Allegheny is in the Midwest Region and does not count towards the four) in each race plus the top five individuals not on those four teams qualify for regional competition Nov. 11 at Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Ohio.

Last year, The College of Wooster and Allegheny College took top honors in the men's and women's races, respectively. The men's title was Wooster's second in three years, while Allegheny's women's championship was its second in a row and fourth in five years. Denison University placed a close second in the men's race, followed by Allegheny, Oberlin College and Case Western Reserve University in the third, fourth and fifth positions -- just 21 points separated the top five teams. Allegheny's margin of victory on the women's side was a solid 42 points. Kenyon, Wooster and Oberlin rounded out the top four. Karl Knoll of Case Reserve and Sue Castor of Allegheny were the individual champions. The seven fastest finishers in each event receive first-team All-NCAC honors, while the next seven are designated second-team All-Conference.

Men's Championship Preview

Denison and Wooster have emerged as the favorites in what could be as much as a five team race. The Big Red have been at or near the top every week this fall, including a first at the Ohio Wesleyan Invitational, a second at Kenyon and thirds at Wooster and the GLCAs. Wooster is the only NCAC team to beat Denison head-to-head this season, posting a fourth to the Big Red's sixth in the 19-team college division field at the All-Ohio Championships, Oct. 12. The Scots also ran well at Kenyon and in their own invitational, notching a pair of fourth-place finishes.

Allegheny is something of a mystery, having competed outside Ohio for most of the year. The Gators won the six-team California (Pa.) Invitational early in the season and have finished below third at the NCAC Championships only once. They took home the inaugural North Coast title in 1984 and must be watched. Oberlin, which knocked off Wooster in a dual meet back in September, also should be a factor. The Yeomen fared well on championship terrain earlier in the year, placing third at the eight-team Kenyon Invitational.

Case Reserve, Conference champions in 1985, 1986 and 1988, will be looking to improve upon a disappointing fifth place finish a year ago. The youthful Spartans appear to be reaching their peak at the right time judging from a seventh-place finish (third among NCAC teams) at the All-Ohio event. Earlham, meanwhile, posted an impressive fifth-place finish at the highly-competitive GLCAs and could rise to the first division. Kenyon, Ohio Wesleyan and Wittenberg ran at the back of the pack last fall, but each has had at least one high finish this year and could make a move.

Individually, Denison sophomore **Mike Collyer (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)** is the leading returnee, having placed second at last year's NCAC Championships. Collyer won the Ohio Wesleyan and Wooster Invitationals this fall and was third at the GLCAs. The Wooster duo of sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)** and senior **Rob Noble (Pepper Pike, OH/Orange)** also are back after placing sixth and seventh last year, respectively.

Based on performances from the current season, other top contenders include Case Reserve freshman **Shaun Brown (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)**, Oberlin senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smokey Hill)**, Ohio Wesleyan senior **Darby Buroker (Lima, OH/Shawnee)**, Earlham junior **Scott Pearson (Cincinnati, OH/Finneytown)**, Allegheny sophomore **Colin Knisely (Burlington, IA/Oil City (PA))** and Wittenberg senior **John Comeskey (Tiffin, OH/Columbian)**.

Women's Championship Preview

Allegheny, which has run its way into the NCAA Top 20 in four of the last five years, is the favorite. The Gators have five of their top seven performers back from last season's NCAC championship team that finished eighth in the nation. This year, they are ranked fourth in Division III and have posted firsts in three different Invitationals.

Kenyon, Ohio Wesleyan and Wooster appear to be closely grouped right behind Allegheny. Ohio Wesleyan won the GLCA Meet and has placed second once and third twice this year; Kenyon was second at the GLCAs, third at Malone and fourth two other times; Wooster has been second at its own event, second again at Kenyon and third at the All-Ohio Championships.

The remainder of the field faces stern tests if they are to challenge any of the aforementioned teams, although Oberlin and Denison, with a number of impressive finishes to their credit, could surprise.

Individually, this could be one of the fastest races in NCAC history. Eleven of last year's top 14 finishers are back,

including six of seven first-team All-Conference selections. Kenyon junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)**, who was fourth last year, won her first five meets this season to establish herself as the favorite. She will be challenged most heavily by sophomore teammate **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)**, Allegheny seniors **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)** and **Kate Tiedemann (Skaneateles, NY/Skaneateles)**, and Wooster junior **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)**. Wilder finished a close second to Berghold at the GLCA and All Ohio events and she was third at Kenyon and Malone. Kohl has two wins on her ledger, at California (Pa.) and Ohio Wesleyan, as well as a second and a fourth, while Tiedemann placed second at Kenyon in one of her only outings of the year. Aeberli, meanwhile, won the Wooster Invitational and was fifth at the All-Ohio.

Denison senior **Kate Fechtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)**, Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/Westlake)**, Allegheny sophomore **Dee Buckhoff (Schenectady, NY/Guilderland)** and Oberlin senior **Liz Maurice (East Massapequa, NY/Amityville)** also could contend.

CLEVELAND, OH -- In the final tune-up before Saturday's NCAC Championships at Kenyon College, the men's field took on a slightly new perspective, with Ohio Wesleyan coming out of nowhere to run its best race of the season. Denison, which lost the 1989 Conference title by just four points to Wooster, captured second place in its own six-team invitational, trailing only Otterbein, 22-59. The surprise finish of the meet belonged to Ohio Wesleyan, which came in third with 91 points, outdistancing fourth place Wittenberg (98), fifth place Wooster (127) and sixth-place Oberlin (128). The Bishops, who finished ninth at last year's Conference Meet, had been running toward the back of the pack for most of 1990, while the team's they beat, Wooster in particular, had been placing towards the top. Leading NCAC hitters at the Denison Invitational included Wooster sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)**, who finished in fourth place at 25:43, Denison senior **Mike Behrendt (Stuttgart, Germany/American)**, who ran fifth at 26:04, and Ohio Wesleyan senior **Darby Buroker (Lima, OH/Shawnee)**, who crossed the finish line a step behind Behrendt in sixth at 26:05.

In other men's action, Kenyon placed fifth out of eight squads at the Queen City Invitational, Oct. 19, while Case Reserve ran eighth of nine at the University Athletic Association Championships in Boston, Oct. 20. The Lords were led by freshman **Scott Sherman (Western Springs, IL/Lyons Township)**, who took 24th with a run of 27:10, while the Spartans' top finisher was freshman **Shaun Brown (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)**, who came in 29th with a time of 29:15.

The North Coast women, meanwhile, came closer to following the script they've written so far this fall. Kenyon's Ladies, who were 1989 runners-up to Allegheny and have run very well this year, placed third of eight at the Queen City event. North Coast stickers clearly dominated the Midwest Field Hockey Coaches' Association Regionals, Oct. 19-20, with 11 of the 13 non-Conference matches won by NCAC teams. Oberlin took home the most victories three to finish off a 4-0 week. Senior **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, a two time All-America who spent last year studying overseas, swung the hot stick for the Yeowomen, scoring four goals and adding one assist, while senior goalie **Melissa Merrill (Baltimore, MD/Friends)** had 18 saves on the week. Bishop scoring honors were shared by three players with two goals each. CLEVELAND, OH What a difference a week makes! The North Coast Athletic Conference took on an entirely new personality as the NCAC Tournament, Nov. 2-3 at Earlham College, nears. KENYON, OHIO WESLEYAN TO MEET WITH NCAC CROWN ON THE LINE; LORDS RANKED SECOND NATIONALLY, OWU EIGHTH

CLEVELAND, OH -- In a game that could decide the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference championship, Kenyon College (6-0; 16-0) travels to Delaware, Ohio, to meet Ohio Wesleyan University (6-0; 15-3) on Wednesday, Oct. 24 at 7:30 p.m. The winner will clinch at least a share of the NCAC title, depending on the outcome of each team's remaining game. Kenyon, ranked second in the nation, must also play at third-place Wittenberg University (4-2; 13-4) this week, while eighth-ranked Ohio Wesleyan meets Case Western Reserve University (0-6; 1-11), Oct. 30.

Wooster (4-2, 12-4-1) and Wittenberg each have two games remaining in their battle for third place. The Scots are at Denison (1-4-1; 8-6-1) Oct. 24 and Earlham (2-3-1; 5-8-3) Oct. 27, while the Tigers take on Earlham Oct. 24 and Kenyon Oct. 27.

Last week, the NCAC went 5-2-1 against non-conference teams to move its overall record against outside competition to 59-24-5 (.699). Wittenberg posted one of those victories, 2-1 over Otterbein, on the way to establishing a new school record for wins in a season (13).

Ohio Wesleyan junior **Andy Kessinger (Westerville, OH/ Columbus DeSales)** has taken over the lead on the North Coast scoring chart and is now averaging 2.8 points per game. **DENISON, OHIO WESLEYAN AND WOOSTER CHASE
NORTH COAST CHAMPIONSHIP IN SEASON'S FINAL WEEK**

CLEVELAND, OH -- It's down to the wire, four key North Coast Athletic Conference contests in the final week of play will determine the 1990 NCAC champion. Ohio Wesleyan University (6-1; 15-3) holds a slim one point lead over The College of Wooster (5 0 1; 11 4 1) and a two point margin over Denison University (5-1; 13-4), but both of those teams still have two games remaining to one for the Bishops. Ohio Wesleyan is at Kenyon College (1-4-1; 7-8-1) and Wooster hosts Denison on Oct. 24, while Denison travels to Allegheny College (4-2; 9-8-1) and Wooster is home to Earlham College (1-5; 1-11) on Oct. 27.

If Wooster wins both of its games it will be crowned North Coast champion for the first time. Should Denison win twice, giving the Lady Scots their first Conference defeat, the Big Red are guaranteed at least a share of the title. In that situation, an Ohio Wesleyan win would make the Bishops and Denison co-champs. Ohio Wesleyan's scenario for an outright title, meanwhile, includes a win for itself and a Denison win over Wooster and an Allegheny victory against Denison.

Two NCAC teams are having their best seasons ever and have established new school records for victories, while also being ranked in the top 20 nationally. Wooster, under second-year head coach Nick Cowell, has posted a school-best 11 wins and is ranked 18th in the Division III poll. Ohio Wesleyan, under fifth-year head coach Margie Shade, has also broken its school record with 15 wins this season and is tied for 20th in the national rankings.

Individually, Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** continued her fine play last week. She is the North Coast's top scorer, averaging 2.8 points per game. Denison freshman **Heather Allred (Cincinnati, OH/ Wyoming)** is second on the scoring chart with an average of 2.2 points per game. In goal, Wooster freshman **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/ North Hills)** continues to lead the way with a 0.69 goals against average and seven shutouts.

ALLEGHENY EDGES OHIO WESLEYAN TO WIN NCAC TITLE;
OHIO WESLEYAN AND WITTENBERG TIED FOR SECOND

CLEVELAND, OH -- Allegheny College completed the Cinderella season for its rookie head coach Ken O'Keefe when it battled powerful Ohio Wesleyan University last Saturday and emerged with a 14-10 come-from-behind victory, taking the North Coast Athletic Conference football championship with a perfect 7-0 record.

Scoreless until the fourth quarter, Allegheny kept battling, getting a special teams touchdown from senior Dale Shaw (Tarentum, PA/Highlands) after a blocked punt by senior co captain David LaCarte (Charleroi, PA/Charleroi) to cut the Ohio Wesleyan lead to 10-7. The Gators then won it on a two-yard halfback pass from senior Jerry O'Brien (Pittsburgh, PA/North Catholic) to junior split end Jim Carroll (Portsmouth, RI/Wooster) with 34 seconds to play.

The championship is Allegheny's third in the last four years (won in 1987 and 1988) and will most certainly move the Gators up in the NCAA North Region rankings and put them in a position to be one of four teams selected from the region for the Division III Playoffs. Allegheny, which was ranked fifth heading into Saturday's game, should move up a couple of spots this week, passing Ohio Wesleyan and Millikin, which also lost. Dayton, Mount Union and Allegheny are the only prominent unbeaten teams in the region. The Gators, who have won seven in a row after a season opening tie, have two non conference games remaining (vs. Duquesne and Rochester) and need to win both to solidify a playoff spot.

The road for Ohio Wesleyan doesn't get any easier, and despite its 5-1 North Coast record (7-1 overall) the Bishops won't get second place by default. They have tough NCAC games remaining with Kenyon and Wittenberg, two teams that also have a shot at the runnerup spot.

It was an outstanding week of exciting NCAC action and among the happiest teams must be the Quakers of Earlham College, who won their first-ever North Coast game, 21-13 over Oberlin College.

Elsewhere, Kenyon College and The College of Wooster put on a tremendous display as the Lords, behind the passing of senior quarterback Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt), came from behind three times in the fourth quarter to edge the Fighting Scots, 27-24. Denison University got untracked as they romped in Cleveland, 33-7, in an uncharacteristic Denison-CWRU matchup. Wittenberg University, meanwhile, carried the NCAC flag high in Virginia as they defeated Old Dominion Athletic Conference champion Emory & Henry, 41-34, improving the NCAC's non-conference record to 12-7-1 (.625).

NCAC STANDINGS/THIS WEEK'S GAMES: Allegheny is the NCAC champ (7-0; 7-0-1), with Ohio Wesleyan (5-1; 7-1) and Wittenberg (5-1; 6-2) tied for second. Kenyon is finishing strong and has moved up to fourth (3-2; 5-3), while Denison has climbed to fifth (2-3; 5-3). Wooster (2-4; 2-6) is sixth, Case Reserve (1-4; 3-5) is seventh, Earlham (1-4; 2-6) is eighth and Oberlin (0-7; 1-7) is ninth to round out the standings. Allegheny has completed the NCAC portion of its schedule and will host Duquesne Saturday. In North Coast action, Case Reserve travels to Oberlin in the Conference finale for both teams, while Kenyon is at Ohio Wesleyan, Wittenberg is at Denison and Wooster is at Earlham.

KENYON TAKES FIRST NORTH COAST TITLE, RUNS UNBEATEN STRING TO 18; THREE NCAC TEAMS LOOK FOR NATIONAL BIDS

October 28, 1990

CLEVELAND, OH Kenyon College (8 0; 18 0), ranked second in nation, got the job done last week and earned its first North Coast Athletic Conference title. With the NCAC championship comes automatic qualification to the NCAA Division III Tournament.

A 2-1 win over Ohio Wesleyan (6-1; 15-4), Oct. 24, guaranteed the Lords at least a share of the title. Freshman **Geoffrey Thompson (Canton, OH/McKinley)** was credited with the game-winner in that contest on a scramble in front of the goal late in the second half. Kenyon wrapped up the outright title by edging Wittenberg (4-3-1; 13-5-1), 1-0 in overtime, Oct. 27. Junior **Jeff Dawson (Shaker Heights, OH/Shaker Heights)** scored to provide the difference in that one.

As long as Ohio Wesleyan, which is ranked seventh in Division III, defeats Case Reserve on Oct. 30, the Bishops will finish second in the NCAC. Wooster (6 2; 14 4 1), which is tied for 19th in the national poll, and Wittenberg (4 3 1; 13 5 1) are third and fourth, respectively. A three way tie for fifth exists between Allegheny (3 5, 11 7 1), which has won five games in a row, Earlham (2 4 2; 5 9 4) and Oberlin (3 5; 8 8 2), while Denison (1-6-1; 8-8-1) is eighth and Case Reserve (0-7; 1-13) ninth.

Ohio Wesleyan junior **Andy Kessinger (Westerville, OH/DeSales)** and Wooster senior **Ian Banda (Blantyre, Malawi/Phwezi)** continue to stand one two in the Conference scoring race. Kessinger is averaging 2.6 points per game, while Banda is at 2.3 ppg. In goal, Wittenberg junior **Scott DeBolt (Bloomington, MN/Jefferson)** regained the lead over Kenyon freshman **Marshall Chapin (Millburn, NJ/Millburn)**. Both are having outstanding seasons with 0.58 and a 0.61 goals against averages, respectively. DeBolt also has nine shutouts.

This week, besides the Ohio Wesleyan-Case Reserve game, there are several non-conference contests to be played in which the NCAC will have a chance to improve upon its 60-25-6 (.692) mark against outside competition.

Kenyon, with the automatic qualifier, is already in the 32-team NCAA Tournament field, while Ohio Wesleyan and Wooster are in the running for at-large bids. Pairings and sites of this weekend's four-team regionals will be announced early in the week.

OHIO WESLEYAN AND WOOSTER SHARE NORTH COAST TITLE, AWAIT WORD ON POSSIBLE NCAA INVITATIONS

October 28, 1990

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University (7-1; 16-3) and The College of Wooster (6-0-2; 12-4-2) will share the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference title. The co-championship is the second in a row for Ohio Wesleyan and the first in Wooster's history. In the Division III national poll, Ohio Wesleyan is ranked 16th, while Wooster received votes but was not listed in the top 20.

For the second consecutive season, Denison (5-1-2; 13-4-2) played a decisive role in determining the NCAC champion. The Big Red held Wooster to a 0-0 tie, Oct. 24, dropping the Lady Scots into a deadlock with Ohio Wesleyan. Last year, Denison knocked off Allegheny in the final week of the regular season to drop the Gators into a tie with Ohio Wesleyan. Wooster, which needed two wins last week to take the title outright, defeated Earlham over the weekend to ensure the co-championship.

Denison closed out the year in third place, followed by Allegheny (5-2-1; 10-8-2) in fourth. Allegheny had won or shared the previous five North Coast titles, while Denison took the Conference's inaugural championship in 1984. Case Reserve (3-5; 4-9-2) is fifth, followed by Kenyon (2-5-1; 8-9-1) in sixth, Wittenberg (2-6; 8-9) and Oberlin (2-6; 6-11-1) in a tie for seventh and Earlham (1-7; 2-13) in ninth.

Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** continues to lead the NCAC in scoring. Last week, she scored two of the Bishops' goals in a 4-1 win over Kenyon to improve her scoring average to 2.9 points per game. She also leads the conference in assists with ten. In goal, Wooster freshman **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/North Hills)** tops the charts with a 0.60 goals against average. She has posted nine shutouts as has Denison sophomore **Jane Wildman (Amarillo, TX/Cape Elizabeth)**, who is second in goals against average with a 0.84 mark.

The NCAC regular-season schedule is complete, but several teams have non-conference games remaining. The North Coast's record against outside competition currently stands at 46-37-4 (.552). Ohio Wesleyan and Wooster, meanwhile, are in the running for spots in the 16 team NCAA Tournament. Pairings and sites will be announced early this week with first and second round games to be played Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 3-4.

DENISON WINS FIRST-EVER MEN'S TITLE;

ALLEGHENY WOMEN RACE TO THIRD STRAIGHT CROWN

GAMBIER, OH -- Denison University, with four runners placing among the top 14 finishers, won its first ever men's crown, and Allegheny College, with six of the fastest 14, successfully defended its women's title at the North Coast Athletic Conference Championships, Saturday, Oct. 27, at Kenyon College. Individual titles were won by The College of Wooster's sensational sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)**, who covered the men's 8,000-meter course in 26:30.8, and Kenyon's junior jet **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)**, who traversed the women's 5000 meters in 18:21.4.

Denison, led by Coach-of-the-Year **Phil Torrens**, totaled 53 points to cop the men's title. Oberlin College placed second with 88 points, while Allegheny College was third with 104 and defending champion Wooster was fourth with 105. Earlham College finished fifth (125), followed by Kenyon (127), Case Western Reserve University (147), Ohio Wesleyan University (151) and Wittenberg University (178) in positions six through nine, respectively. Individually, Wooster's Kelley (26:30.8) is probably not finished making NCAC headlines. Only a sophomore, he placed sixth at the 1989 NCAC Championships and cut almost 30 seconds off that time to win the 1990 crown and earn men's Most Valuable Performer honors. Oberlin senior **Kelly Gillespie (Aurora, CO/Smokey Hill)** ran second in 26:41.3, while Denison sophomore **Mike Collyer (Bethesda, MD/Whitman)** placed third in 26:47.6. Two freshmen ran well enough to earn first team All-NCAC honors (top seven finishers) -- Case Reserve's **Shaun Brown (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)** was fourth in 26:53.4 and Kenyon's **Scott Sherman (Western Springs, IL/Lyons Township)** ran seventh in 26:59.2. The remaining two first-team spots were claimed by Earlham junior **Scott Pearson (Cincinnati, OH/Finneytown)**, who finished fifth in 26:55.5, and Oberlin junior **Matt Nemeth (Auburntown, TN/Webb)**, who was sixth in 26:56.8.

On the women's side, Coach-of-the-Year **Ralph White** led the Gators to their third consecutive NCAC title and their fifth in the last six years. Allegheny, ranked third nationally, scored 31 points and cruised to a 47-point victory over second-place Kenyon (78). The Ladies, who also were second in 1989, finished a step ahead of third-place Ohio Wesleyan (79). Wooster (90) placed fourth, followed by Denison (146), Oberlin (155), Wittenberg (194), Earlham (197) and Case Reserve (200) in spots five through nine, respectively. The women ran a fast race, with the top three finishers each breaking 19 minutes and finishers four through 10 coming in under 20 minutes. Kenyon's Berghold (18:21.4), who won six of seven starts this fall, culminated her sensational season by outdistancing the field to earn women's Most Valuable Performer honors. Also breaking the 19-minute barrier were Allegheny seniors **Katie Tiedemann (Skanateles, NY/Skanateles)**, who finished second in 18:39.1, and **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**, who ran third in 18:41.0. Leading the pack of under 20 minute finishers was Wooster junior **Beth Blakemore (Golden, CO/Wheat Ridge)**, who finished in the fourth position in 19:13.0, followed in spots five through 10 by Kenyon sophomore **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)**, Allegheny freshman **Serena Fraser (Williamsville, NY/Clarence)**, Denison senior **Kate Fachtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)**, Allegheny sophomore **Dee Buckhoff (Schenectady, NY/Guilderland)**, Wooster junior **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)** and Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Allison Taylor (Westlake, OH/Westlake)**.

According to NCAC guidelines, the top four men's and women's teams at the Conference Championships, as well as the top five individual finishers not on one of those teams, will now progress to regional competition. Men's squads from Denison, Oberlin, Wooster and Earlham and women's teams from Kenyon, Ohio Wesleyan, Wooster and Denison will compete in the Great Lakes Regionals at Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Ohio, on the same date.

**OBERLIN, WOOSTER, DENISON VIE FOR RUNNER-UP POSITIONS
BEHIND CHAMP OHIO WESLEYAN; OWU, OBERLIN HOPE FOR NCAA BIDS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- All three remaining North Coast Athletic Conference games are headline events, as Oberlin College, The College of Wooster and Denison University are battling right down to the wire for runner up NCAC positions behind Ohio Wesleyan University, which has already clinched its fourth consecutive Conference championship. The Yeowomen (6 4 1; 11 6 1), who are currently tied for second place with the Fighting Scots (6 4 1; 8 7 1), have the unenviable task of taking on the Bishops in Delaware on Tuesday, Oct. 30. That same day, Wooster invades Springfield to take on fifth-place Wittenberg University (4-5-2; 7-7-6), while Earlham (0 9 1; 5 10-1) will try for a Halloween upset of the visiting Big Red (6-5-0; 9-6-0). Kenyon College (3-7-1; 7-9-1), which last fall copped its first NCAA Tournament bid on the basis of a strong second-place NCAC finish, has completed its most disappointing season in recent history, finishing 1990 in sixth place.

In its most crucial week of the season, Wooster leapt past Denison into a second place tie with Oberlin based on a 1-0 shutout of the Yeowomen and a 3-1 victory over the Big Red. Senior forward **Kathy Osta (Oak Park, IL/Oak Park)** scored the lone goal against Oberlin and combined with junior forward **Carissa Conner (Freeport, ME/Freeport)** and junior middle **Clara Mitchell (Chadds Ford, PA/Kennett)** for the scoring punch against Denison.

Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baier (Rockville MD/Magruder)**, the NCAC's leading goalie with a .952 saves percentage, established a new Conference record as she recorded her 360th save of the season in the Tigers' 2-1 triumph over Kenyon. Oberlin senior **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, who has become the Yeowomen's most prolific scorer with 87 points in just three seasons, continues to lead the Conference scoring race with 2.1 points per game. She is followed by Ohio Wesleyan senior **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** and Denison senior **Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's)**, at 1.9 ppg, and OWU junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)** at 1.8 ppg.

Ohio Wesleyan, which has made three consecutive post-season appearances, and Oberlin are awaiting word on possible NCAA Tournament bids. Pairings and sites will be announced Monday, Oct. 29, with first and second round games to be played Friday and Saturday, Nov. 2-3.

**DENISON COPS TOP NCAC TOURNAMENT SEED;
KENYON BLEMISHES BIG RED'S PERFECT NCAC RECORD**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Kenyon College (6-2; 19-17) last week dealt Denison University (7-1; 24-11) its only defeat of the North Coast Athletic Conference regular season in preparation for this weekend's NCAC Championships, Friday and Saturday, Nov. 2-3 at Earlham College. Despite the setback, Denison has earned the top seed for the tournament, edging defending champion Allegheny College (7-1; 25-12) in a tiebreaker due to a head-to-head victory earlier in the year. The Gators, ranked fifth in the NCAA East Region, are the second seed, while Kenyon is third. The fourth spot goes to Wittenberg University (5-3; 25-8), which has the most overall victories and best winning percentage (.758) of all NCAC teams, while Ohio Wesleyan University (5-3; 8-20) is sixth. Earlham (3-5; 17-19), The College of Wooster (2-6; 7-23), Case Western Reserve University (1-7; 9-17) and Oberlin College (0-8; 6-25) round out the tournament seeding in spots six through nine, respectively.

Allegheny junior **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)** continues to lead the NCAC with an average of 4.5 kills per game, followed closely by Kenyon senior **Judy Hruska (Rocky River, OH/Lakewood)**, who is averaging 4.3 per game. The leading setter is Denison junior **Anne Carek (Bowling Green, OH/Bowling Green)** with an average of 9.3 assists per game, while Wittenberg freshman **Beth Green (Wooster, OH/Wooster)** dominates the digs category with a 5.7 average.

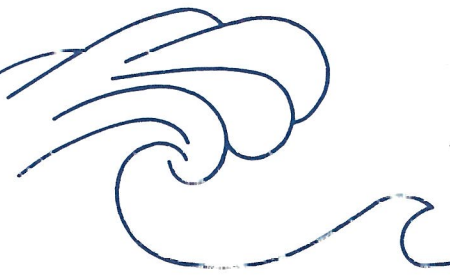

CLEVELAND, OH -- Wittenberg University senior forward **Suzie Sauers** and Kenyon College freshman goalie **Marshall Chapin** were named women's and men's soccer "Players of the Week", respectively, for their play last week in the North Coast Athletic Conference.

Sauers (Cincinnati, OH/Turpin) recorded a hat trick in a 6-0 win over Earlham last week. On the year, she has 13 goals and six assists and is ranked third in the North Coast in scoring with an average 1.9 points per game. Wittenberg is 8-9 overall and 2-6 in the NCAC.

Chapin (Millburn, NJ/Millburn) led the Lords to a pair of victories last week, securing their first NCAC championship. Kenyon edged Ohio Wesleyan, 2-1, and Wittenberg, 1-0, with Chapin registering a total of 13 saves. On the year, he has been credited with 5.5 shutouts and is second in the Conference with a 0.61 goals-against average. The Lords are 18-0 overall, 8-0 in the NCAC and ranked second in Division III.

THE WARGA WATCH: All-America (how about All-World!) candidate **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, a senior tailback for Wittenberg, is on a tear. In the big inter-sectional win over Emory & Henry, Warga rushed 34 times for 264 yards to boost his season total to 1,533, establishing a new NCAC single-season rushing record. The former record of 1,406 yards was set by Denison's All-America tailback Chris Spriggs in 1984 -- the North Coast's inaugural season. Warga, who has five 200-yard performances on the year, also has broken the Wittenberg single-season mark of 1,351 yards set by All-America Dave Merritt in 1977. The 6-0, 185-pound Warga also has smashed Sprigg's NCAC single-game rushing mark of 230 this season with a 288-yard outburst against Kenyon. Wittenberg, which is 6-2 overall and 5-1 in Conference action, still has two games to play.

DYNAMIC DUO: Wittenberg seniors **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)** and **Jeff Stockdale (Springfield, OH/North)** have combined for 2,166 yards this season, putting them well within reach of the NCAA Division III record for yards gained rushing by two players on the same team -- 2,384 set by Ricky Gales (2,035) and Brian Tate (349) of Simpson College last year. Warga has an NCAC-record 1,533 yards, while Stockdale has 633.

Kenyon sophomore **Lisa Weisman (Del Mar, CA/Torrey Pines)** was one of only eight Division III athletes to compete in the Rolex Singles Tennis Championships, Oct. 19-21 in Corpus Christi, Texas.

RECORD BREAKERS: Oberlin's **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, a senior on the Yeowoman field hockey team, has become the school's all-time leading scorer with 88 career points. Oberlin (6-4-1; 11-6-1), ranked 20th in Division III, has already surpassed the team record for victories in a season... Wittenberg's **Chris Hill (Roanoke, VA/Pittsford Mendon (NY))**, a junior on the Tiger football team, has broken the school's career record for kickoff return yardage (1,101). In addition, he is just 14 yards short of the career punt return yardage mark. Wittenberg's men's soccer and volleyball teams have broken school records for wins in 1990. The men's soccer team closed out the season at 13-5-1, while the volleyball squad is 25-8 entering this weekend's NCAC Championships... CREIGHTON UNCANNY IN COMEBACK: Senior quarterback **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)** of Kenyon put on an outstanding display of passing Saturday in the Lords' 27-24 come-from-behind win at Wooster. The 1989 NCAC Offensive Player of the Year brought his team back three times in the fourth quarter as he hit on 30-of-44 passes for 334 yards and four touchdowns. MORE KENYON-WOOSTER HEROES: Wooster's junior tailback **Brian Grandison (Akron, OH/East)** had another excellent game versus the Lords, as he bobbed and weaved for 214 yards on 39 carries. The Scots were driving in Kenyon territory when time ran out. The ultimate hero in this game was Kenyon junior linebacker **Mike Menges (Bethesda, OH/Union)**, who intercepted a Wooster pass deep in his own territory with one minute remaining in the game. Menges, the Lords' leading tackler with 153 on the year, added 17 more versus the Scots.

MORE GRID HEROES: Sophomore linebacker **Chad McGowan (Beavercreek, OH/Beavercreek)** had 15 tackles -- 11 solo -- to lead Earlham to its first NCAC win. Freshman fullback **James Barber (Marion, IN/Marion)** was the Quakers' offensive star with 87 yards rushing on 22 carries and two catches for 21 yards. He scored all three of Earlham's touchdowns... Junior linebacker **Gregg Turk (Wickliffe, OH/Lake Catholic)** led Case Reserve's defense with 16 tackles against Denison... Allegheny junior flanker **Julio LaCayo (Annandale, VA/Annandale)** was the offensive star for the Gators against Ohio Wesleyan, collecting seven receptions for 82 yards, including a clutch 28-yarder on a third-and-12 situation during the game-winning touchdown drive... Ohio Wesleyan All-America defensive end **Neil Ringers (Ridgefield, CT/Ridgefield)** played like his adjectives in the loss to the Gators, recording five solo tackles, two sacks and two tackles for losses. Ringers also broke up a pass and forced and recovered a fumble... Big Bishop fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)**, a senior, had 127 yards rushing and a touchdown on 33 carries... Denison's **Reid Lederer (Shelby, OH/Shelby)**, a senior defensive back, picked off his eighth pass of the season Saturday, tying an NCAC single-season record.

RICHMOND, IN -- Tradition, a valuable commodity at all nine North Coast Athletic Conference schools, has been set aside, or perhaps dug and killed, by the Denison University volleyball squad this fall. For the first time in five years it appears that the NCAC Championship will be more than a contest between traditionally strong Allegheny College, which has won two consecutive and three of the last five North Coast championships, and Kenyon College, which copped back-to-back titles in 1986 and 1987. Denison, with a 7-1 record in Conference play, has earned the top seed for the Tournament to be played Friday and Saturday, Nov. 2-3, at Earlham College in Richmond, Ind. Allegheny will attempt to defend its title from the second position, while Kenyon is seeded third and Wittenberg University fourth. Ohio Wesleyan University is fifth, followed by Earlham, The College of Wooster, Case Western Reserve University and Oberlin College in spots six through nine, respectively.

Denison (7-1; 24-11) was an unknown entity at the start of 1990. Although the Big Red were coming off their finest year ever, having posted the first 20 win season in school history while placing fourth at the NCAC Championships, second-year head coach Sara Lee had a number of holes to fill with only one senior and five letterwinners returning. Not only has Lee filled the holes, she has turned them into mountains as Denison has earned the Conference's top seed and established a new school record for victories. Junior setter **Anne Carek (Bowling Green, OH/Bowling Green)** has been the Big Red's floor leader this season, topping both the team and the NCAC in assists with an average of 9.3 per game. The attack has been effectively led by senior **Katy Pongonis (Cincinnati, OH/McNicholas)**, a first-team All-Conference selection a year ago, and junior **Beth Wright (Bowling Green, OH/Bowling Green)**, who have averaged 3.7 and 2.6 kills per game, respectively. Junior outside hitter **Mary Cervino (Akron, OH/St. Vincent-St. Mary)** leads Denison defensively with an average of 4.4 digs per game.

The top-seeded Big Red can expect quite a battle from defending champion **Allegheny (7-1; 25-12)**, whose only Conference blemish was a nail-biting 15-13, 15-12 loss to Denison. The Gators have been ranked in the top five in the NCAA's East Region all season and are coming off an impressive third-place showing at the Elizabethtown Tournament. Fifth-year head coach Bridget Sheehan entered the 1990 campaign with a young squad, but the play of talented junior co-captains **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)** and **Renea Surrena (Grove City, PA/Grove City)** has more than made up for the team's lack of seniors. Dietz, a dominating 6-1 middle hitter who was the 1989 NCAC Player of the Year, leads the Conference offensively with an average of 4.5 kills per game. Surrena, meanwhile, is one of the North Coast's finest setters, contributing 9.1 assists per game. Junior outside hitter **Kristen McLaren (Girard, PA/Villa Maria)** joins Dietz on the frontline and is averaging over two kills a game.

Kenyon (6-2; 19-17) upset Denison in the final week of the regular season to ensure the #3 seed. Despite a somewhat sporadic campaign, the Ladies are always a force come tournament time, having placed second in each of the last two years after taking the top spot in 1986 and 1987. First-year head coach Nancy Roberts' spikers are led by senior hitter **Judy Hruska (Rocky River, OH/Lakewood)**, who has team-high averages of 4.3 kills and 4.6 digs a game, senior back row specialist **Jane Gerace (Cleveland, OH/St. Joseph)**, who averages 4.3 digs, and sophomore setter **Kelly Raymond (Akron, OH/Western Reserve)**, who averages 5.0 assists.

The surprise team of 1990 is **Wittenberg (5-3; 25-8)**, which has rebounded from a 10-27 season to break the school record for wins. Despite a slight late-season slump that has dropped them to the fourth seed, the Tigers should be a solid contender for the title. Second-year head coach Cynthia Holliday's squad is led by the solid hitting duo of freshmen **Beth Green (Wooster, OH/Wooster)** and **Jennifer Parsons (Bowling Green, OH/Eastwood)**, who are among the leaders in the NCAC in kills with averages of 4.2 and 3.0 per game, respectively. Green, who led the Conference in kills for much of the year, remains on top of the circuit in digs with 5.7 per game. Senior **Yvonne Wilson (Columbus, OH/Watterson)** is an excellent setter with an average of 9.2 assists per game, while junior **Megan Hiller (Evanston, IL/Township)** provides solid all-around play and is averaging 4.5 digs a contest.

- MORE -

After a slow start, **Ohio Wesleyan** (5-3; 8-20) has come back to earn the fifth seed. Included in the Bishops' 5-3 NCAC record is a three-set victory against third-seeded Kenyon -- they also own three-set wins over Earlham and Wooster. What veteran head coach Mary Parker's team lacks in size and experience, they more than compensate for with quickness and determination. The scrappy Bishops' most consistent player is junior setter **Kim Pfahler (Bloomfield, OH/Bucyrus Wynford)**, who is among the Conference leaders with 3.8 assists per game. Sophomore utility player **Marcie Kessinger (Westerville, OH/DeSales)** also has been a major contributor.

Earlham (3-5; 17-19) entered last year's NCAC Championships as the third seed only to lose two quick matches and exit in a tie for eighth. This season, head coach Jerry Middleton hopes to rework that scenario and emerge as a contender from the sixth seed. Talented junior hitter **Jodie Bauman (Columbus, OH/Bexley)**, a first-team All-Conference pick in 1989, leads the Quaker attack with an average of 4.2 kills per game -- third best in the NCAC. She is joined by sophomore **Nikki Welch (Mahomet, IL/Mahomet-Seymour)**, the team's second-leading hitter, and junior setter **Becky Shelton (Rushville, IN/Rushville)**, who contributes 4.9 assists a game.

Wooster (2-6; 7-23) put together a run in last year's tournament, finishing third despite a 16-27 overall record. It will be first-year head coach Barb Davis' job to try and summon that type of charge again as the Lady Scots come in as the seventh seed. Senior outside hitter **Carolyn Bare (Chagrin Falls, OH/Chagrin Falls)**, Wooster's all time leader in kills, leads the team in that category with an average of 3.8 per game. She is supported on the attack by senior **Germaine Temple (Sante Fe, NM/Prep)**, who is averaging 2.6 kills per game. In the backcourt, sophomore **Jennifer Kuhns (Columbus, OH/Hartley)** averages 3.9 assists per game.

While a long shot as far as the NCAC title is concerned, eighth-seeded **Case Reserve** (1-7; 9-17) has shown marked improvement in 1990. The Spartans posted only one win last year, but veteran head coach Mina Moore seems to have things back on track with a number of talented young players on hand. Heading that group are freshmen **Jolie Lewis (Stow, OH/Stow)** and **Erika Weliczko (Chicago, IL/Mother McAuley)**, who average 2.9 kills and 4.1 assists per game, respectively. Junior **Lisa Encarnacion (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)** also is having a fine season and is seventh in the Conference in kills with an average of 3.0 per game.

Oberlin (0-8; 6-25) is not expected to be a major factor in the battle for this year's title, but the Yeowomen do have the capability to play the role of spoilers. After fifth-place finishes at the NCAC Championships in each of the last two years, Oberlin has been hurt by a number of losses due to graduation and overseas study. Sophomores **Diana Guan (San Jose, CA/Prospect)** and **Lisa Soohoo (Cambridge, MA/Cambridge-Rindge)** lead this year's squad.

**OHIO WESLEYAN TO BATTLE WITTENBERG FOR NCAC
RUNNER UP SPOT ON FINAL FOOTBALL, SATURDAY, NOV. 10**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University will travel to Springfield, Ohio, on the final football Saturday of the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference campaign to battle Wittenberg University for second place in the Conference.

Both teams are tied with 6-1 NCAC marks, so the winner will come away with sole possession of the runner up spot behind Conference champion Allegheny College. The Ohio Wesleyan-Wittenberg game shapes up as an old-time, classic football season finale, pitting two squads with powerful rushing attacks and outstanding defenses. All that they need is a little mud!

Wittenberg, under second-year head coach Doug Neibuh, showcases the NCAC's top rushing attack, averaging 333 yards per game. The Tigers feature the nation's top rusher in senior tailback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, who has averaged an almost unthinkable 191 yards a game this season. Warga is complemented by senior fullback **Jeff Stockdale (Springfield, OH/North)**, who has gained 716 yards. The two have combined to set an NCAA Division III record for rushing yards in a season by two players on the same team.

Though the Wittenberg defense is ranked third in the NCAC, allowing 297 yards per game, it cannot compete with the glossy numbers of Ohio Wesleyan's unit, which has allowed just 152 yards per game to rank among the nation's best. Fourth-year head coach Mike Hollway's Bishops are at their best against the rushing game -- giving up a miniscule average of 11.7 yards per game. In addition to that great defense, Ohio Wesleyan leads the Conference in total offense (408 ypg) and is second in rushing (331 ypg). Offensively, senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)** is putting the finishing touches on his third straight 1,000 yard rushing season for the Bishops.

Week nine of the NCAC campaign was an explosive one, with winning teams averaging close to 37 points. Case Western Reserve University battled to a 34-28 win over Oberlin College, which was on the Spartan two-yard line in the game's final minute. In their first meeting ever, The College of Wooster took an early 18-0 lead over host Earlham College, but had to turn on all the burners down the stretch to get past the Quakers, 44-29. Denison University, which ended Wittenberg's 34 year streak of winning seasons last fall, staged another heated battle against the Tigers, but this time Wittenberg prevailed, 24-21, on a late field goal. Ohio Wesleyan got past Kenyon 30-20 and, in non conference action, NCAC champ Allegheny buried Duquesne, 51-0.

NCAC STANDINGS/THIS WEEK'S GAMES: On the merits of its win over Ohio Wesleyan last week, NCAC champion Allegheny has jumped to third in the NCAA Division III North Region rankings. In their season finale, the Gators are on the road against Rochester, a dangerous opponent whose 5-4 record may be misleading. The Yellowjackets made the playoffs in 1989 and are coming off a 27-6 win over St. John Fisher. An Allegheny victory should secure a post-season invitation. In addition to the Ohio Wesleyan-Wittenberg battle for second place, Kenyon needs a win at Earlham to claim fourth, but it won't be easy as the eighth-place Quakers have improved all season. Wooster also will be gunning for a fourth place NCAC finish as it entertains Denison. Case Reserve and Oberlin have completed their NCAC schedules and will have to be content with improving the North Coast's 13-7-1 (.643) non-conference record. The Spartans host Carnegie Mellon, while the Yeomen travel east to take on Swarthmore.

NAMED NCAC FOOTBALL "PLAYERS OF THE WEEK"

CLEVELAND, OH -- Case Western Reserve University freshman halfback **Jarvis Gibson** and College of Wooster sophomore safety **Jim Gordon** were named offensive and defensive football "Players of the Week", respectively, for their play last week in the North Coast Athletic Conference.

Gibson (Cleveland, OH/South), a 6'1", 180-pounder, amassed 190 yards of offense and scored two touchdowns in Case Reserve's 34-28 win over Oberlin. He rushed for a career-high 125 yards on 15 carries, including a 51-yard burst for a touchdown. Gibson also caught two passes for 65 yards, including a 61-yarder for a score. The Spartans are 4-5 overall and 2-4 in the NCAC.

Gordon (Bexley, OH/Columbus Acad.), a 5-8, 160-pounder, led the Wooster defense in a 44-29 victory against Earlham. He had 10 tackles, recovered a fumble, broke up one pass and intercepted another on the day. For the year, Gordon leads the Scots in tackles (128) and pass breakups (10) and is tied for the top spot in interceptions (3). Wooster is 3-4 in the North Coast and 3-6 overall.

FANTASTIC FOOTBALL: Allegheny sophomore tailback **Stanley Drayton (Cleveland, OH/John Marshall)** had his second 100-yard game of the season with 110 yards on just nine carries in the Gators' 51-0 rout of Duquesne. His 69-yard scoring run midway through the third quarter was Allegheny's longest run from scrimmage this year.... Case Reserve senior defensive back **Mike Bissler (Stow, OH/Stow)** preserved the Spartans' 34-28 win over Oberlin by intercepting a pass in his own end zone on a fourth-and-goal play from the two with less than 30 seconds remaining.... Wooster's junior tailback **Brian Grandison (Akron, OH/East)** had his third straight 100-yard game with 187 yards on 33 carries in the Scots' 44-29 win over Earlham. He also tied an NCAC record with four rushing touchdowns.... Earlham freshman **James Barber (Marion, IN/Marion)** rushed for three touchdowns against Wooster, the second consecutive week that he has scored three times on the ground.... In just under two seasons, Earlham's sophomore quarterback **John Wortham (Dayton, OH/Meadowdale)** has eclipsed Quaker career records for passing yards (3,376) and total offense (3,554)... Kenyon tight end **Sean McCabe (Ann Arbor, MI/Pioneer)** accounted for 14 points in the Lords' 30-20 loss to Ohio Wesleyan. In addition to catching eight passes for 95 yards and two touchdowns, McCabe kicked a pair of extra points to extend his string of successful PATs to 13 (tying a Kenyon single-season record)... Oberlin got a big day from junior tailback **Tyrone Reynolds (Youngstown, OH/Chaney)**, who ran for 143 yards on 22 carries. He also rushed for three scores, including two during the Yeomen's fourth-quarter comeback which fell just short in a 34-28 loss to Case Reserve.... Ohio Wesleyan freshman quarterback **Jimmy Clark (Sharon, PA/Sharon)** threw for two first-quarter scores helping the Bishops to an early 18-0 lead in their 30-20 triumph over Kenyon. On the day, Clark ended up completing 11-of-18 passes for 102 yards and the two touchdowns.... Senior end **Mark Glaser (Westerville, OH/North)** had 10 tackles to lead the Bishop defensive effort. Eight of his tackles were solo and he also added a sack and an interception.

THE PLAYOFF PICTURE: With its 51-0 win over Duquesne Saturday, Allegheny (7-0; 8-0-1) will likely remain in the third spot in the NCAA Division III North Region rankings. The top four teams in the region will qualify for the post-season playoffs. The Gators, who made a post-season appearance in 1987, trail only top-ranked Dayton and Mount Union. Millikin entered the weekend ranked fourth, followed by Ohio Wesleyan (6-1; 8-1) in fifth and Augustana in sixth. All six teams won over the weekend; Dayton and Mt. Union remain undefeated, while Millikin and Augustana, who play this Saturday, have one loss apiece.... Allegheny's win over Duquesne Saturday came in only the second meeting ever between the two teams. The Gators also won the first, 41-3, in 1914 on the way to a 6-0-1 season -- one of only three undefeated seasons (1917 and 1987 are the others) in the school's 94-year football history. Allegheny can make that four undefeated seasons with a win at Rochester (5-4) this week.

NCAC Swim Relays

DENISON MEN, ALLEGHENY WOMEN SPLASH TO VICTORIES AT NCAC SWIM RELAYS, SATURDAY, NOV. 3

SPRINGFIELD, OH -- Head coach Tom Erdos' Allegheny Gators made the loudest splash at Saturday's season-opening NCAC Relays, setting four meet records en route to winning the women's event and placing second to Denison in the men's. Allegheny's women scored 118 points to outdistance Kenyon, which finished second with 100 points. The Ladies, winners of seven consecutive NCAA Division III national titles, were followed by perennially strong Denison in third (72 points) and Wooster (50), Wittenberg (48), Ohio Wesleyan (42), Case Reserve (2) and Oberlin (0) in places four through eight, respectively. Allegheny won both women's diving events and five of the eight swimming relays, with record-setting times in four of them -- the 200 medley (1:54.99); 500 crescendo (4:51.76); 1500 free (15:58.91); and 400 medley (4:18.88). Kenyon won the remaining three swim events.

The results were much closer on the men's side, with Denison edging Allegheny by just six points and Kenyon by 14. The Big Red won five of the eight relays to score 90 points. The Gators, meanwhile, won both diving events and one relay to tally 84 points, while the Lords, who have won 11 consecutive NCAA championships, copped two swim races to finish with 76. Oberlin (56) placed fourth, followed by Wittenberg (40), Ohio Wesleyan (30), Case Reserve (14) and Wooster (10) in places four through eight, respectively. Denison senior **Adam Kamlet (Mansfield, OH/Malabar)** was in on all five winning events for the Big Red, while sophomore **Dave DeWitt (Holland, MI/Holland)** was part of four first-place efforts.

WAVES.....Add One

DYNAMIC DUO: Wittenberg seniors **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)** and **Jeff Stockdale (Springfield, OH/North)** have combined for 2,472 yards this season, breaking the NCAA Division III record for yards gained by two players on the same team. Warga, the 'Tigers' tailback, has an NCAC-record and Division III-leading 1,756 yards on the year, while Stockdale, the fullback, has 716. Warga has had six 200-yard games this fall and already has the fourth-best single-season rushing total in NCAA Division III history -- only 57 yards away from the second-best. The record of 2,035 was set last season by Ricky Gales of Simpson.... Wittenberg has 2,999 yards rushing as a team, breaking the single-season school record set in 1979.

FOOTNOTES: The Wittenberg men's soccer team, which finished 13-5-1 overall and in fourth place in the NCAC at 4-3-1, established single-season school records this year for wins, assists (49) and least goals allowed (13), while tying the season mark for goals (51). The Wooster women's team had the best season in its six-year history, posting a 12-4-3 overall record and sharing the NCAC title with Ohio Wesleyan.... Allegheny's men's soccer squad, which finished 12-7-1 overall, also set single-season school records for wins and goals (61). This is the third season in a row that the Gators have re-established the school record for victories.... Ohio Wesleyan sophomore forward **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** led the Bishop women's team to a best-ever 16-3 record and a share of its second straight North Coast championship. Knapp tied her own school record with 21 goals this fall and added 10 assists for a school record 52 points.

LIMBERING UP: The Allegheny women's cross country team, ranked third nationally, tuned -up for next weekend's NCAA Mideast Regionals in Allentown, Pa., by winning the 11-team Rochester Invitational on Nov. 3. It was the Gators' fifth invitational championship of the 1990 season. Allegheny, which won its third consecutive (and fifth in the last six years) NCAC title on Oct. 27, is two-time defending champs of the Mideast Regional.

MAKING A SPLASH: Seven North Coast women and three NCAC men were recently named to the 1990 College Swim Coaches' Association of America Division III All Academic Team. To be honored, a student-athlete must maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.5 and qualify for NCAA competition in the pool. The NCAC performers named were Denison's **Laura Foradori (Seville, OH/Cloverleaf)**, **Kara Krafft (Cincinnati, OH/Turpin)** and **Dave DeWitt (Holland, MI/Holland)**; Kenyon's **Jennifer Carter (Cincinnati, OH/Turpin)**, **Beth Kremer (Silver Spring, MD/Springbrook)**, **Becky Little (Bethlehem, PA/Liberty)**, **Kami Mathews (Troy, OH/Troy)**, **Laura Robinson (Grand Rapids, MI/Forest Hills Central)** and **Geoff Basler (Lincoln, NE/Southeast)**; and Oberlin's **Dave Stevenson (Tulsa, OK/Summit (NJ))**. Little, Mathews, Krafft and Stevenson are seniors this year; Foradori, Robinson and Basler are juniors; Carter and DeWitt are sophomores; and Kremer graduated last May.... It also was announced that the 1989-90 Lords and Ladies joined Denison's men and women as CSCAA as All Academic teams, on the merits of the squads' combined GPA of over 2.8.

**OHIO WESLEYAN DEFENDS GREAT LAKES REGIONAL TITLE;
KENYON'S DONOVAN BREAKS PLAYOFF SCORING RECORD**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University (7-1; 18-4) successfully defended its NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional title over the weekend with wins over Kalamazoo and North Coast Athletic Conference champion Kenyon College (8 0; 19 1). It is the Bishops' fifth regional championship in head coach Jay Martin's 14-year tenure and the school's seventh overall.

Ohio Wesleyan, the NCAC's second-place finisher and the eighth-ranked team in the nation, got past Kalamazoo 1-0 in the Bishops' opener. Sophomore forward **Sean Cain (Columbus, OH/DeSales)** scored the game's only goal midway through the first half. Kenyon, meanwhile, knocked off the North Coast's third tournament entry, The College of Wooster (6-2; 14-5-1), by a 7-4 score in the other first round game. Lord sophomore forward **Mike Donovan (Sylvania, OH/St. John's)** scored an NCAA Division III playoff-record four goals versus the Scots, including two in a 64 second span midway through the first overtime period. The 11 goals by Kenyon and Wooster equaled a Division III playoff record.

In the championships contest, Ohio Wesleyan avenged its regular season loss to Kenyon by taking a 3-0 decision and snapping the Lords' 19-game winning streak. Senior midfielders **Matt Schrader (Huntington, NY/Cold Spring Harbor)**, who scored a pair of goals, and **Scott Gillanders (Peachtree City, GA/McIntosh)**, who had one, accounted for the Bishop scoring, while junior keeper **Reed Welch (Greely, CO/Central)** posted his second consecutive shutout.

Ohio Wesleyan will now play top-ranked Elizabethtown in the quarterfinals with site, date and time to be announced early in the week. Last year, Elizabethtown eliminated the Bishops on penalty kicks in the quarterfinals on the way to winning the national title.

**OHIO WESLEYAN, WOOSTER SHARE NCAC CHAMPIONSHIP;
OWU'S KNAPP, WOOSTER'S HALL TAKE STATISTICAL TITLES**

November 4, 1990

CLEVELAND, OH — Ohio Wesleyan University (7-1; 16-3) and The College of Wooster (6-0-2; 12-4-3) will share the 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference title. The co-championship is the second in a row for Ohio Wesleyan and the first in Wooster's history. The Lady Scots, in fact, finished in a tie for sixth in the NCAC last year and had never placed higher than fourth.

Ohio Wesleyan was ranked 18th in this season's final Division III poll and narrowly missed an invitation to the 16-team NCAA Tournament. The only blemish on the Bishops' Conference record was a 3-1 loss to Wooster, which, in turn, was held to scoreless ties by Denison and Kenyon to account for the co-championship.

Denison (5-1-2; 13-4-2) closed out another successful year in third place, followed by Allegheny (5-2-1; 10-8-2) in fourth. Allegheny had won or shared the previous five North Coast titles, while Denison took the NCAC's inaugural championship in 1984. The remainder of the final standings have Case Reserve (3-5; 5-9-3) in fifth, followed by Kenyon (2-5-1; 8-9-1) in sixth, Wittenberg (2-6; 8-10) and Oberlin (2-6; 6-11-1) in a tie for seventh and Earlham (1-7; 2-14) in ninth. Case Reserve's jump from eighth place in 1989 to fifth this year was the second largest (next to Wooster's) in the Conference.

Individually, Ohio Wesleyan sophomore **Chris Knapp (Port Jefferson Station, NY/Comsewogue)** took the scoring title with 21 goals and 10 assists for an average of 2.89 points per game. Knapp also was the NCAC's leading scorer in 1989, averaging 2.56 points per game. Denison freshman **Heather Allred (Cincinnati, OH/Wyoming)** was second in the scoring race at 2.0 ppg, followed by Wittenberg senior **Suzie Sauers (Cincinnati, OH/Turpin)** in third at 1.78 ppg. In goal, Wooster freshman **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/North Hills)** took top honors with a 0.63 goals-against average. Denison sophomore **Jane Wildman (Amarillo, TX/Cape Elizabeth)** was second at 0.84, followed by Allegheny senior **Deb Klinefelter (Pittsburgh, PA/Shaler Area)** in third at 0.88. Hall and Wildman led the loop in shutouts with nine.

The 1990 season was another successful one for the NCAC overall, as the nine teams compiled an outstanding 47-39-6 (.543) record in non-conference contests. This is the fourth straight season that the North Coast has been above .500 against outside competition.

RICHMOND, IN -- For the third consecutive season and the fourth time in the last six years, Allegheny College has captured the title at the North Coast Athletic Conference Volleyball Championships. The second-seeded Gators, who are ranked second in the NCAA Division III East Region, advanced through the winner's bracket to reach the tournament finals for the seventh consecutive time. There, although it took two matches, Allegheny knocked off fourth-seeded Wittenberg University for the championship.

Wittenberg, which had lost previously to Allegheny in the winner's bracket final, got past tournament host and sixth seeded Earlham to win the consolation bracket and earn the right to play Allegheny for the title. The Tigers, needing two wins, got the first by a 15-12, 15-8 score, but Allegheny came back for a 5-15, 15-10, 15-10 victory in the championship match. The Gators were led in the final match by junior setter **Renea Surrena (Grove City, PA/Grove City)** and junior hitters **Molly Dietz (Greely, CO/Central)** and **Kristen McLaren (Glard, PA/Villa Maria)**. Surrena contributed 32 assists in the three games, while Dietz, the 1989 NCAC Player of the Year, and McLaren had 18 and 10 kills, respectively.

Earlham, which won three matches against higher-seeded teams, placed third, followed by Kenyon in fourth. Top-seeded Denison, which was upset by Wittenberg and Kenyon, finished in a tie for fifth with Ohio Wesleyan. Oberlin won a match to place seventh, while Case Reserve and Wooster tied for eighth.

A complete statistical wrapup of the NCAC season will appear next week.

**OHIO WESLEYAN TAKES NCAC TITLE, MAKES FOURTH STRAIGHT
NCAA APPEARANCE; OBERLIN WINS STATE TOURNAMENT**

CLEVELAND, OH The idiom "close only counts in horseshoes" was illustrated with intensity last week in the North Coast Athletic Conference's down-to-the-wire fight for second place behind champion Ohio Wesleyan University (11-1; 15-5). Denison University (7-5; 11-7), which began the week in fourth place, one-half game behind Oberlin College and The College of Wooster, fought off scrappy Earlham College, 6-4, in its Conference finale Oct. 31 to claim sole possession of the runner-up spot. Oberlin (6-5-1; 14-7-1), in the midst of its best season ever, lost a 1-0 squeaker to Ohio Wesleyan, Oct. 30, to finish its NCAC campaign in a tie with Wooster (6-5-1; 8-10-1) for third. Wittenberg University (5-5-2; 10-8-6) claimed fifth place on the merits of a season-ending, 2-1 victory over the Lady Scots. Kenyon College (3-8-1; 7-12-1), which finished second in the NCAC and received an NCAA post-season playoff bid last season, ended 1990 in sixth place, followed by Earlham (1-10-1; 7-12-1) in seventh. The Quakers, however, ended the season on a high note, shutting out Kenyon, 2-0, for their first ever NCAC field hockey win.

Ohio Wesleyan, with four consecutive Conference titles under its belt, progressed to the NCAA Division III Tournament for the fourth straight season, dropping a tough 1-0 decision to East Stroudsburg on Friday, Nov. 2. The Bishops led the way as the NCAC finished another stellar season against non-conference opponents, amassing a 33-22-4 record (.593) marking the sixth time in seven years that North Coast stickers have gone .500 or better against outside competition. Oberlin scored the most dramatic turn-around, nearly flipping its 1989 overall record. Last fall, the Yeowomen went 6-14 overall, compared to this year's 14-7-1 mark. To culminate its season, Oberlin won last weekend's "State" Tournament at Wooster, beating a Wittenberg 1-0 in the championship match. Denison came in third at the season-ending tournament, followed by Wooster in fourth, Earlham in fifth and Kenyon in sixth. Wittenberg head coach Linda Arena recorded her 100th career victory in the Tigers' 2-1 first-round win over Kenyon.

Oberlin senior **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)** won the NCAC scoring title with 16 goals and 10 assists for an average of 1.91 points per game. She was followed by Denison senior **Leedsie O'Connell (Southboro, MA/Miss Porter's)**, Ohio Wesleyan senior **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** and Bishop junior **Stephanie Heil (Contoocook, NH/Hopkinton)** in places two through four, respectively. Wittenberg senior **Jeanette Baler (Rockville, MD/Magruder)** finished another superb season in goal, leading the Conference with an impressive .949 saves percentage and 10 shutouts. Oberlin senior **Melissa Merrill (Baltimore, MD/Friends)** was the number-two NCAC goalie with a .910 saves percentage and eight shutouts.

**WITTENBERG SWEEPS PRESEASON POLLS; TIGER MEN,
 WOMEN TABBED BY MEDIA, COACHES TO TAKE NCAC TITLES**

CLEVELAND, OH — The Wittenberg University men's and women's basketball teams were the 1990-91 preseason selections to win North Coast Athletic Conference championships in balloting Nov. 8 at the Conference's annual Basketball/Winter Sports Media Day.

On the men's side, defending NCAC champion Wittenberg picked up 29 of 34 first-place votes and 300 points overall to take the top spot in the poll. The College of Wooster was second in the voting with 266 points, including four firsts, while Allegheny College picked up the remaining first-place vote and totaled 231 points to place third. Ohio Wesleyan University was fourth with 204 points, followed by Case Western Reserve University (173), Denison University (123), Kenyon College (112), Earlham College (74) and Oberlin College (47) in places five through nine, respectively.

Wittenberg, which went 29-2 last season on the way to its 14th NCAA Tournament appearance in the last 17 years, returns three starters for second-year head coach Dan Hipsher. "It's always an honor to be picked for first in a preseason poll, but (the poll) isn't going to determine how we play," says Hipsher. "We have a number of talented players returning, but we also have some holes to fill and I know that there are as many as six or seven teams that could legitimately challenge for the championship."

In the women's voting, Wittenberg reeled in 12 of 22 first-place votes and 194 points overall to edge Wooster, which had nine firsts and 189 points. Ohio Wesleyan and Allegheny split the remaining two first-place votes and finished in third and fourth with 159 and 129 points, respectively. Oberlin picked up 125 points for fifth, while Kenyon (77), Denison (62), Case Reserve (58) and Earlham (42) rounded out places six through nine.

Wittenberg is coming off a 26-3 campaign and a first-ever post-season appearance. The Tigers, however, will be looking to avenge a loss to Wooster in the NCAC Tournament final. The Lady Scots won 14 of their last 20 games in 1989-90 to finish at 20-6 overall, taking the North Division title during the regular season before claiming the overall championship in the tournament. "It will certainly be difficult, if not impossible, to duplicate a 26-3 season," says fifth-year Wittenberg head coach Pam Evans. "With four starters returning, I think we have a chance to be a very good team, but it remains to be seen whether or not that will be good enough."

**NCAC CHAMPION ALLEGHENY ADVANCES TO NCAA
PLAYOFFS; OWU EDGES WITTENBERG FOR SECOND**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Allegheny College capped off its regular-season schedule with a 14-7 win over Rochester Saturday, ensuring a bid to the NCAA Division III Playoffs for the second time in the last four years. The Gators, who earned the outright NCAC title with a perfect 7-0 Conference record, won their final nine games to finish at 9-0-1 -- tying a single-season school record for victories. The North Coast championship is their third in the last four years.

Allegheny, ranked third in the North Region, will be on the road to face second-ranked Mount Union (10-0) on Saturday, Nov. 17. Mount Union has won nine of the 11 meetings between the two teams, including the 1989 season-opener. The Gators' last playoff appearance came in 1987, when they dropped a 23-17 decision in overtime to Washington & Jefferson in the first round. Augustana (8-1) will be at defending national champion Dayton (10-0) in the North Region's other first round contest.

In Saturday's NCAC action, Ohio Wesleyan defeated Wittenberg, 35-14, in the battle for sole possession of second place behind Allegheny. The Bishops, who were edged out of the fourth playoff spot by Augustana, improved to 9-1 overall and 7-1 in the North Coast behind a 164-yard effort from senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)**. All that separated Allegheny and Ohio Wesleyan was the four-point margin in the Gators' 14-10 win over the Bishops in week eight.

Kenyon, which shared the 1989 NCAC championship with Ohio Wesleyan, closed its season on a high note with a 48-28 win over Earlham. The victory gives the Lords a 6-4 overall record and sole possession of fourth place in the Conference with a 4-3 mark. Senior quarterback and 1989 North Coast Player of the Year **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)** completed his brilliant career by throwing for 320 yards and an NCAC record-tying five touchdowns.

Denison jumped to fifth in the Conference with a hard-fought 24-12 triumph over Wooster. Again it was sophomore tailback **Jason Cooperider (Granville, OH/Utica)** leading the Big Red single-wing attack with 106 yards rushing, 100 more through the air and two touchdowns. Wooster, which battled back at the end of the year after an 0-3 start, got 143 yards from junior tailback **Brian Grandison (Akron, OH/East)**.

Case Reserve and Oberlin closed out the year with non-conference losses to Carnegie Mellon and Swarthmore, respectively. The Yeomen's 9-7 loss was a particularly hard one to swallow as Swarthmore, which finished with a 7-3 record, overcame an early Oberlin lead to win on a 20-yard field goal with eight seconds remaining. Junior tailback **Tyrone Reynolds (Youngstown, OH/Chaney)** paced the Yeomen with 157 yards on 20 carries, including a 79 yard scoring run on their third play from scrimmage.

Despite going 1-2 in non-conference games in the final week, the North Coast closed out the 1990 campaign with a fine 14 9 1 (.604) record against outside competition.

NCAC FINAL STANDINGS: Allegheny (7-0; 9-0-1) claimed its third NCAC championship in the last four years. Ohio Wesleyan (7-1; 9-1) finished second, followed by Wittenberg (6-2; 7-3), Kenyon (4 3; 6 4) and Denison (3-4; 6-4) in places three through five, respectively. Wooster (3-5; 3-7) edged Case Reserve (2 4; 4-6) for sixth, while Earlham (1-6; 2-8) finished eighth and Oberlin (0-8; 1-9) ninth.

NAMED NCAC FOOTBALL "PLAYERS OF THE WEEK"

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University senior fullback **Kevin Sims** and Denison University junior nose guard **Jonathan Fortkamp** were named offensive and defensive football "Players of the Week," respectively, for their play last week in the North Coast Athletic Conference.

Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers), a 5-11, 250-pounder, ground out 164 yards and two touchdowns on 24 carries as Ohio Wesleyan defeated Wittenberg 35-14. Sims scored on runs of three and two yards, the former putting the Bishops in front to stay late in the second quarter and the latter stretching the lead to 14 points early in the final stanza. Ohio Wesleyan finished at 9-1 overall and in second place in the NCAC with a 7-1 mark.

Fortkamp (Columbus, OH/Watterson), a 5-10, 220-pounder, had 11 tackles to help lead Denison past Wooster 24-12. His 11 tackles were the most by any lineman in the game and, on the year, he leads the Big Red front with 61 stops. Fortkamp and his twin brother Jeff, a center for Wittenberg, were featured in the latest issue of *Sports Illustrated*. Denison closed out the 1990 campaign at 6-4 overall and 3-4 in the North Coast.

FANTASTIC FOOTBALL: Allegheny senior tailback **Jerry O'Brien (Pittsburgh, PA/North Catholic)** rushed for 124 yards on 24 carries in the Gators' 14-7 win over Rochester. It was his fourth 100-yard effort of the season and the eighth of his career. Defensively, Allegheny was led by senior defensive tackle **Ron Saunders (Grove City, PA/Grove City)**, who had a career-high 11 tackles, including eight solos.... Case Reserve's future looks bright with freshman quarterback **Brett Ramsey (Wadsworth, OH/Wadsworth)** and freshman halfback **Jarvis Gibson (Cleveland, OH/South)** on the roster. Ramsey threw for 214 yards versus Carnegie Mellon, his fourth 200-plus game of the year, while Gibson had his second straight big game with 134 yards on the ground. On the defensive side, sophomore linebacker **Ed Trebets (Mentor, OH/Lake Catholic)** had 11 tackles, four pass breakups and two sacks. He finished the year with a team high 100 tackles.... Wooster's junior tailback **Brian Grandison (Akron, OH/East)** rushed for 143 yards on 29 carries in the Scots' 24-12 loss to Denison. The yardage bumped his season total to 1,035 and took him over the 1,000-yard barrier for the second straight season. Sophomore linebacker **John Marcinek (Webster, NY/Webster)**, who opened the season teamed with Grandison in the Wooster backfield, had 19 tackles on the day.... Kenyon senior quarterback **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)** closed out his career with style in the Lords' 48-28 win over Earlham, completing 30 of 47 passes for 320 yards and an NCAC record-tying five touchdowns. Freshman linebacker **Joe Gucanac (Wickliffe, OH/Wickliffe)** led Kenyon defensively with nine tackles, a fumble recovery and two pass breakups.... Earlham junior wide receiver **Todd Hawkins (Troy, OH/Miami East)** had the best day of his career with nine receptions for 156 yards and two scores.

RECORD BREAKERS: Ohio Wesleyan senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)** has established school records for single-season (1,179) and career (3,160) rushing yards. The 250-pounder also holds Bishop standards for career touchdowns (31) and points (186).... Wooster senior wideout **Phil Puryear (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** became the school's all-time leading receiver with 107 receptions after catching three passes on Saturday. He also owns Scot career records for receiving yards (1,650) and touchdowns (11) as well as the single-season school mark for touchdowns (7).... Kenyon quarterback **Chris Creighton (Seattle, WA/Roosevelt)** has practically added a new chapter to the NCAC record book. The 5-11 senior has shattered Conference single season marks for attempts (398), completions (231), touchdown passes (29), total offense (2,731) and passing yards (2,843). He also owns three Conference single-game records as well as career marks for completion percentage (57.1, 492-861) and touchdown passes (48).

RECORD BREAKERS, PART II: Kenyon split end **Ted Taggart (Bexley, OH/Bexley)** has added NCAC records for single-season touchdown receptions (13), career touchdown receptions (20) and career receptions (165) to his already impressive resume. Taggart, a senior, already owned three North Coast records heading into the season.... Ohio Wesleyan's 24 interceptions eclipsed the NCAC's previous record of 21, set by Case Reserve in 1986.... Kenyon has broken its own North Coast record for passing yards with 2,890.... Ohio Wesleyan allowed just 189 yards on the ground and 1,537 overall this fall, shattering the previous Conference marks of 701 and 1,577 set by Case Reserve in 1985.... Allegheny senior quarterback **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn-Trafford)** broke the Gator single-season record for passing yards with 1,604. The previous record of 1,592 was set by John Logue in 1987, the last year Allegheny qualified for post-season play. Filkovski also led the Gators to a school-record 340 points this fall.

DYNAMIC DUO: Wittenberg seniors **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)** and **Jeff Stockdale (Springfield, OH/North)** combined for 2,563 yards this season, breaking the NCAA Division III record for yards gained by two players on the same team. Warga, the Tigers' tailback, set an NCAC record with 1,836 yards, while Stockdale, the fullback, finished with 727.... Warga had six 200-yard games this fall and ended up with the second-best single-season rushing total in NCAA Division III history. Warga had 80 yards versus Ohio Wesleyan Saturday (the most any back has gained against the Bishop defense this year) before leaving the game midway through the third quarter with a rib injury.... Wittenberg, not surprisingly, broke its school record for rushing yards this fall with 3,083.

SOCCER STANDARDS: NCAC men's champ Kenyon, which made its first NCAA Tournament appearance, set school marks for victories (19) and goals (65) this fall. Individually, sophomore **Mike Donovan (Sylvania, OH/St. John's)** set Lord single season records for goals (19) and points (48), while tying the mark for assists (10). Freshman goalie **Marshall Chapin (Millburn, NJ/Millburn)**, meanwhile, tied the school record for shutouts with eight.... Denison's **Heather Allred (Cincinnati, OH/Wyoming)**, a freshman on the women's soccer team, broke the single season school record for goals with 16 this fall. She added six assists and finished second in the NCAC in scoring with an average of 2.0 points per game, leading the Big Red to a 13-4-2 finish and third place in the Conference at 5-1-2.... Big Red sophomore goalie **Jane Wildman (Amarillo, TX/Cape Elizabeth)** recorded nine shutouts in 1990 to break another Denison season record.

HOCKEY HOTSHOTS: Oberlin senior **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)** finished a spectacular career with 93 points on 39 goals and 15 assists, establishing new school records in each category. She and senior teammate **Melissa Merrill (Baltimore, MD/Friends)** were major factors in the Yeowomen's fine 14-7-1 season, which saw the Yeowomen break into the national top 20 for the first time. Merrill had eight shutouts to break a single-season school mark.... Ohio Wesleyan's NCAC field hockey championship and NCAA Tournament appearance were the fourth under fifth-year head coach **Nan Carney-DeBord**.... Wittenberg's **Jeanette Baier (Rockville, MD/Magruder)**, Ohio Wesleyan's **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** and Oberlin's **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)** have been selected to participate in the CFCHA Division III North-South Senior All-Star Game on Saturday, Nov. 17 at Rutgers University in Piscataway, N.J.

SENSATIONAL SPIKERS: Allegheny juniors **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)** and **Renea Surrena (Grove City, PA/Grove City)** have been named NCAA Division III All-East Region by the American Volleyball Coaches Association. Dietz, a dominating middle hitter, and Surrena, the team's setter, led the Gators to their third consecutive NCAC championship this fall and a berth in the NCAA Tournament for the second time in the last three years.

TIP-OFF TIME: Seven of nine NCAC men's basketball teams and eight of nine women's squads will get the 1990-91 season started this weekend. This week's men's schedule is highlighted by Ohio Wesleyan's Kiwanis Tournament and Wooster's visit to the inaugural eight-team Great Lakes Shootout at John Carroll. Top action on the women's ledger includes Oberlin's Tip Off Tournament and defending North Coast champ Wooster's visit to the Malone Invitational. The NCAC schedule begins Tuesday and Wednesday, Jan. 2-3.

OHIO WESLEYAN ADVANCES TO NCAA FINAL FOUR, BEATS TOP-RANKED ELIZABETHTOWN IN QUARTERFINALS

CLEVELAND, OH Ohio Wesleyan University (19-4) will advance to the NCAA Division III Final Four for the first time since 1981 after edging defending national champion Elizabethtown, 2-1, in a quarterfinal game on Nov. 10. It will be the third trip to the final four for the Bishops, who have qualified for post-season play an unprecedented 13 consecutive times.

Junior forward **Andy Kessinger (Westerville, OH/DeSales)** accounted for both Ohio Wesleyan goals, the second coming one minute into the first overtime period. Led by junior keeper **Reed Welch (Greeley, CO/Central)**, who had seven saves, the Bishops defense made that margin stand against an Elizabethtown team that entered the contest at 21-0-1 and ranked first in the nation. The Blue Jays eliminated Ohio Wesleyan in the quarterfinal round last fall on penalty kicks after the two teams had battled to a scoreless tie through two overtimes.

In advancing to the final four Ohio Wesleyan, which was ranked eighth in the final Division III poll, has knocked off the top two teams in the country in Elizabethtown and North Coast Athletic Conference champion Kenyon (19-1), which was ranked second nationally before falling to the Bishops in the Great Lakes Regional final on Nov. 3.

Ohio Wesleyan's semifinal opponent will be South Central Region champ Wheaton (20-2), which got past Cal San Diego 1-0 in another Saturday quarterfinal. One of Wheaton's losses this year came early in the season to Kenyon by a 2-1 score. The remaining semifinal matchup has not yet been determined and site, dates and times of next weekend's final four will be announced Monday.

CLEVELAND, OH -- Eleven North Coast Athletic Conference women's swimmers qualified for nationals in the first week of dual meet action. Top swimmers were Kenyon College senior **Kami Mathews (Troy, OH/Troy)**, who qualified in four events -- the 200 free, 200 back, 200 IM and as part of the Ladies' 200 medley relay; Allegheny College junior **Marci Hennessey (Lynnfield, MA/Hebron)**, who qualified in three events -- the 200 back, 200 breast and as part of the Gators' 400 medley relay team; and Allegheny senior **Kate Thoman (Wellesley, MA/Boxborough)**, who qualified in two events -- the 500 free and the 400 medley relay. Wittenberg University junior **Margie Coyle (Fort Wayne, IN/Mercersburg (PA))** set a school record of 2:32.52 while qualifying for nationals in the 200 breast.

Kenyon, which has won all six NCAC championships and seven consecutive national titles, scored two dual meet victories over the weekend, beating Division I Miami of Ohio 128-115 and perennial Conference nemesis Denison University 133-108. The Ladies won nine of 13 events against Miami, while taking seven of 13 from the Big Red. Mathews led the Kenyon victory parade, taking the top spot in three events against both opponents. Freshman **Jessica Berkowitz (Boca Raton, FL/Pine Crest)** was a triple winner for the Ladies, winning both the 500 and 1000 free against Miami and taking the 200 free against Denison. Junior **Ann Kelley (Canton, OH/McKinley)** dove to victory in both the one- and three-meter events against Miami and took the one-meter crown against Denison. The Lords, who also have won all six NCAC championships and have claimed 11 consecutive national titles, split their dual meet action, taking eight of 11 events to beat Denison 128-80, while being edged by Miami 133-103, against whom they won three events.

In other action, the Denison men and women lost to Division I Wright State, 119-83 and 130-112.5, respectively. The Allegheny women scored a first-ever win over Division II Clarion, 124-121, while the Gator men lost to Clarion 169-78.

**ALLEGHENY WOMEN TAKE MIDEAST REGIONAL; THREE
NCAC INDIVIDUALS TO JOIN GATORS AT NATIONALS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference will be well represented at this weekend's NCAA Division III Championships at Grinnell College (Iowa) with the Allegheny women's team and three individuals -- Kenyon's Kara Berghold and Kelley Wilder on the women's side as well as Wooster's Jason Kelley -- having qualified in regional competition on Nov. 10.

The NCAC-champion Gators completely dominated the women's field to win the Mideast Regional in Allentown, Pa., for the third consecutive year. Allegheny streaked to victory with 38 points, 64 points ahead of its closest competitor, Trenton State. The Gators were led by seniors **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**, who finished in second place at 19:30, and **Katie Tiedemann (Skaneateles, NY/Skaneateles)**, who ran third in 19:40. Besides Kohl and Tiedemann, four other Gators were named to the All-Region squad: sophomore **Dee Buckhoff (Schenectady, NY/Guilderland)**, who placed ninth in 20:36; freshman **Serena Fraser (Williamsville, NY/Clarence)**, who ran 10th in 20:45; junior **Alyse Holden (Shoreham, NY/Wading River)**, who was 14th in 20:49; and junior **Pam Karle (Cottage Grove, MN/Park)**, who was 15th in 20:52. In the men's field, sophomore **Colin Knisely (Burlington, IO/Oil City (PA))** and senior **Greg Haas (Emlenton, PA/A-C Valley)** were named to the All-Region team after finishing in positions 16 and 18, respectively, as Allegheny closed its season with a seventh-place finish.

Kenyon senior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** and sophomore teammate **Kelley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)** captured the top two positions to qualify for nationals and lead the Ladies to a third place finish (100 points) behind Calvin (79) and Mount Union (80) at the Great Lakes Regional iniffin, Ohio. Berghold, this year's NCAC Women's Most Valuable Performer, dominated the field in winning her seventh meet of the season in 18:52, while Wilder followed in 19:25. Wooster finished in fifth place with 118 points, followed by Ohio Wesleyan in eighth (170) and Denison in 11th (245). Denison senior **Kate Fechtel (Youngstown, OH/Ursuline)** was the third NCAC finisher, placing eighth overall in 20:01. Wooster juniors **Beth Blakemore (Golden, CO/Wheat Ridge)** and **Karen Aeberli (Pittsburgh, PA/North Allegheny)** finished 12th in 20:27 and 16th in 20:33, respectively, while Oberlin senior **Liz Maurice (East Massapequa, NY/Amlityville)** placed 17th in 20:33.

Wooster sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)**, the 1990 NCAC Men's Most Valuable Performer, qualified for nationals with a sixth-place run of 27:27. Senior teammate **Rob Noble (Pepper Pike, OH/Orange)** placed 12th in 27:41, while Earlham junior **Scott Pearson (Cincinnati, OH/Finneytown)** was 17th in 28:00. Pearson led the Quakers (173 points) to a seventh-place regional finish, best among Conference schools. Denison placed ninth (226) and Oberlin 10th (233), but Wooster's finish has yet to be determined, since men's results are incomplete beyond 11th place for teams and 90th place for individuals. Videotapes of later finishes are being reviewed by meet officials.

NORTH COAST ANNOUNCES ALL-CONFERENCE TEAMS
IN FIELD HOCKEY, SOCCER AND VOLLEYBALL.

CLEVELAND, OH -- The North Coast Athletic Conference has announced its 1990 All-Conference teams for men's and women's soccer, field hockey and volleyball. In the voting, which was done by the coaches of each respective sport, a total of 126 student athletes were honored.

In men's soccer, Kenyon College's **Mike Pilger** was named Coach of the Year after guiding the Lords to a 19-1 record and their first NCAC championship. Kenyon, which also made its first NCAA Division III Tournament appearance this fall, closed out the regular season ranked second in the nation. Offensive Player of the Year honors were split between College of Wooster senior **Ian Banda (Blantyre, Malawi/Phwezi)** and Ohio Wesleyan University senior **Matt Schrader (Huntington, NY/Cold Spring Harbor)**. Banda has won or shared Offensive Player of the Year honors in each of his four seasons, while Schrader is a three time All NCAC pick. Wooster sophomore **Mphatso Namwali (Blantyre, Malawi/Bwaila)** picked up the Defensive Player of the Year award. Ohio Wesleyan, which is 19-4 overall and one of only four teams remaining in the NCAA Tournament, placed the most players on the first team with four, while Kenyon had three and Wooster two.

NCAC co-champions Ohio Wesleyan and Wooster came away with the top honors in women's soccer. Wooster's **Nick Cowell** was named Coach of the Year after leading the Lady Scots to a 12-4-3 record -- the best mark in school history. Wooster's freshman goalkeeper **Lisa Hall (Pittsburgh, PA/North Hills)** played a major role in that success, allowing just 10 goals and recording nine shutouts on the way to being named Defensive Player of the Year. Offensive Player of the Year went to Ohio Wesleyan senior **Leigh Sears (Dublin, OH/Dublin)**, who was instrumental in the Bishops' 16-3 overall record and final national ranking of 18th. Wooster and Allegheny College each placed three players on the first team, while Denison University and Ohio Wesleyan had two.

In field hockey, NCAC scoring champ **Lisa Longstreth (Pottstown, PA/Springside)**, a senior from Oberlin, was named Player of the Year after guiding the Yeowomen to a fine 14-7-1 record. Earlham's **Jill Butcher** took Coach of the Year honors after leading the Quakers to a 7-12-1 overall record, which included the school's first-ever North Coast win. Ohio Wesleyan, which won its fourth straight NCAC crown and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive year, placed three players on the first team, as did Wittenberg University.

Allegheny won its third consecutive NCAC volleyball title this fall, earning its second post-season appearance in the last three years. Allegheny's **Bridget Sheehan** took home Coach of the Year honors, while junior hitter **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)** was selected Player of the Year for the second consecutive season to complete the Gator sweep. Allegheny was the only Conference school to have two players named to the first team.

**NCAC ANNOUNCES ALL-CONFERENCE FOOTBALL TEAM;
NORTH COAST CHAMP ALLEGHENY SETS PACE**

CLEVELAND, OH - North Coast Athletic Conference champion and NCAA Division III Playoff participant Allegheny College leads the way with 10 first-team selections on the 1990 All-Conference squad, announced today after voting by the NCAC Football Coaches' Association.

Allegheny, which finished the regular season at 9-0-1 and ranked third in the North Region and 13th (by the *Football Gazette*) in the nation, will face Mount Union in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs on Saturday, Nov. 17. The Gators have won three of the last four NCAC championships and are making their second post-season appearance in that span. Five of their 10 first-team selections are on offense, while four come on defense and one is a specialist.

Heading the NCAC's first team offensive unit is Allegheny's senior quarterback **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn-Trafford)**, who completed 111-of-178 passes for 1,604 yards and 16 touchdowns during the regular season. In addition, he led the Conference and was among the nation's leaders in pass efficiency with a rating of 155.4. Filkovski is joined on the first team by fellow Gators **Julio Lacayo (Annandale, VA/Annandale)**, a junior wide receiver, and senior offensive linemen **John Marzka (Erie, PA/Academy)**, **T.J. McCarthy (Lowell, MA/Lowell)** and **Steve Menosky (Erie, PA/Academy)**. Those five helped Allegheny lead the NCAC in scoring (34.0 ppg) and finish second in total offense (401.5 ypg).

Ohio Wesleyan University, Wittenberg University and Kenyon College, who finished second, third and fourth in the Conference, respectively, complete the first-team offense with two selections each. Ohio Wesleyan is represented by senior fullback **Kevin Sims (Sudbury, MA/Rivers)**, who rushed for over 1,000 yards for the second time in three years, and senior offensive lineman **Jeff Court (Galion, OH/Galion)**; Wittenberg by senior tailback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, who led the nation and broke the NCAC single-season rushing record with 1,836 yards, and senior offensive lineman **Doug Cochran (Reynoldsburg, OH/Reynoldsburg)**; and Kenyon by senior wide receiver **Ted Taggart (Bexley, OH/Bexley)**, who led the Conference with 75 receptions for 992 yards and 13 touchdowns, and junior tight end **Sean McCabe (Ann Arbor, MI/Pioneer)**.

Nine of the 11 offensive first-teamers are seniors and the other two are juniors. Sims is the squad's only three-time member, while Court, Marzka, McCabe, McCarthy and Taggart are on the team for the second consecutive season.

Defensively, Ohio Wesleyan and Allegheny set the pace with four first-team selections. The Ohio Wesleyan defense, which led the NCAC in all four statistical categories and was among the national leaders in scoring and against the run, is represented by senior end **Neil Ringers (Ridgefield, CT/Ridgefield)**, senior inside linebacker **Kirk Jackson (Gallipolis, OH/Gallipolis)**, senior lineman **Bo Smith (Gallipolis, OH/Gallipolis)** and junior lineman **Keith Rucker (University Park, IL/Shaker Heights (OH))**. Allegheny, which placed second to the Bishops in all four defensive categories, has senior free safety **David LaCarte (Charleroi, PA/Charleroi)**, junior cornerback **Tony Bifulco (Cheektowaga, NY/West Seneca East)**, junior lineman **Jeff Pearson (Centerville, PA/Titusville)** and sophomore inside linebacker **Wayne Mack (Berea, OH/Berea)** on the first team.

The defensive unit is rounded out by Denison University senior defensive back **Reid Lederer (Shelby, OH/Shelby)**, who led the NCAC in interceptions (8), Wittenberg junior outside linebacker **David Radcliffe (Gahanna, OH/Lincoln)** and Tiger senior safety **Victor Terebuh (Bellefontaine, OH/Bellefontaine)**.

Six of the 11 defensive first-teamers are seniors, four are juniors and one is a sophomore. Ohio Wesleyan's Ringers, the NCAC Defensive Player of the Year last season, is a four-time member of the first team -- the first four-time pick in the North Coast's seven-year history. LaCarte, meanwhile, is a three-time selection, while Bifulco, Jackson, Rucker and Smith are back for the second time.

Allegheny senior placekicker **Steve Boucher (Lake City, PA/Girard)** and Denison junior punter **Steve Schott (Rochester, NY/McQuaid Jesuit)** took first-team honors as specialists. It is the second straight appearance for Boucher and the fourth year in a row that the Gators have had the first-team kicker.

Coach of the Year as well as the winners of the Mike Gregory and Hank Critchfield Awards, symbolic of the Conference's Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year, will be announced on Monday, Nov. 19.

**WITTENBERG'S WARGA, OHIO WESLEYAN'S RINGERS
NAMED NCAC FOOTBALL PLAYERS OF THE YEAR;
ALLEGHENY'S O'KEEFE TAKES COACHING HONORS**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Wittenberg University fullback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)** and Ohio Wesleyan University defensive end **Neil Ringers (Ridgefield, CT/Ridgefield)** have been chosen 1990 North Coast Athletic Conference Offensive and Defensive Football Players of the Year, respectively, while Allegheny College head coach **Ken O'Keefe** has been named Coach of the Year after leading the Gators to the NCAC championship and a berth in the NCAA Division III Playoffs. The NCAC Offensive Player of the Year receives the Mike Gregory Award, presented annually by Richard Gregory of Columbus, Ohio, in honor of his father, a multi-sport standout at Denison University in the 1920s. The Defensive Player of the Year, meanwhile, receives the Hank Critchfield Award in honor of the former College of Wooster ('27) star.

Warga, a 6-0, 185 pound senior, carried 254 times for an NCAC record 1,836 yards this season -- the highest total in the nation this fall and the second-most in Division III history. He averaged 7.2 yards per carry and 183.6 yards per game for Wittenberg, which finished at 7-3 overall and in third place in the North Coast with a 6-2 mark. Warga had six 200-yard games, including an NCAC record 288 versus Kenyon on Sept. 29. In the Tigers' seven wins, he averaged 230.7 yards per game and on the year he rushed for 15 touchdowns, just one shy of the Conference single-season record.

Warga's top performances came against Kenyon (27 carries-288 yards, 4 TDs), Oberlin (22-279, 2), Emory & Henry (34-264, 1), Denison (32-223, 1), Earlham (30-220, 2) and Wooster (28-211, 1). He also had 80 yards versus Ohio Wesleyan -- the most anyone gained all season against the stingy Bishop defense -- before being forced from the game midway through the third quarter with a rib injury.

Ringers, a 6-1, 200-pound senior, was the key once again to Ohio Wesleyan's dominating defense in earning Player of the Year honors for the second straight season. He is the third repeat winner (Chris Spriggs of Denison in 1985-86 and Mike Parker of Allegheny in 1987-88 are the others) and the first NCAC performer to earn first team All Conference honors four times. On the year, he recorded 71 tackles, including a team-high 26 for loss and 16 sacks. The Bishops led the North Coast in all four defensive categories, setting records for scoring defense (6.6 ppg), rush defense (18.9 ypg) and total defense (153.7 ypg).

Ringers has earned a total of six All-America honors through three seasons and is certain to gain even more national exposure this year. His best individual efforts of the season came against Allegheny (eight tackles, two sacks, two forced fumbles), Case Reserve (seven tackles, four sacks), Earlham (seven tackles, four sacks) and Denison (10 tackles, three for loss).

O'Keefe, in his first year as head coach at Allegheny after spending four seasons as an offensive assistant, led the Gators to their third NCAC championship in four years. After a tie in its season opener, Allegheny rattled off nine consecutive victories to win the North Coast title and earn a berth in the Division III Playoffs for the second time in four years. The Gators defeated Mount Union, 26-15, in the first round on Nov. 17 and will host defending national champion Dayton in a quarterfinal contest on Nov. 24.

**NCAC DOMINATES NON-CONFERENCE FOES IN EARLY
 GOING; WOOSTER, WITTENBERG, KENYON AND CWRU SET PACE**

CLEVELAND, OH -- Six of the nine North Coast Athletic Conference men's teams are off and running with winning records in the early going this season. NCAC squads have easily outdistanced their non conference opponents, compiling an outstanding 36-23 (.610) mark.

The College of Wooster is the Conference's hottest team at 7-1 with seven straight victories. Head coach Steve Moore's Scots, picked in the preseason to be a top contender for the NCAC title, have done well against a strong sampling of Division III teams from across the United States. In eight games, Wooster has faced teams from six different states.

Wittenberg University (6-1), Kenyon College (5-1), Case Western Reserve University (4-1) and Earlham College (2-0) also are off to quick starts.

Defending North Coast champ Wittenberg's record is marred only by a three point loss at Otterbein. The Tigers, who have made 14 post-season appearances in the last 17 years, were ranked first in preseason polls by *Sports Illustrated* and *College Basketball Preview*. Senior **Brad Baldrige (Dublin, OH/Dublin)**, NCAC Player of the Year and a first-team NABC All-America selection last season, is off to another banner start with averages of 21.7 points and 10.7 rebounds per game.

Kenyon, which finished 8-18 last year, is looking to turn things around under third-year head coach Bill Brown. The Lords' new fast-paced attack features three players with averages of over 15 points per game -- senior guard **Matt Alcorn (Irwin, PA/Penn-Trafford)** and senior forwards **Andy Kutz (Newark, OH/Newark)** and **B.J. Kenyon (Worthington, OH/Madison (WI))** are at 18.2, 17.7 and 16.5 points per game, respectively.

Bill Sudeck's Case Reserve Spartans, at 4-1, are off to their best start since the North Coast's inaugural 1984-85 season, when they went 17-9 and posted a third-place Conference finish. Included in Case Reserve's record is an impressive 76-73 win over Johns Hopkins, an NCAA Tournament participant last year. The Spartans also threw a scare into defending national champ Rochester in a game last Thursday, leading the Yellowjackets midway through the second half before falling by nine, 80-71. Junior guard **Ed Saxon (Cleveland, OH/St. Ignatius)** has been Case Reserve's big gun, leading the NCAC with an average of 27.8 points a game.

Earlham, coming off 12-day tour of England, has not had an official contest since Nov. 17, but they did play six exhibition games against the best the mother country had to offer. The Quakers will get a look at one of the best this country has to offer Monday against DePauw, the Division III runnerup last season.

Allegheny College, at 5-3, rounds out the NCAC's list of plus-.500 teams. The Gators record may be somewhat deceiving, however, with two of the losses coming to Division I Cleveland State and NAIA power Westminster.

NCAC Women's Basketball Report

**SIX NORTH COAST TEAMS OFF TO WINNING STARTS;
DEFENDING NCAC CHAMP WOOSTER LEADS THE WAY AT 8-0**

December 9, 1990**

CLEVELAND, OH -- North Coast Athletic Conference women's teams are off to their best collective start in the seven year history of the Conference. Six of nine teams have posted winning records against non-league foes in the first three weeks of the season and the NCAC's overall mark against outside competition is 32-31 (.508).

The College of Wooster, defending North Coast champs, heads the list of winners with an outstanding 8-0 mark. The Lady Scots, under fifth year head coach Chris Hart, have won 13 games in a row dating back to last season. Wooster leads the NCAC in team defense (45.3 ppg), defensive field goal percentage (30.8) and scoring margin (16.0).

Senior post **Amy Aukamp (Charlotte, NC/Canton South (OH))** leads the Lady Scots in scoring (16.0 ppg), rebounding (10.8 rpg) and blocked shots (2.8 bpg). She is sixth in the Conference in scoring, third in rebounding and first in blocked shots. Adding the "two" to Wooster's one-two frontline punch is sophomore post **LaSonya Crawl (Cleveland Heights, OH/Cleveland Heights)**, who is averaging 13.3 points and 8.6 rebounds per game. In addition, Crawl leads the NCAC in field goal percentage at 54.4%.

At 5-2, Denison University owns the North Coast's second-best record in the early going. Included among the Big Red's triumphs is a championship at the Dutch Country Classic in Millersville, Pa. Junior guard **Lisa Atterbery (Granvill, OH/Granville)** has averaged 17.9 points and an NCAC-high 6.4 assists per game to fire the Denison resurgence.

Wittenberg University, picked to win the 1991 North Coast title after going 29-2 and appearing in the NCAA Tournament last season, has a winning mark at 4-2. The Tigers, who won their first 16 games last year, are coming off a championship at their own Wittenberg Classic, Dec. 7-8.

Oberlin College guard **Ann Gilbert (Elyria, OH/Elyria)** has picked up where she left off last season as Division III's leading scorer. Gilbert, a senior and the 1989-90 NCAC Player of the Year, is averaging 31.9 points through seven games, nearly identical to her average of 31.1 last season. She has led her team to a 4-3 start, including a championship at last weekends' Yeowomen Classic where she scored 71 points in two outings.

Ohio Wesleyan University and Allegheny College also are off to solid starts with records of 5-4 and 4-3, respectively. Ohio Wesleyan, which has won four of its last six, is led by multi-talented junior **Krista Jacobs (Delaware, OH/Hayes)**. Jacobs, who led the NCAC in scoring as a freshman and finished second last year, holds down the second slot again this season with an average of 22.9 points a game. In addition, she is tied for the top spot in the Conference rebounding race with an average of 12.6 a game. Allegheny, five time North Coast champs, has been aided by the improved play of junior **Jennifer Young (Cambridge Springs, PA/Meadville)**, who has moved into the starting lineup at center and is averaging 14.3 points and 12.6 rebounds per game.

CLEVELAND, OH -- College of Wooster junior **Erich Riebe** and Denison University junior **Lisa Attebery** have been named men's and women's basketball "Players of the Week", respectively, for their play last week in the North Coast Athletic Conference.

Riebe (Wooster, OH/Waynedale), a 6-0 point guard, poured in 25 points in Wooster's 89-70 victory over Ohio Wesleyan and added 12 more in a 57-47 win over Grove City. Riebe, who won first-team All-NCAC honors last season after being a second-team selection as a freshman, is averaging 13.9 points and 4.7 assists per game for the 7-1 Scots.

Attebery (Granville, OH/Granville), a 5-5 point guard, racked up 38 points, 15 rebounds, 13 assists and seven steals on the week in leading Denison to a pair of victories -- over Ohio Dominican (56-47) and Urbana (77-66). She had a 20-point, 7-rebound performance against Ohio Dominican on Dec. 5 and came right back to pump in 18 points and grab eight rebounds against Urbana. Attebery, playing her first season for the Big Red, has been a primary factor in the team's fine 5-2 start. She is averaging 17.9 points per game, fourth-highest in the NCAC, and is leading the Conference in assists (6.4 apg) and free throw percentage (88.9%).

HOTSHOTS: A name to watch on the Denison scorecard is 6-8 freshman center **Dwayne Romine (Newark, OH/Newark)**, who contributed 21 points and 15 rebounds in two games last week. On the season, Romine is averaging 8.0 points per game and is second on the squad in field goal percentage (63.4%) and rebounding (7.0 rpg)... Another Newark native is burning up the nets down the road in Gambier. **Andy Kutz (Newark, OH/Newark)**, a 6-8 senior forward for the Lords, poured in 19 points on a nearly perfect seven-for-seven from the foul line and six-for-seven from the field as the Lords beat Washington & Jefferson, 81-65 on Dec. 8, for their fifth victory of the season. Kutz leads Kenyon with 8.3 rebounds per game and 12 blocked shots on the season, and is the Lords' second-highest scorer with 17.7 points per game.... Kenyon senior **Matt Alcorn (Irwin, PA/Penn-Trafford)**, a 5-8 guard, had a 20-point performance against W & J and leads the Lords' scoring attack with 18.2 points per game.... Oberlin College junior guard **Ricky Washington (Lorain, OH/Admiral King)** scored the winning hoop with five seconds remaining in the Yeomen's 73-71 win over Til State on Dec. 7... Wooster's 6-4 freshman forward **Doug Meinen (Akron, OH/Garfield)** grabbed a team high 12 rebounds and added 14 points off the bench in Wooster's 57-47 triumph over Grove City, Dec. 8.... Earlham's women were hot with the three-point shots last week as two players tied the school record of five. Freshman guard **Shannon Ferguson (Coatesville, IN/Cascade)** had her record tying performance as she tallied 22 points in the Quakers' 92-56 loss to Mount St. Joseph on Dec. 5. Three days later, another freshman guard, **Teresa Page (Clarksville, IN/Clarksville)**, duplicated the feat during a 21-point showing in the Quakers' 69-60 loss to Rockford. Ferguson had her second 22-point effort of the week against Rockford.... Oberlin senior guard **Ann Gilbert (Elyria, OH/Elyria)**, the leading scorer in Division III last year, is dominating the court again this season. She scored 71 points in two games last week, including 43 in the Yeowomen's 83-78 win over Lake Erie on Dec. 7.... Oberlin's 5-8 freshman guard **Shireen Abu-Khader (Amman, Jordan/National Orthodox)** contributed 35 points, 18 rebounds and six assists in Oberlin's two victories last week.... Ohio Wesleyan junior guard **Amy Evans (West Lafayette, OH/Ridgewood)** popped in 42 points as the Bishops went 2-1 on the week. Evans' OWU teammate **Krista Jacobs (Delaware, OH/Hayes)**, a 5-8 junior, scored 27 points in an 85-61 win over Westminster on Dec. 7.

WARGA TIME: Wittenberg tailback **Jon Warga (Pataskala, OH/Northridge)**, the NCAC Offensive Player of the Year, has been named first team Kodak All-America for College Division II. The 24-man team, which encompasses NCAA Division III and NAIA Division II, was chosen by the American Football Coaches' Association. Warga, a senior, led the nation in rushing with 1,836 yards this fall, a North Coast record and the second-highest total in Division III history. He is Wittenberg's seventh first team All America selection since 1980.

ACADEMICALLY SPEAKING: Five NCAC football standouts -- Case Reserve seniors **Mike Bissler (Stow, OH/Stow)** and **Jamie Meek (Canton, OH/Sandy Valley)**, Wittenberg senior **Victor Terebuh (Bellefontaine, OH/Bellefontaine)**, Wittenberg junior **David Radcliffe (Gahanna, OH/Lincoln)** and Denison senior **John Arrowsmith (Palmsville, OH/Lake Catholic)** have been named to the GTE/CoSIDA All-Academic District IV team. The five will appear on the national ballot, with Academic All-America teams to be announced on Dec. 14.... **Terebuh**, a two time second team GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American selection, was recently named a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athlete, qualifying him for a \$10,000 graduate fellowship. He was one of six Division III student-athletes so honored... Denison senior **Katy Pongonis (Cincinnati, OH/McNicholas)** has been named to the GTE/CoSIDA All-Academic District IV volleyball team. Her name will appear on the national ballot, with All America teams to be released Dec. 20.

CC STANDOUTS: The Allegheny women's cross country team placed seventh at the NCAA Division III Championships in Grinnell, Iowa on Nov. 17. The Gators were led by senior **Katie Tiedemann (Skaneateles, NY/Skaneateles)**, who finished 16th to earn All-America honors, and senior **Lynda Kohl (Cedar Knolls, NJ/St. Elizabeth)**, who was 32nd. Allegheny placed eighth nationally in 1989 and has been in the top 20 in five of the last six years.... Kenyon's women had two individual qualifiers at the national meet in junior **Kara Berghold (Pawling, NY/Millbrook)** and sophomore **Relley Wilder (Victor, NY/Central)**. Berghold, the NCAC Runner of the Year, placed sixth to earn All America recognition, while Wilder was 31st. Berghold, who finished just 12 seconds off the pace, won seven of nine events this fall... Wooster sophomore **Jason Kelley (Tallmadge, OH/Tallmadge)** represented the NCAC men at the Division III Championships after placing sixth at the Great Lakes Regional. Kelley, who was the individual winner at the NCAC Championships, finished 80th.

MORE FALL HONORS: Ohio Wesleyan senior **Louise Hendershott (Hudson, OH/Hudson)** earned first-team CFCHA/Sauk Valley All-America honors in field hockey after scoring 12 goals and passing for eight assists this fall. She averaged 1.68 points per game, third in the NCAC and was named first-team All-Conference for the second consecutive season. Louise's sister, **Lesley**, was a first team All America selection for the Bishops last year as a senior.... Allegheny junior **Molly Dietz (Greeley, CO/Central)**, two time NCAC Volleyball Player of the Year, was named second-team All-America by the American Volleyball Coaches' Association. NORTH COAST CHAMP ALLEGHENY TAKES DIVISION III
CHAMPIONSHIP; NCAC'S 14TH TEAM TITLE IN SEVEN YEARS

CLEVELAND, OH -- North Coast Athletic Conference champion Allegheny College (13-0-1) captured the NCAA Division III national football title with a thrilling 21-14 overtime victory against Lycoming, Saturday, Dec. 8, in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl in Bradenton, Fla. The national championship is the North Coast's 14th (team) in its seven-year history. Allegheny's last Division III title came in golf in 1983.

Trailing 14-0 at the half, Allegheny rallied to tie the game with a pair of touchdowns, the last coming on a seven-yard pass from senior quarterback **Jeff Filkovski (Penn, PA/Penn-Trafford)** to junior flanker **Julio Lacayo (Annandale, VA/Annandale)** with 1:38 to play. The game went to overtime, where, according to Division III championship rules, each team was awarded one possession at the opposition 25 yard line. The Gators struck quickly with their possession, scoring a touchdown on the third play on a 15-yard pass from Filkovski to sophomore tight end **Kurt Reiser (Butler, PA/Knoch)**. Senior placekicker **Steve Boucher (Lake City, PA/Firard)** added the extra point to give Allegheny a 21-14 lead and, more importantly, force Lycoming to score seven points to keep the game going.

Lycoming gained seven yards on its first play, but a sack by junior linebacker **Darren Hadlock (Plainfield, NH/Lebanon)** and a deflected pass by junior nose guard **Jeff Pearson (Centerville, PA/Titusville)** set up a fourth-and-11 situation, where the game ended on an interception at the goal line by junior cornerback **Tony Bifulco (Cheektowaga, NY/West Seneca East)**. "Down 14 points at halftime we knew that we had a lot of work to do, but we believed in ourselves and in our ability to come back," said first-year Allegheny head coach Ken O'Keefe. "(The national championship) is the realization of all our hard work. I'm very proud."

Allegheny finished the year with 13 consecutive victories after a season-opening tie. The Gators clinched the NCAC title with a come-from-behind 14-10 triumph over Ohio Wesleyan University and knocked off Mt. Union, 26-15, defending national champ Dayton, 31-23, and Central (Iowa), 24-7, on the road to the Stagg Bowl.

The national football championship is icing on the cake for the NCAC, whose members have been ranked in the nation's Top 20 or selected for the NCAA playoffs in each of its seven seasons. In addition to Allegheny, those North Coast football programs which have earned national rankings are: Case Western Reserve University, Denison University, Kenyon College, Ohio Wesleyan and Wittenberg University -- an impressive two-thirds of the Conference!

Although Allegheny's national title is the NCAC's first in football, the North Coast has claimed national bragging rights in men's basketball and in both men's and women's swimming & diving. In 1988, Ohio Wesleyan swept the NCAA Division III men's basketball championship behind All Americas Scott Tedder and Lee Rowlinson. Of course, Kenyon's men's and women's swim teams have collected 12 national titles in the six NCAC swim seasons under the tutelage of Jim Steen, the winningest coach in NCAA championship history.

Allegheny's achievement puts the topper on a spectacular fall season for the North Coast. The Conference just missed snaring another national title -- this one in men's soccer -- when Ohio Wesleyan was edged on penalty kicks after four overtime periods in the championship game. In all, the fall of 1990 saw 10 NCAC teams in all seven sports (men's and women's cross country, field hockey, football, men's and women's soccer and volleyball) advance or send individuals to NCAA championship competition or finish in the Division III Top 20.

NCAC All Sports Update

OHIO WESLEYAN GRABS LEAD IN ALL-SPORTS RACE; NCAC REPRESENTED NATIONALLY IN ALL SEVEN FALL SPORTS

CLEVELAND, OH -- Ohio Wesleyan University used five top-three finishes to jump into the early lead in the race for the 1990-91 North Coast Athletic Conference All Sports Championship. The Bishops, winners of two consecutive All-Sports titles, picked up an outright NCAC championship in field hockey as well as a share of the crown in women's soccer this fall.

Ohio Wesleyan added second place finishes in football and men's soccer and a third in women's cross country in its 47-point performance. Allegheny College, which took championships in women's cross country and football, is second with 44 points, while Kenyon College stands third with 41 points after winning the men's soccer title and placing second in women's cross country.

Denison University, which won the men's cross country championship on its way to a 40.5 point output, and The College of Wooster, which grabbed a share of the women's soccer crown and has 39.5 points, are in fourth and fifth place, respectively. Wittenberg University, meanwhile, holds down the sixth position with 32.5 points, followed by Oberlin College (29), Earlham College (24) and Case Western Reserve University (14.5) in spots seven through nine.

The All-Sports award is given annually to the school that performs the best across the NCAC's 21 sports. Nine points are awarded for a first-place finish, eight for a second, seven for a third and so on. Men's and women's performances are combined, exemplifying the North Coast's commitment to equity and balance among programs. Wooster won three of the first four All-Sports Championships, interrupted only by Denison in 1985-86, leading to Ohio Wesleyan's current two-year reign.

The NCAC is coming off possibly its finest fall season on the national level, with 10 teams in all seven sports advancing/sending individuals to NCAA Championship competition or finishing in the Division III Top 20. Allegheny's football team, which won the national title with a 21-14 victory against Lycoming in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl, heads that list. The Gators knocked off Mt. Union (26-15), defending national champ Dayton (31-23) and Central (24-7) on the road to the Stagg Bowl.

Other highlights included Ohio Wesleyan's national second-place finish in men's soccer. The Bishops, who hosted the semifinals and finals, fell on penalty kicks to Glassboro State in the championship game after four overtime periods failed to decide a winner. It was Ohio Wesleyan's third trip to the final four and its 13th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance overall. The Bishops were joined in post-season action by Kenyon, which was ranked second in the final Division III poll after an undefeated regular season, and Wooster.

The North Coast also was well-represented at the NCAA Cross Country Championships; Allegheny's women placed seventh nationally (its second straight top 10 finish) and Kenyon and Wooster contributed two women and one man, respectively, as individual qualifiers. Allegheny also made an NCAA Tournament appearance in volleyball, its third trip in four years, while Ohio Wesleyan was back for a fourth consecutive time in field hockey. Women's soccer was the only North Coast sport not represented in national competition, but Ohio Wesleyan finished the year ranked 18th in Division III, just missing out on the 16-team playoffs.
